Since this is contrary to all Christian principles, the results are evident in confused, uprooted, disappointed, and disillusioned young men and women who admit they have found neither peace nor satisfaction. Today many are searching for a way of escape from their self-inflicted dilemma.

Jesus said, "I am the way, the truth, and the life." John 14:6. At such a time as this the voices of all Christians should ring out to proclaim the freedom and liberty to be found when one accepts Jesus. Today the signs which point to Jesus' Second Coming indicate that the glorious event is about ready to transpire.

For years many have been praying for the outpouring of the Holy Spirit, which will touch the hearts of God's children. Of recent weeks many of our campuses have experienced a revival and reformation. To the left, the other train, equally long, seemed to start in top gear as it quickly disappeared around the bend, while the first train was just getting started. What made the difference? One was moving noisily under its own steam--the other moved silently and swiftly down the tracks propelled by power drawn from above. It was an electric train. Too often we laboriously move along under the pressure of our own

steam when there is an abundance of heavenly power available to us.

During the week of March 20 to 27 let us unite together in prayer and meditation, opening the windows of the soul for the inpouring of the Holy Spirit, which will give us power to live joyously and victoriously.

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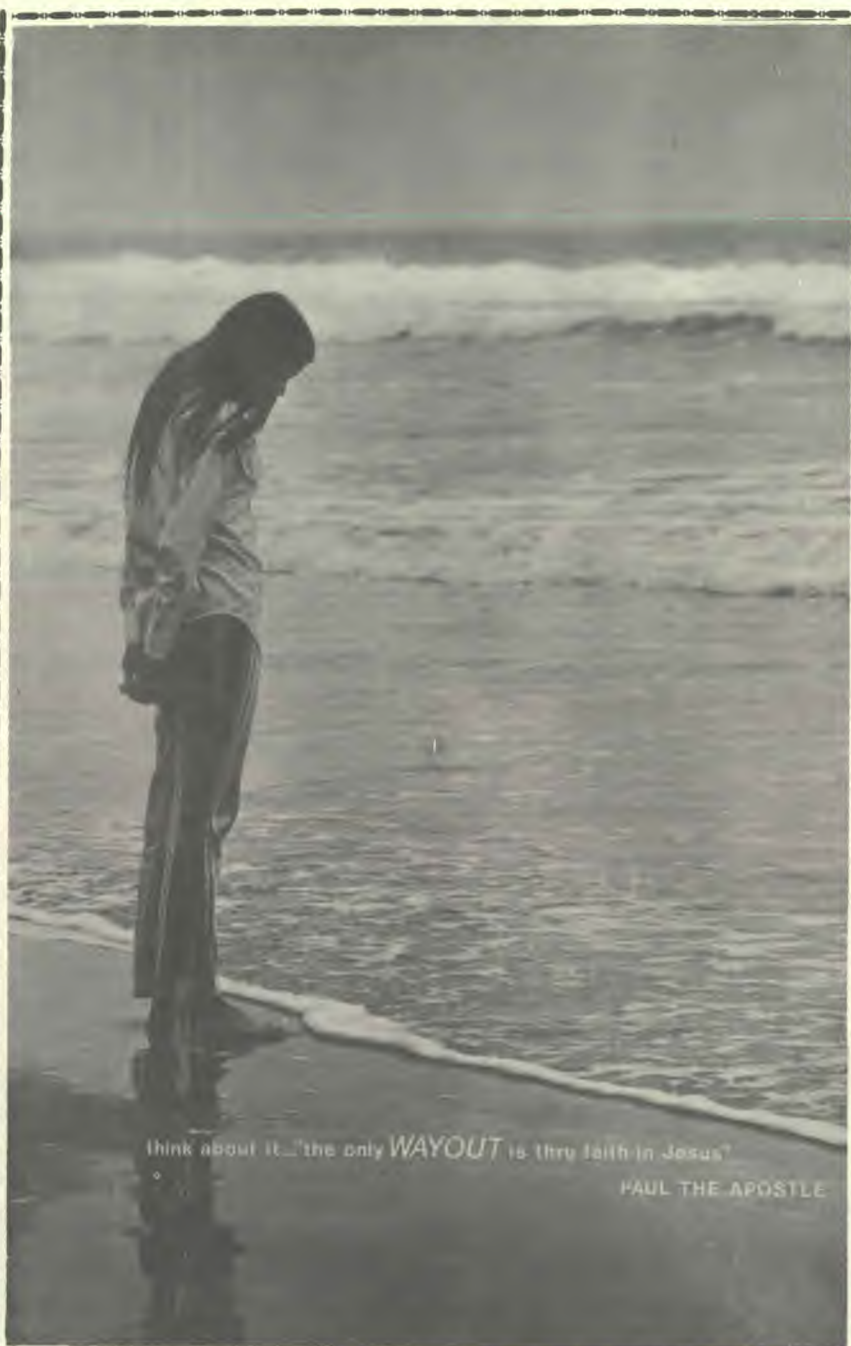

