# Hield Reports.

#### JEDDO, ROCHESTER, AND SYRACUSE.

On my arrival at Rome, from Fulton, Monday, Nov. 18, I found a telegram awaiting me to be at Jeddo, Orleans Co., Tuesday forenoon, to attend the funeral of Minnie Thew. here at 2:21, Tuesday morning, only a little over an hour before the great mail-train accident which occurred about two miles west of When we pulled into Syracuse the mail train was just starting out, and I noticed some of the mail clerks dressing for their expected night of duty; but alas, how often expectations in this life fail. I remember thinking of the grand sight, the ponderous amount of mail matter, and its probable value, etc., little thinking that just a few minutes and that sight would be changed into one of death and Several times I have been just a little ahead, or a little behind a wreck on the road; but for some reason the Lord has not as yet allowed me to take the fatal car. I have great reason to be thankful for this. In taking my seat in the train I feel it a joyful privilege to place myself in the hands and care of my guardian angel, who is able to hold me up. am coming more and more to feel that this is something which ought to be brought into our daily life. We are amid perils on the right hand and on the left, and none are safe one

moment unless "underneath" them "are the everlasting arms."

On my arrival at Rochester I found that I had about three hours to wait for my train to Middleport, and though still dark, I started for 423 Monroe Avenue, where I found Sister Dower and spent what time I could with her in talking over the situation in that city. Her report was quite encouraging. She said she was holding nine Bible-readings each week at present, and some seem to be considerably interested. The little company there who have accepted the truth are also of good courage.

When I reached Jeddo I found that the funeral had been postponed to Wednesday at one o'clock in the afternoon; but I put in quite full time in writing and calling from house to house. Discouragements and trials lie in the path of some; but the general expression seemed to be one of faith and confidence in the Lord. May the Lord give them all wisdom is my earnest prayer. I was pleased to find Brother J. U. Cottrell, and his mother, Sister R. F. Cottrell, in such good health. Brother Cottrell has of late been passing through a severe sickness; but we feel thankful that the Lord has spared him to his family and to the church.

Wednesday night I took the train again, and a little before midnight reached Syracuse, and as I realized that this would be the last opportunity for some time to talk with Brother Gilbert concerning the work in Syracuse, I went to his home and aroused him from sleep, and we spent the most of the remaining part of the night in earnest and careful counsel. He seems to think that the field is ripe for a good work to be done there.

Sabbath, Nov. 23, was spent with the Rome church. Notwithstanding it was a rainy day, we had a good attendance and a profitable Sabbath-school and meeting. Shortly after the Sabbath closed I went to Kirkville and spoke in the Union church. The attendance was small, owing partly to the unfavorable weather; but those present gave good attention to the word spoken. Elder Kinne has been holding a few meetings there at the request of several of the citizens, and we trust that good will be the result. I leave here Tuesday morning for Saratoga and Warren Counties.

#### FALCONER.

I HIRED the village hall of the trustees in this place at one dollar per week in which to hold a series of meetings. When the trustees met they decided not to let me have it, as our meetings would injure the Methodist cause. When the Methodist preacher heard that we were thinking of holding meetings here he started a series of meetings in his church, and used his influence to keep us out of the hall. went to the City Line in Falconer and hired an empty store, and fixed it up so that it is a very pleasant place for meetings. We held our first service Thursday, Nov. 14. The congregations have thus far averaged from twenty to ninety. Last evening I showed the frailty of the Sunday arguments, and at the close a man asked if he might speak. He said that "Christ was crucified Friday; that He was in the grave three days and three nights. Matt. 12:40. and that He was resurrected the first day of Figuring from Friday three days the week. and three nights would bring us to Monday, therefore Monday is the first day of the week, and Sunday is the seventh day, the Sabbath." He then asked for a vote of the congregation. I replied by proving that Christ made the Sabbath, and therefore kept the true one. That He kept the seventh day the same day that the Jews kept. That they have kept it ever since, and that they keep Saturday. fore Saturday was the seventh-day Sabbath that Christ kept, and consequently Sunday is the first day of the week, as every calendar of every nation in the world proves. Therefore if Christ was crucified Friday, the expression, "heart of the earth" in Matt. 12:40 could not mean the grave; but must mean the Roman I then took a vote. power. The congregation all voted in favor of the truth.

Sister Haskins of Denver, Colorado, a licensed missionary of that State, is with us and renders valuable aid in playing the organ and singing. We think there is a good interest to hear the truth. Let us pray and believe that it will increase.

The interest now is somewhat improved and seems to

be gradually increasing. Some seem to be deeply impressed in what has been presented; but the work is not sufficiently developed to judge what the result may be. We hope in God and in His mercy. The work is the Lord's and we leave the results with Him, praying earnestly for His power to be manifested in the hearts of these people. Brethren and sisters, we need your prayers for the work in this field.

The work may not from a financial standpoint be a success, as the past season has been
one of very severe drouth, and as the soil is all
very light and sandy, almost nothing grew; and
what did was quickly devoured by the grasshoppers which swept down on every green
thing. But while they are very poor, they are
honest in heart, and many seem to love the
truth, and still more believe it; but have not
the courage to live out their convictions in the
face of opposition. We hope soon to be able to
report more definite results from this field.
