THE MAINE CAMP-MEETING.

Is connection with Elder Covert, president of the Vermont conference, I left the New England camp-ground for the Maine meeting on Friday, Sept. 7. When we left the New England meeting it was running well and all were enjoying a good meeting. Elders Jones and Van Horn arrived on Tuesday, Sept. 4, Elder Covert, the next day. When we reached Bath, Maine, we found the meeting well under way. Brother Mead was present who with the Maine ministers was carrying on the meeting. There are some fifty tents pitched with some two hundred campers. We found an excellent spirit pervading the ground.

The preaching so far has been done by Elders Jayne, Covert, and the writer. The outside attendance has been quite large. Last night (Sunday) the tent which is $60 \ge 90$ feet, could not seat the people. Many extra seats were provided and still many stood up.

It seems very pleasant to be again associated in labor with Elders Covert and Hoffman with whom I labored several years in the Indiana conference. Among the many whom I am glad to meet here is Sister Douglas and children formerly of Jamestown, N. Y. She is still earnest in the truth and has been doing much missionary work in Maine where she lives. There are no believers there but some are becoming interested.

Elders Van Horn and Jones arrive to-day. I start for the Delevan camp-meeting in a day or two; hope to meet many on the ground and enjoy another precious meeting.

Friday morning, August 31, I came to Adams Centre and before the day was past had called upon nearly all of our people living in the village. I began meetings Friday night and spoke four times. Had one social meeting and baptized two sisters. Several from Watertown came to the meetings and remained all through. There were also several present Sabbath from Mannsville church. I was nearly sick while there, but the Lord blessed me so that I had a profitable time, and I trust this was so with all. The Lord is working for the young people there, and I greatly rejoice to see the interest they manifest. May the good work go on in the hearts of all is my prayer.

At the time of this writing, Sept. 3, 4 am near South West Oswego in the house built by my sgrandfather in 1836. A few rods west of here is the home of my childhood. I have spent a portion of the day in walking sthrough the orchard, the meadow, and the wood, that have not seen me for more than twenty years. Some of the "fond recollections" of byegone days are marred by the rapid strides of Father Time. With sadness I wend my way to the high banks overlooking that grand old Lake Ontario. Here the child picture remains unchanged. The bluff with its ragged rocks and hard soil, the beach far below me made up of blue and grey stones worn so smooth by the surging waters which now lie so peacefully there; the large flat rocks extending far out from the shore; the large rock where I fished with my cotton string and pin hook. Shall I tell it all? No, I cannot, "Only this, I forget the changed farm and house and only look out upon the scene before me and all at once the boyish glee comes back. In a moment I have found the gully leading to the shore. I trip lightly down and soon I am once more playing with the pebbles and the water. I run back and forth over the flat rocks with glee, I look out upon the blue waters, I am a boy again and O so happy! as I exclaim, "O what will it be to be there!" But ah, the curtain falls. I am no longer a little boy, and the happy home of my childhood is in the hands of strangers. My father, mother, brothers, and sisters are scattered far away. With a feeling of sadness and loneliness I retrace my steps up the cliff, when the lines from Longfellow, so sacred to me, come to my mind.

> Look not mournfully into the past, It comes not back again;

- Wisely improve the present, it is thine: Go forth to meet the shadowy future

With a brave and manly heart.

Then the Lord speaks, For vet a little while and he that shall come will come; and with joy I repeat, Even so, come Lord Jesus.
