We are thrilled beyond words with the outstanding reports that have come to our attention regarding soul-winning exploits here in the Northern Union!

Last year was the biggest year the North Dakota Conference had had in 21 years when they baptized 154. Already this year they have exceeded this figure; through May they have baptized 183.

1974 was the greatest year in soul-winning for the South

Dakota Conference, with 133 baptized, since the years of 1940, 42, and 44. During the first five months of 1975, they have baptized 83 which is two less than they had at the end of July a year ago.

Also during the first five months of 1975, Iowa has baptized

109, and Minnesota now has 167.

Our Union now has 542 for the first five months of this year which represents a 213 gain over the same period last year. In 1956 a total of 461 were baptized for the entire year in the Northern Union and in 1966 a total of 437 were baptized for the year. So you can see how the Lord is blessing.

What would happen during the rest of 1975 if all of us endeavored to win at least one person each for the Lord

between now and the end of the year?

God is ready when we are ready to finish the work. Let us arise, as one, and complete the work God has given us to do.



Witnessing With Ministry of Healing

"Reaching men of high-caliber professions such as physicians and dentists with something of our message is not always an easy task for the Church," suggests Pastor Phil Benson of the Lemmon Seventh-day Adventist Church in South Dakota, "but it can be done with proper methods."

As members of the Lemmon church began studying the book *The Ministry of Healing* by Ellen G. White week by week, the comment, "I wish more people of this community and especially those who care for the sick could read this book," was

repeatedly heard.

After having considered that the book of the year (1974) Charisma of the Spirit had been favorably received by 12 area ministers last October, an idea emerged. Why not send a paperback copy of The Ministry of Healing to at least every area physician and dentist. So, with the approval of this health study group the pastor prepared a letter of introduction to precede the mailing of the books.

By mailing a personal letter to these men first, it was hoped they would be informed about the book—its need, its practical approach, and its authoritative content as substantiated by Dr. Clive McKay of Cornell University—and desire to read it.

To date, 14 copies of this inspired volume of counsel have been mailed to these professional men in three area cities. "Planting seed in the proper way and then watering it

through the working of the Holy Spirit will surely begin to do a work God expects of us," commented Pastor Benson.

Temperance Week at Lemmon

"Temperance work is not always as much work as it is challenging and rewarding," says Phil Benson of Lemmon, South Dakota.

The challenge came when Kathy Benson, wife of the pastor, discovered a small news article tucked in the corner of the city's paper, Lemmon Leader. It was a mayoral proclamation that was proclaiming April 20-26, 1975 as YOUTH TEMPERANCE WEEK and urged all civic, education, religious, social, and other organizations to make a substantial contribution to the moral, spiritual, and social standards by the use of temperance education for its vouth.

It was Thursday afternoon with the week but four days away. Using the conference film list, the film "Just One," which described the effects of alcohol on the brain, was selected. A call was placed by the pastor to the conference in faith that a way would open to use it.

Knowing that the best advantage for reaching the largest number of grade-school and lower high school age students was through the public schools, a call was again made to the principal of Lemmon High School, Kenneth Ashmore. Mr. Ashmore was surprised to be briefed on the possibility of a temperance program as he had not as yet read or heard of the mayoral proclamation.

By Friday evening Mr. Ash-

more consented to the temperance program consisting of film and literature distribution for his nearly 300 youth from grades 7-10. The date was set for Thursday, April 24, at 3 o'clock.

On Monday the following week 300 Listen reprints entitled, "Brain Damage Starts With The First Drink," were phone ordered from the General Conference Temperance department. As fate would seem to have it, there was a mix-up in the mailing of the film, so "Just One" was seemingly adrift in the mail from one point to another. The Lemmon Post Office agreed to hold it the morning of the 24th as mail did not reach the pastor's home till late afternoon-the time of the presentation.

