A BREAK IN THE RANKS.

A TELEGRAM received at this office last Monday announced to us the sad fact that Brother Daniel Palmer was dead. Brother J. R. Calkins furnishes us the following sketch of his later life.

Last winter Brother Palmer sold his farm, and after donating a large part of the proceeds to the cause of present truth, he and his family went to Battle Creek and attended the minister's school. About the time our canvasser's school commenced, he wrote me offering himself as a canvasser. I wrote him to come on to our school, that we would be glad to have him work with us. He came and decided to move to Bernhard's Bay and canvass the surrounding country. He kept at the work till about the time of the camp-meeting when he wrote that he was sick and wanted help, so two canvassers brethren Tufts and Waggoner left the meeting and went to his assistance. Brother Waggoner soon had to go home, but Brother Tufts staid to the end, and did all that could be done. After camp-meeting they telegraphed for Elders Lane and Place to go and pray with him, but both were out of the State and no other minister near, so myself and wife went to help them. We found him in a serious condition. He was reconciled to die if it was the Lord's will. Sister Palmer is also sick abed.

LOCAL CAMP-MEETINGS.

THE camp-meeting at Potsdam will have commenced by the time most of the readers receive this INDICATOR, as it begins Thursday night, Aug. 16. It will continue ten days, closing Sunday night, Aug. 26. We trust all the families in northern New York will be represented at this meeting. The meeting will be a good one, and all who do not attend will miss a good feast of spiritual things. EXTENT OF OUR WORK.

MORE than 1800 years ago the Seer upon the Isle of Patmos foresaw a message to be given just before the coming of the Lord, to all the world, every nation, kindred, tongue, and people. The fulfillment of prophecy and the condition of the world in general show that the Saviour's coming is near. Is this message, which is recorded in the fourteenth chapter of Revelation, being proclaimed? Seventh-day Adventists believe that it is, and that in the providence of God they have been called to the work of giving this message. The following statements will show to what extent the message has already gone.

They have organized conferences in nearly all the States and Territories of the United States, also Canada, in Central Europe, Norway, Sweden, Denmark, South Africa Australia and New Zealand, besides centers of work in Ontario, Manitoba, British Columbia, New Foundland, Alaska, Mexico, Central America, and the Bay Islands. In the West India Islands the work is in progress at Antigua, Trinidad, Grenada, Hayti, St. Vincent, Bermuda, Bahama Islands, Kingstown, and Bridgetown. The work in South America is represented in British Guiana, Brazil, Argentine Republic, Chili, and United States of Columbia. We also find the work prospering in the following countries: Great Britian, France, Turkey, Italy, Germany, Russia, Austria, Finland, and Iceland. Across the Pacific missions are established in India, China, and Japan.

To carry forward the work among the islands of the Pacific Ocean a missionary ship, the "Pitcairn," was built a few years ago at a cost of some \$20,000. This ship has now made several voyages and located a number of missionaries. Pitcairn, Norfolk, Raiatea, Tahiti, and the Sandwich Islands have each been visited.

The truths of this message are now published in twenty-two different languages, viz Arabic, Bohemian, Bulgarian, Chinese, Danish, English, Finnish, French, German, Holland, Hungarian, Italian, Maori, Portugese, Roumanian, Polish, Prussian, Servian, Spanish, Swedish, Tahitian, and Welsh.—*Southern Review.*
