

"Then the king will say to those on his right: 'Come, you who have won my Father's blessing! Take your inheritance. . . .For I was hungry and you gave me food. I was thirsty and you gave me a drink. During the recent Amazing Facts Series with D. G. Albertsen as speaker, the Williston SDA Church was challenged to bring food for the poor. It took awhile for the members to remember the food barrel each evening. But by the end of the meetings the total value of food items brought totaled \$28.00 besides \$4.00 cash. Garden vegetables, homemade jam, and homemade spaghetti sauce were among the items that went to help three families much in need.

The preaching of the Word had its effect, too. One young man is presently preparing for church member-

ship and others are being given studies in their homes. Although this is not a great report as far as numbers who are joining the church, we believe that many of our members are nearer the kingdom because of the concern expressed for the poor!

The meetings were held in the Faith Community Church, a former EUB Church. The lovely facilities of this church plant proved to be an added blessing. Several of the local members worked together to provide music as well as playing the organ and piano nightly. Others served as greeters, ushers, and baby sitters.

The preaching of the Word, even if it is the old landmarks, should work a change in our living patterns. The vision of helping the poor and hungry--on a regular basis, not just at holiday seasons--is one that the Master would have each of us experience. May that vision never dim in the experience of the Williston SDA Church.

Dickinson, Faith for Today Evangelistic Campaign Brings Excellent Response



The capacity crowd heard Gordon F. Dalrymple open the Dickinson, North Dakota, evangelistic campaign with a message on "Our Shattered World, What is Coming?" Fundamental Bible doctrines and prophecies were covered during the series. Some of those attending traveled as far as 100 miles each way to be present for the Bible lectures.

WASHINGTON D.C.--The city of Chicago has found a way to "brake" its drinking drivers--particularly at this year-end holiday season.

Last year the Traffic Court and Police Department decided to get tough, to enforce the law, in a doublebarreled action. Drivers convicted of driving under the influence would be sentenced to a minimum of seven days in jail, and they would also be hit with an unconditional revocation of their driving license for one year.

What happened? The phenomenal result is featured in the current issue of LISTEN Magazine. Last December, fatalities during the last two weeks suddenly went down 65 percent, from an average of 22 killed during those weeks in previous years, to only 8. Injuries dropped more than 50 percent, from 2,003 the previous year, to 994.

Moreover, only one of the fatalities involved alcohol. Usually at holiday time the average is much above 50 percent involvement. The number of accidents in which alcohol played a part dropped by 80 percent.

Chief architect of this campaign was Raymond K. Berg, Chicago traffic court judge, working under the direction of Mayor Richard J. Daley and chief judge John S. Boyle.

Success was so spectacular that the program is being repeated and strengthened for this holiday season, says Judge Berg, with greater publicity in all media.

for the different types of diseases treated, her work was not much different from that in the United States. Some of the types of diseases which were most frequently seen were malaria, malnutrition, tetanus, tuberculosis, and amoebic infections. Most of these diseases are uncommon in the modern American community with a good public health program.

Kathie Pundt, from Texas, and Gina Huckins, from Nebraska, were sent to the jungles of Peru.