On the morning of the 24th both the film and leaflets arrived similtaneously. At the high school, a short introduction was made by Mr. Ashmore on the purpose of the week—temperance, a word not quite understood by most until "alcohol" was mentioned. Pastor Benson followed with remarks as to the widespread use of the drug, alcohol, and gave comment on the film's

content.

At the conclusion of the program Lloyd Dale, a 7th grade instructor at the school, requested the use of the film for the following morning where nearly 75 of the group would again view its content. As the film was returned, Mr. Dale expressed thanks for such a straight-forward documentary and mentioned that nearly 20 minutes of discussion had followed its second showing. "I believe," says Pastor Benson, "you have already guessed the reward in this story.

Spencer Church Dedication

The Spencer church members enjoyed a special Sabbath March 22 when God's house of worship was dedicated free of debt. Guest speaker L. H. Netteburg, Treasurer of the Northern Union Conference, gave the dedicatory address using II Chronicles 6 as the theme, in which Solomon's prayer of consecration was presented following the building of the Temple. District pastor Charles Stout read the act of dedication and the congregation responded with a vow of reconsecration for the cause and service of God.

Mrs. Barbara Knipe reviewed the history of the church, which began in a theater in 1942 where the brothers Leighton and Roger Holley held evangelistic services. Following these meetings there were 21 charter members under the leadership of Leighton Holley. The group purchased the Danish Dance Hall at 517 6th Ave. E. where the Spencer Church was officially organized on April 17, 1943.

Pastors and their families who have served the church in sequence are: Leighton Holley, H. R. Coats, W. K. Caviness, H. H. White, A. T. Bidwell, A. L. Rudy, H. R. Davis, O. P. Jones, C. A. Larsen, O. R. McLean, W. L. Wellman, G. N. Miller, Jerald Hurst, Norman Jones, Robert Leach and the present pastor Charles Stout.

In 1945, under the direction of Pastor Caviness, an elementary church school was established and taught by Mrs. Caviness. Violet Foster, now of Centerville, lowa soon took over these duties until 1952 when several families moved away and there were too few students to continue.

Drs. Everett and Eunice Christensen set up a practice in Spencer in 1945. Dr. Everett served the church as head local elder and Dr. Eunice as head deaconess until they moved to Thomasville, Georgia in 1968. During the last year of their

residence here, they and Pastor Miller led out in a complete remodeling and redecorating program of the church, including carpeting, children's class rooms, air-conditioning, and many other renovations. Recently a new organ, piano, public address system, new doors and window drapes have been added. With this entire conversion, the old Danish Hall had little left to remind it of it's former days.

In 1961 when the adjoining neighborhood grocery store closed, the location was purchased by the congregation for a parking lot.



New Book On How To Choose a Bible

This passage, 1 Corinthians 7:36 from the Greek New Testament, is an example of one of the very few instances where scholars are not sure what the original author was trying to say. And the topic here is no less consequential than when to get married. The first word underlined is variously translated as "daughter," "partner in celibacy," "fiancee," and betrothed." The words underlined next are also open to debate. The Revised Standard Version says, "If his passions are strong," the New English Bible, "If, that is, his instincts are still strong for him," and the King James Version, "If she pass the flower of her age." The problem arises partly from the middle word in the expression; it is simply a third person singular, and means he, she, or it. How the verse is ultimately translated, then, might depend on the translator's own ideas about when one should get married.

Until recently, choosing a Bible usually meant deciding between leather or cloth cover, small or large type. Walter Specht and Sakae Kubo of Andrews University have co-authored a book entitled, So Many Versions being published this June by Zondervan Publishing House.

These two men, specialists in Biblical languages and translation, offer their analysis of several recent translations and suggest certain guidelines for choosing a new Bible. They feel there is actually little conceptual difference between the King James version and any of the new good versions. Specht said, "You can get the Gospel out of any of them."