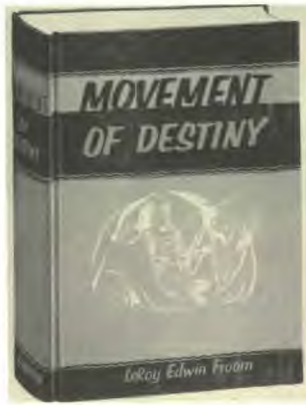

Workers for the Blind Meet

To lay plans for 1971 was the purpose of the Division Field Leaders Meeting held recently. The seven division leaders of the Christian Record Braille Foundation met with officers at the headquarters in Lincoln, Nebraska.

Two new division leaders were introduced at the meeting. Arthur Knight of Denver, Colorado, assumed responsibility of the North Central Division several months ago.

Frank Nieb was appointed director of the Northeastern Division effective January 1, 1971.

At the present time over 80 field representatives work under the direction of these leaders. They visit blind people offering the free services provided by the church. They are the liaison between the Foundation and the local and state commissions for the blind—coordinating each agency's efforts to better serve blind and visually handicapped people.

The field representatives also visit businessmen, acquainting them with the large scope of activities of the Foundation. Over 120,000 contacts are made annually by this group of denominational workers.

Dear Mom and Dad,

Although the icy Nebraska winds froze the campus this past week, student week of prayer warmed me through and through and completely thawed some of my reservations towards accepting Christ fully. Ed Wagner organized a singspiration for the first meeting of the week at which two action teams—The Way-Out Singers and The Real Happiness Is with a girls trio—provided the special numbers. Gayle Wagner brightened the evening of "Spiritual Inventory" in a short, positive witness for Christ.

For the Monday morning chapel Scott LeMert urged each one of us to examine our principles and choose a "Dream to Fulfill." Jerry Finneman related personal experiences with a special focus on his return to God.

Doug Eno chose to illustrate his topic, "In Pursuit of Happiness," with slides and a corresponding narration for the Tuesday night meeting.

Sometime when you visit me I want to introduce you to Cindy Wagner, the speaker Wednesday morning. Cindy just bubbled over with enthusiasm as she told us to give Christ our love and lives instead of promises that we never keep. It was very apparent that she practices what she talked about that morning. At

6:45 that evening "Operation Peanut," a series of skits produced by Bonnie Rowland and company, pointed out the various ways we as students escape our Christian responsibilities through such feeble excuses as "there's not enough time to do everything" to "he's beyond any help I could give him."

The next evening Larry Zuchowski asked us each to reevaluate the positions we take as members of the "Pepsi Generation." He further emphasized that I won't be ready to help the world until I allow Christ to first help me. I guess I sometimes forget Him who can empower me to serve others.

Then Friday morning I again was shown that Christ loves me and expects me to act on His love instead of being a "Muddle in the Middle" which was Jim Coffin's focal point.

I saved the best part for last although I did enjoy the entire week. As I walked into the gymnasium that Friday evening, the set-up seemed strange for a Communion service because instead of the usual rows of chairs there were long tables to sit by. The sermon, "Abraham, Isaac, Jacob, and John Jones," by Jerry Moon emphasized the relevance of the church today as living the unwritten, but final chapters of the Bible. I realized that in heaven Hebrews 11 will not stop at the 40th verse, but will continue with more faith verses such as—"By faith Vicki accepted Jesus Christ." It's really wonderful to realize that I am right now making history. Following the sermon, we separated for the Ordinance of Humility. Later we all gathered around the tables to celebrate the Lord's Supper. At each table there was a host and hostess who passed the plate of bread and gave each one a glass of grape juice. Since my friends were with me at the table, the feeling of what that first Lord's Supper must have been like affected me deeply. Then like Christ and His disciples, we closed with a hymn. To conclude the week, Rob Vandeman spoke at both services in the College View Church Sabbath morning.

