Our first work was to find a place to stay while here, which is a hard task in this mining district, as every place seems crowded to overflowing. But the Lord helped us and we found a room on Main street in about the center of our

Notwithstanding the different languages spoken by the people, we are having good success. The Lord helps us to meet these people, and so far we have taken more orders from the foreigners than from those speaking the English language.

When canvassing the Finnish people we have to use a book for a sample printed in their own language, place it in their hands and let the Lord do the rest, which He does in a marvelous way as we take many orders from these people.

In our work among the people we find many of our books that have been sold by the brethren who canvassed this territory last year and some that were bought by the people in other places before moving here.