LOST - \$6,000

A few years ago the news media was reporting the story of a man who had found in the gutter of the street near his home, a money bag containing \$5,000. All agreed, it was quite a find

But, here is a story about losing, not finding, \$6,000. Yes, you have guessed it, for that is part of the money that is lost to God's cause and to Mission Advance because of the large number of Sabbath School members who are absent week by week from Sabbath School right here in the Northern Union. Yes, it amounted to more than \$6,000 for the first guarter of 1975. Amazing isn't it. from Sabbath School. Indeed, much more than \$6,000 has been lost to God's cause, and there is no estimate of the tragic loss to hundreds of absentees.

Our 10,653 attending Sabbath School members in the Northern Union gave \$93,250 during the first quarter of 1975. But, if the potential membership of the Sabbath School had been present, there would have been 13,630 members to swell the offering. Allowing the cradle roll, the kindergarten, the primary, and half of the juniors (who are not baptized members) not to be included in the figures, there should have been

at least 13,630 baptized Sabbath School members attending instead of 10,653. Thus, these additional 2,977 missing members would have increased the offering \$6,013 if they had given at the same rate as those who did attend.

Let us seek to widen the flow of Sabbath School blessings and increase the flow of funds to needy mission fields through a more faithful attendance at Sabbath School. And may every effort be made to reclaim these missing members, both for their own soul's sake and for the additional blessing it will bring to God's cause.

Italy Calling

By S. F. Monnier, President Southern European Union Mission

Almost two thousand years ago Paul answered for his belief in Jesus before the emperor of ancient Rome, but not until after his ministry had resulted in converts in the very household of Nero. Although the apostle paid the supreme price for his faith, his example of courage served as inspiration to hundreds of martyrs who followed. Then, some 400 years later, at the hour indicated by God, the iron kingdom was divided in the wake of attacks by Barbarian hordes, and another power arose, Papal Romethe stronghold of popes and Catholicism. God's followers still had to answer for their faith, many of them, like the first Christians, with their blood. The centuries of persecution took their toll in Italy. True disciples of Jesus sought refuge in friendlier lands, and Rome tightened her grip on the minds of the people, making it difficult to sow the seeds of truth.

Today Christian Rome is losing her impact. Italians no longer believe in life after death. Questioning recent developments in their church, they are neglecting mass and leaving the faith of their fathers. Bewildered and disappointed, they are searching for answers, for certitude. The Seventh-day Adventist Church has the answer. Moreover, there is unprecendented freedom to proclaim the good news of the blessed hope. But Seventh-day Adventists in Italy are few in number, less than 4500 to evangelize 55 million.

In this country, where we have an average of only one church to every 2000 square miles and only 41 ministers to pastor these groups, literature evangelists play a vital role in the over-all plan of carrying God's last message to the

people. Besides their soul-winning, day-to-day ministry, colporteurs enter an area and prepare the territory before an evangelist holds an effort. Thus by carefully sowing the seed through the sale of literature and their personal witness they are following the example set by these Adventist shock troops throughout the history of our church.

Italian literature evangelists, 33 strong, are devoted to their labors. They go from door to door with two excellent journals, Vita e Salute, ("Life and Health"), which enjoys a monthly circulation of 55,000 copies, and Segni dei Tempi ("Signs of the Times"), with a circulation of 5,000 copies. There are also 30 subscription books for the book evangelists and nine

Spirit of Prophecy volumes.

This literature is published at Casa Editrice "L'Araldo della Verita," in Florence. This publishing house was opened 50 years ago in Italy by a very small church with a large faith. Still housed in the original building, although offices and rooms have been added, Casa Editrice now appears more like a warehouse or depot than a printing establishment. Book signatures, paper stock, magazines, and inventory are stacked in every available space, making actual press work difficult, but there is no more room for expansion.

Our books and magazines are imperative to the work of the church in Italy. To supply our colporteurs and members with the literature they need, a more functional building is essential. No one knows how long doors will remain open in the seat of the great power that is to play a decisive role in closing events of this world's history. Help us to work while it is yet day.
