### NEW YORK CONFERENCE PROCEEDINGS.

**FIRST MEETING.** The first meeting of the thirty-third annual session of the New York Conference was held at Auburn, N. Y., July 27, 1894, at 10 A. M. The president, Elder S. H. Lane occupied the chair. The roll of churches was called, and twenty-one delegates representing eight churches responded. The minutes of the previous session were read and approved. The president then spoke of the progress of the work in this State, and presented many encouraging features in its rapid onward development, which seems to mark every department of the work at the present time. A letter was read from Brother Lorenz with reference to the German work in this State which presented an encouraging outlook for the work among that people.

By vote the chair appointed the committees, which were as follows.

The meeting then adjourned to call of chair.

**SECOND MEETING.** The second meeting was called August 1, at 5 o'clock P. M. Twenty more delegates representing thirteen more churches, responded and took their seats. After the reading of the minutes of the previous meeting, the president spoke of many interesting and encouraging things with reference to the work in this State, which was of a local nature, and among other things he stated that during the last year three new church houses had been erected, all good, neat, and commodious buildings, and well designed to meet the present wants.

By request the church at Ellicottville was received into the Conference by a unanimous vote. Membership, 28. The president stated that the church at Lincklaen Center desired to be taken into the Conference, and after a few timely and impressive remarks by Elder A. E. Place, they were received into the Conference

by a unanimous vote. Membership, 25. The labor for and the organization of the Olean church was then referred to, and a request made for that church to be received into the Conference, which was carried by a unanimous vote. Membership, 36. With a few interesting remarks by the president in regard to God's wonderful opening providence in the development of his work, the meeting adjourned to call of chair.

The third meeting was called to order by the chair, August 2, at 10:45 A. M. Thirty-eight delegates representing twenty-one churches, responded to the roll. The president read a letter from the Middle Grove

church expressive of their love and zeal in the work of God. A letter from the West Pierpont church was also read. The whole tenor of the letter was courage and hope for the success of God's work, and the glorious and final triumph of his truth.

The committee on resolutions being called for, they submitted the following report:—

1. *Resolved*, That we express our heart-felt thanks to the Lord of all grace, for the many manifestations of his love and providence to us as a Conference during the past year.

*Whereas*, the responsibilities of the Conference on account of its rapid growth are increasing; therefore,—

2. *Resolved*, That the Constitution be so amended as to provide for a Vice-president of the Conference.

*Whereas*, The overcrowded condition of the South Lancaster Academy makes it necessary to have increased facilities in order to properly carry on the work; therefore,—

3. *Resolved*, That we cheerfully provide our proportion of the fifteen thousand dollars necessary to build a new dormitory and an addition to the Academy.

Resolution one was spoken to by Elders Place, Lane, and Porter, who spoke of the rapid advancement of the work in this State, and the wonderful workings of a divine providence in the carrying forward of his work in all its various departments; and of the glorious victory that would soon crown the efforts of God's truth and people, and expressed their favor with the resolution.

Resolution two was read and spoken to by Elders Lane and Porter showing the importance of the resolution being adopted and carried out at once.

Resolution three was again read and while under consideration by Elder Porter, the meeting adjourned to call of chair.
