THE DELEVAN CAMP-MEETING.

THIS meeting opened on time. I reached the ground from the Maine camp-meeting on Friday afternoon. The preaching had been done by Elders Place and Ball. Found a goodly number camped on the ground. There are new arrivals by nearly every train. The meeting bids fair to be largely attended by the brethren and sisters living in western New York. There are twenty-eight tents pitched on the ground, which is indeed a beautiful one, composed of some five acres of stately trees, which afford a secure protection against wind and raw cold air. Night after the Sabbath a wind-storm, whose severity we should have experienced perhaps to our disadvantage had we been in an open field, swept over this section, but it was only the song of the storm-rocked leaves which notified us of the tempest. It rained all night and some Sunday forenoon, so much so that but few came onto the ground. In the afternoon it did not rain and people came in from the country and village until our congregation numbered some four hundred, besides our people. In the evening about the same number were present. The best of attention was paid to the word spoken. The order was complete. The social meetings have been excellent. The collection at the Sunday meetings was \$12.50. The grove is lighted by electricity and supplied with good, fresh spring water, but best of all the truth is impressing hearts and creating an interest.
