# EIGHTH SESSION OF THE NORTHERN UNION CONFERENCE

No doubt the most interesting and best conference session of the Northern Union ever held, was the eighth session which was recently held in Minneapolis.

The deep yet simple Bible studies given by Prof. W. W. Prescott two hours each day, during the meeting, were very highly appreciated and treasured by all present. Many of the workers expressed themselves at the close of the meeting that this was the best and most interesting conference they had ever attended. And so it was! Not only because of the excellent spiritual food and help given by the general brethren; but also because of the unity that existed and prevailed in all the work of the conference. Many important and farreaching resolutions were passed, but not one speaker during the entire session uttered a word of opposition to any of the recommendations brought before the delegates. # UNION COLLEGE

Elder B. L. Anderson, of Hong-Kong, China, spoke in the Union College chapel Thursday, Nov. 20, on the Qualifications of workers for Foreign Fields. Elder Anderson, a graduate of Union College, has spent twelve years in China, and is able to speak from experience.

He advised that every person con-

templating work in a foreign field should finish, at least, the College course, and take a year or two of post graduate work, if possible.

Men of superior training are needed in the mission field. "Mere piety and enthusiasm are not enough to make a missionary."

If the missionary does not have the proper training, the natives themselves will soon detect it. There are schools and colleges in China that are turning out men and women who have completed sixteen grades of work, and they take their place in the ministry and evangelistic work. It is a common thing for the natives to inquire what school the missionary is from, and the standing of the school.

"The missionary should be a man of perseverance, steadfastness, common sense, wise judgment, and he should be economical in the expenditure of money."

Above all, Elder Anderson places as the most essential requisite, a Christian character. The mission work in all its forms is a spiritual work, and it is harder to be a Christian in China than in the United States.

He told of the joys and fascinations of mission life. One of the greatest joys is to see young men and women come and take hold of the work, determined to do their part.

### HIDING IN THE HOUSE OF GOD

In 2 Kings 11:3 and 2 Chr. 22:12 we read of a man who was hid in the house of God for six years in order to save his life. In these Laodicean times, many who are hiding in the "house of God" will lose their souls unless they come out from such hiding and do faithful service for the Lord. Jesus will never say "Well done, good and faithful servant" to him who has not done well, but has been faithless. What do I mean by

'hiding in the house of God?' Listen!

Pick up the clerk's book. Here are the names of Brother and Sister Soand-so, but their faces are seldom if ever seen at church services. They are within walking distance of the church, too, and are often seen down in the busy marts, shopping,-but 'Sabbath sickness' (?) or some other good (?) reason keeps them away from divine services and from association with those of like precious faith. Take Brother Dash and Sister Blank! Their names appear on the clerk's book, but are not to be found in the treasurer's book. careful search in the missionary secretary's book reveals the fact that no subscription is there recorded for the Review, Signs, Watchman, Instructor, Little Friend, Gazette, Worker, Lesson Quarterly, nor Present Truth. Brother Dash and Sister Blank never report their missionary work, because they everlastingly protest that their right hand should not know what the left hand does. Such folks could not expect to do much missionary work without some missionary ammunition.

Let us go early to Sabbath school for a careful search for those in hiding. There is Brother Faithful, Sister On-Time, Brother Pleasant, Sister Hospitable, and other regular teachers and minute laymen. A11 others are in their places with cheerful faces, but Brother Dash and Sister Blank are absent as usual. Don't count on these folks to burst your Sabbath school thermometer in going "over the top" in financial goals, or in boosting the Thirteenth Sabbath offering.

In vain do we look for Brother Dash and Sister Blank either at the prayer meeting, young people's meeting, business sessions, quarterly meetings, or annual week-of-prayer They sometimes attend services. movies, and are very active in worldly lines of work, but though their names are on the clerk's book, they are hiding in the house of God. If every member of the church were just like them, what would happen to the world-wide work? Brother Rogers at Washington would never need to get out another statistical report. But thank God, in spite of slackers and quitters, the good work goes on in its ever increasing magnitude. Elders the world over, keep your eye on the membership list and keep the records correct. There is a vast difference between a city directory and a church clerk's book. But may there be resurrections rather than funerals!

The church is not to support the members, but the members are to support the church. We are in the church for service, not to be served. We are to give the Bread of Life to the poor lost world. We are not to join the church for loaves and fishes. We enlist for action. Brother, Sister. would you maintain a healthy, happy Christian growth? In the name of the Master, take the truth to others, -win souls. The more we help others, the more we help ourselves. The Lord blesses us only that we may be a blessing to others. The more we feed on His Word, and commune with Him in prayer, and discipline ourselves by the Word, the more anxious will we be to save others. Jesus could not be hid. Let your light shine! Never hide in the house of God!

Be a member of the church in the town or city in which you live, or the nearest church which you can attend. If you are isolated, by all means join the conference church. That is the very purpose of the conference church. You should not join the conference church, though, if you have access to one of our churches. The conference is the easiest church to hide in. It is unavoidably so. Remit tithe and offerings to the treasurer of the church of which you are a member. Follow the regular chan-It is when streams overflow their channels that troubles ensue. Have some little part at least in all the goals to be reached. If, through sickness, you can not be present at the regular quarterly services, report in time to the clerk by letter. Those who unnecessarily absent themselves from the Lord's table, soon become weak and sickly. A well lamb will follow only its master's voice, but a sick sheep will follow anyone. It is important to assemble at the house of God, and "so much the more as ye see the day approaching." keeps many a foot from slipping. Be a worker, not a shirker! Launch out into the deep and let down your net. for a drive. Then report the catch to the missionary secretary.

Every member of the church is supposed to regularly attend the Sabbath school, and to be there on time. Always take your Bible along, and go into the class where the Superintendent asks you. Be willing to take

what part you may be assigned. you move to another city or state, be sure to transfer your membership as soon as possible, -- having the clerk write the clerk of the church where you used to reside, for your letter. Be loyal in all things, and tactfully pass on our good literature to your neighbors. Prayerfully, humbly, cheerfully live the truth, and later on you will hear the Master say "Well Done." Those who 'hide in the house of God' in this world, will also be absent from the assembly of the saints in the new earth, when from Sabbath to Sabbath "all flesh" worship before the Lord. May the Lord help us all to be faithful. Stemple White.

### COMPLETE THE TRAINING COURSE

Those who have been taking the Sabbath School Workers' Training Course are now ready for the closing exercises of the year's work. How satisfying it is to exert one's powers to accomplish something, to see it through to the end, and to win evidence of having accomplished it! Only growing teachers are live teachers. Each year must find the true teacher with keener enthusiasms, renewed purposes, and deeper devotion to this most sacred of all trusts.

Those who have read the textbooks are now asked to write a few paragraphs based upon the subjects studied. This is not a rigid examination, but a proof of your having studied the year's course. On page 2 of the December number of the Sabbath School Worker, ten questions are offered, five on each book, which will furnish topics for your paper. These questions are given so that there may be uniformity of subjects. It is always preferable to use pen and ink. Write on one side of the paper, taking care to make your writing as legible as possible. No restrictions regarding the use of the textbooks in preparing your paper are made so long as quotation marks are used when the words of the text are copied verbatim.

Mail your paper to your conference Sabbath school secretary, who will examine the paper and send to you a certificate issued by the Sabbath School Department of the General Conference, showing that you have completed the Sabbath School Workers' Training Course for the current year.
