COMMANDMENT KEEPING

The remnant church is char acterized as commandment-keepers. Commandment-keeping is the way of life. In answer to the young man, inquiring concerning eternal life, Jesus said to him, "If thou wilt enter into life, keep the commandments." The Psalmist David says, "Thy commandment is exceeding broad." Therefore commandment-keeping in the strictest sense reaches to the exceeding breadth of the Divine Law.

The Apostle Paul in Romans 13:10 says. "Love is the fulfilling of the law," and love is the most practical thing in the universe, for "Love is of God," and "God is love," and "He giveth to all life and breath and all things." Love is known by what it does, and not by what it says. "For whose hath this world's goods, and seeth his brother have need, and shutteth up his bowels of compassion from him, how dwelleth the love of God in him? My little children let us not love in word, neither in tongue, but in deed and in truth."

It is the love expressed in deed that the world needs, and which distinguishes us as commandment-keepers.

In John 3:16 we read, "For God so loved the world that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in him

should not perish but have everlasting life." The evidence of God's love is the gift. He so loved that he gave and he says, "I have kept my Father's commandments and abide in his love." "This is my commandment that ye love one another as I have loved you."

If we love one another as Christ loved us, it will be manifested in our gifts to others, "For God so loved that he gave." We know we have passed from death unto life because we love the brethren.

The remnant church has a chance at this time to give a very practical illustration of their love for their brethren. On account of the European War many of our beloved brethren are in distress. Some of our missionaries are cut off from their means of support and we in this country are called upon to support them. God has greatly blessed us with prosperity in a temporal way. and with the enjoyment of peace at home and abroad. Dear reader, will we not respond most liberally to this call. If we do not, can we say in our hearts, "Here are they that keep the commandments of God."

The daily papers reporting conditions in Europe on account of the war give an account of the woman of Germany sacrificing their jewelry to provide means for firearms and ammunition that their country's need might be supplied. This is an evidence to all that they love their country. Should not commandment-keepers be far more anxious to relieve a distressed brother or sister and support the cause of God, than any person could be to provide the munitions of warfare?

THE NEXT PROGRAM FOR PEACE

Before this awful war of Europe broke out, we were assured, over and over again, that our Christian civilization in all of the great world powers was such that we would have no wars of any consequence. We were told

that our powerful cannon and our big battleships, our submarines and our military aeroplanes, were so terrible that men would not face them in actual war; and that really they were "peacemakers." But this war, coming like an explosion, has dissipated that idea; and the world for the time being is awake to the fact that the most barbarous, the most cruel, and the most destructive fighting this world has ever known is now in progress.

Within two months, war is declared, millions of men are in the field fighting, and more thousands of persons have been killed, and more property has been destroyed, than in a year or possibly in four or five years of any past wars.

God's word has predicted that in this time, the nations would be angry, and the spirit of war would be rife; but men have been saying "No" to the sacred Book. They have been telling us that we are approaching an era of peace. So now our good peace advocates-thousands of whom, without any question, are perfectly sincere in what they have been and are saying-are beginning to tell us that we have been on the wrong tack in the past: that in place of these great implements of war being peacemakers, we should have disarmed the nations; and that if we did not have these destructive armaments, then we would have no danger of war, as our civilization would prevent it. Hence a strong crusade is already setting in in favor of peace and disarmament, and we are already earnestly told that this war will be so terrible that its lesson will be sufficient for all time, and that we will be in danger of no more wars.

But be not deceived by these things. The good Book says that "the heart is deceitful above all things, and it is exceedingly corrupt, who can know it? I, Jehovah, search the mind, I try the heart, even to give every man according to his ways, according to the fruit of his doings." Jer. 17: 9, 10.

Our deceitful hearts lead us to believe that our civilization and our Christianity are very superior in this age and generation, and without question there are multiplied thousands of men and women living today who stand as high in Christian morals as any who have ever lived. But regardless of these, our world is in a desperate situation. God foresaw it, and pointed out, through the prophets, that the conditions in this time would be war and not peace; and the stormy sentiments in society everywhere ought to arouse us to the fact that God's word is correct in what it has foretold.

We may expect this war to close, possibly as suddenly as it began, but it will not end the strife. The Book explains that things will continue to grow worse and worse until finally the only thing that can cap the climax of violence, strife, and wickedness in general will be the mighty power displayed in the second coming of Christ.

Let us not lose sight of the fact that the Book which has foretold these wars has also foretold the mistaken notes of peace that would be sounding in these war times. It is "when they are saying, Peace and safety," that "sudden destruction cometh upon them, as travail upon a woman with child; and they shall in no wise escape." 1 Thess. 5:3.

We must work wisely, patiently, consider-

Adventist Pastor Discusses Protestantism's Attitude Toward Sabbath

Last night at the Adventist church, on the corner of Sixth Street and Tenth Avenue east, Stemple White, the pastor, spoke on "Protestantism and the Sabbath," taking for his text: "If ye continue in my word, then are ye my disciples indeed." Mr. White said in part:

"When those famous princes in 1529 protested against substituting the word and power of man. for the word and power of God. they enunciated the original principles of Christianity. The very foundation of Protestantism. is the Bible, and the Bible only, as our only rule of faith and While the various practise. Protestant sects of today are practising many religious rites and traditional observances which are foreign to the word of God. it is a fact that, regardless of her original and apostolic platform,

the nominal Protestantism of today is almost solidly united in observing a man-made church festival day in place of the Sabbath of the Bible. The inconsistent part of it all is, that these same Protestant sects openly admit-and it is the truth-that there is no Bible command or example for Sunday keeping. Accepting tradition on one point, in utter repudiation of the word of God, what possible reason can first day Protestantism offer for not accepting the other festival days and ceremonies of the 'mother' church?

"A world wide message is sounding to all, 'Babylon is fallen, come out of her, my people,' and Seventh-day Adventists have no apology to offer to the world for consistently adhering to the apostolic principles of genuine Protestantism. Let us stand by the word and power of God." -Duluth Herald.

The Bowdon Sabbath school is feeling rather triumphant, having set its aim at \$125.00 for the quarter, and having received \$181.65.


Next Friday evening the Young People's and Sabbath school institute at Max, one of our Russian churches, will open, continuing until Monday evening.