I hope this letter has let you know in another way just how thankful I am to attend a Christian college.

St. Paul First Church Holds Banquet

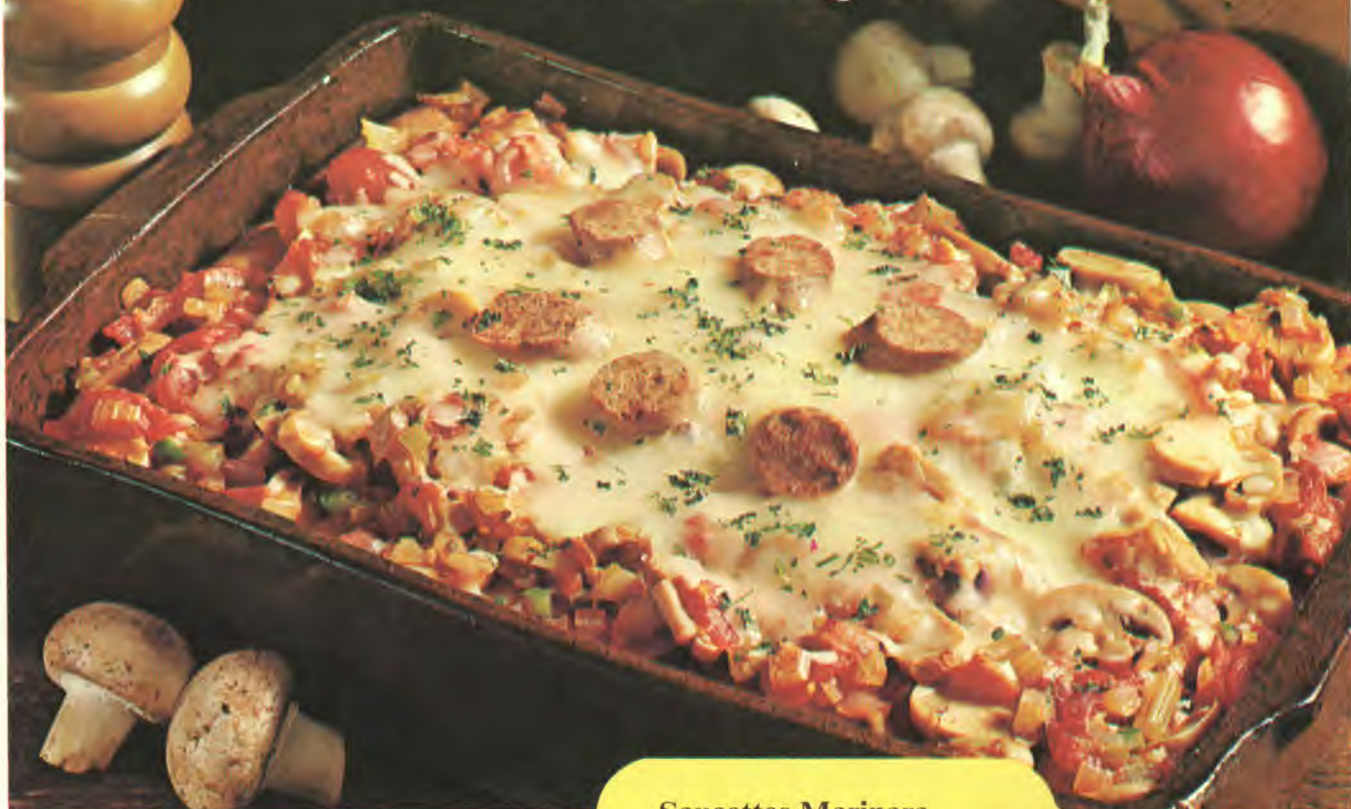

Pour corn oil into a heavy sauce pan or dutch oven. Add onion, celery, and green pepper. Saute vegetables at medium heat until tender. Add tomatoes, mushrooms, liquid drained from SAUCETTES, sugar, salt, and oregano. Simmer uncovered for 30 minutes stirring occasionally.

Pour 1/4 cup corn oil into a skillet. Add SAUCETTES. Brown quickly at medium high heat. Place all but one of the browned SAUCETTES in a small shallow baking dish (approximately 1 quart size). Pour prepared tomato-vegetable sauce over the SAUCETTES. Top with shredded cheese. Slice remaining SAUCETTE into 5 slices. Arrange slices over cheese as a garnish. Bake at 350°F for 10 minutes. Sprinkle with minced parsley. (Serves 4)
