

## Emperor Hosts Loma Linda Group

Ethiopian Emperor Haile Selassie held a private audience with Alonzo Baker of Loma Linda University and his 36-member tour group on June 30.

The half-hour private reception at the Emperor's palace in Addis Ababa came minutes after the emperor returned from a 3-nation meeting with European heads of States.

Each individual in the tour group was introduced to His Majesty, followed by an informal discussion of world affairs led by the Emperor. His Majesty expressed appreciation for the opportunity to visit with so large a group of Americans, and expressed the hope that more citizens of the United States might visit the "oldest continuous government in the world today."

The audience was arranged by Mrs. Della Hanson, an administrative assistant to the Emperor. Mrs. Hanson and her late husband, Herbert, went to Ethiopia as Adventist missionaries in 1934. She has been closely associated with the Emperor since 1939 when he employed her to refurnish his palace, which had been badly damaged during the war.

A tired but happy group of teen-agers returned to their homes on July 31 after having spent 33 days living out of suitcases and traveling nearly 6,000 miles and giving 28 musical programs. They enjoyed themselves and were happy to encourage other young people to take advantage of the opportunity for a Christian education as their days were well spent visiting academy age young people from Fargo to Beach and from Bottineau to Ellendale.

The team was composed of 4 seniors, and 2 juniors plus Bill Chunestudy who was their director and sangwith them. Others who accompanied the team were Carleton Dyer, Youth Director of the North Dakota Conference, Ray Hoffmann, principal, and Tom Thompson, teacher, both of Sheyenne River Academy.

Attending these programs were some non-Adventist friends as well as our church members. Comments were varied from "too short" to "an outstanding performance of contemporary music." One grandmother said that she felt that the young people were helping to "bridge the generation gap." "Sometimes we feel that the younger generation cares only for a good time and has no serious thoughts. It is a great encouragement to us who are older to know that our young people really want to work for the Lord and do their part in helping others to know Him. I say, 'God bless them.' " The mother of one of the team members said "she was very happy to have her teenager witnessing for the Lord and it is an experience which can never be taken away from them." Another commented, "I enjoy hearing Christian young people participate in a gospel singing group and I feel that this program should definitely be continued next year."

The purpose of the team as stated by Elder Hoffmann is, "To show the constituents of North Dakota the benefits of Christian education, especially what youth can do when rightly trained. In Messages to Young People we read 'With such an army of workers as our youth, rightly trained, might furnish, how soon the message of a crucified, risen, and soon-coming

Saviour might be carried to all the whole world,' page 190. This is the whole purpose. I was encouraged with the enthusiasm of the young people who participated in the group in this program."

Bill Chunestudy who is also voice and instrument instructor at SRA feels that each one in the group was spiritually strengthened.

In their repertoire are such traditional hymns as "Oh, Let Me Walk With Thee My God," as well as the contemporary music of Ralph Carmichael including "I Looked for Love," and "The New 23rd." 
## Logan Meetings
