

Spring Council of the General Conference Committee

The Spring Council of the General Conference committee was held April 29 to May 6. This important meeting had been preceded by an educational council, and also a council of general and union secretaries of the Missionary Volunteer department. The representatives from the Pacific Union Conference attending these important meetings were: C. W. Irwin, president of Pacific Union College; M. E. Cady, educational secretary of Pacific Union Conference; W. W. Ruble, newly elected secretary of the Missionary Volunteer department, and the writer. Undoubtedly the brethren representing the various lines of work in our field will report through the "Recorder" on the work of special interest to them. I will confine myself more specifically to a general survey of the council.

It is evident from the earnest way in which our brethren applied themselves to the problems that all feel the burden of the sacred trust committed to us to plan for the finishing of the gospel work in this generation. Along all lines of our work among the various nationalities the reports gave evidence of the Holy Spirit's power witnessed in the ministry of the men and women who give themselves unreservedly to the furtherance of the gospel. Especially is this true along the lines of the public ministry and the generous circulation of our truth-laden literature by the believers in this message, both in the homeland and in foreign fields.

Elder Prescott, who has just returned from a two-year stay in China

gave a most graphic account of our work among the millions of heathen in the Orient, showing the need of strengthening our frontier lines by sending additional recruits to work with the faithful missionaries now holding forth the banner of truth. His very earnest presentation greatly impressed all who were privileged to be present.

Definite steps were taken to conduct a Bible Conference during the Summer to give careful study to the fundamentals of the third angel's message. It has been many years since such a meeting has been held, and it was thought well, in view of the growth of our work and the fact that many workers have been added to the ranks who are carrying heavy responsibilities, to come apart and with prayer and careful study to know more fully the counsels of God for His church. It is probable that this conference will be held in the central part of the country during the month of July. This important gathering will be followed by an institute for the history and Bible teachers of our colleges, junior colleges and seminaries. At this time when men with bold daring are striking at the very foundations of God's truth, it behooves the remnant church to know the soundness and to see the beauty of God's revealed will, which is the life-giving message for this time.

Now that it is evident that the great world's war has come to a close, urgent requests have come from Europe for representatives to visit

that field. It was voted for Elders Daniells, Knox, and other men as it may seem wise and prudent, to go to Europe for some time during the latter half of 1919. We have been pained by reports that have come to us that schisms have been formed among the believers of the third angel's message in Europe, and that some of our strongest leaders have withdrawn from the general work. We take occasion here to state that our fears have been without much foundation. A few men who have taken an unwarranted position relative to the Christian's duty to his government, and who have felt that as a people we were compromising our liberties, have withdrawn, but the rank and file of Seventh-day Adventists throughout Europe have remained loyal to the principles of truth. This statement is true of all parts of the European field.

Owing to the earnest request from the South American Division Conference, and the desire on the part of Elder Daniells that he visit this great mission field if general conditions permit during the year 1920, it was suggested that our union conferences hold their quadrennial meetings during the latter part of 1919. We shall be able after our union committee session to be held shortly to give definitely the time of our meeting. We feel confident that our brethren are willing to hold this meeting early that we may assist those who are carrying burdens in the larger sphere.

The time for our camp-meetings has come. The first meeting will be at Phoenix, Arizona, May 22 to June 1. A full schedule of camp-meetings will be found in the "Recorder." The Gen-

eral Conference brethren have promised us good help, and in such a time as this nothing can appeal more to Seventh-day Adventists than the importance of earnestly seeking God for a new experience that we may walk worthy of our calling. We trust our brethren and sisters will plan generally to attend these important annual convocations.

The meeting of the General Conference committee which just closed was, withal, a season of earnest, prayerful, unselfish study for the accomplishment of all that God expects of His people at this time. Our opportunities for doing good; our time of service to God and our fellowmen will soon be over. May we arise to the full privileges of this supreme hour in extending the interests of the kingdom of our God.

Colporteurs as Medical Missionaries

We want to tell of the wonderful success and experiences we are having with our good book "Practical Guide" and as some have wondered why there are so many working with this book, and also have suggested that it is a commercial proposition, we will endeavor to give a few reasons why we are working with it.

First we will say that it is one of the books for the times. We have record of several lives being saved during the recent epidemic through the direct results of it. We feel that in view of the statement made by the Medical Research Committee of Great Britain,—“It is unfortunately only too certain that a second and more severe wave of influenza will spread over the world in a few months,” it is still one of the books for the times.

Brother Desmarets writes in that in one day he took orders for "Practical Guide" to the amount of \$93.50. One Sunday upon entering a church the minister immediately called him forward and introduced him to the audience telling them that he was a good man and that he had a book that should be in every home, and also, that when the book was presented to them for each one to purchase a copy. Bro. Desmarets also writes. "One man told me of an experience he had with 'Practical Guide' a few years ago. His mother-in-law who was living in Mexico was very sick. She has been suffering with some throat trouble for several years. The doctors had decided to operate on her, when her son-in-law up here in La Verne, Calif., bought a 'Practical Guide' and cut out some pages treating on her disease and mailed them to her with the result that in a couple of weeks she was entirely healed." With such recommendations as these you can see why Bro. Desmarets can sell books.

Bro. Dale relates many interesting experiences, one or two of which I will give. Mr. Richards, the round house foreman in San Luis Obispo, contracted the influenza and later developed double pneumonia. His wife's brother had at one time been very much crippled with rheumatism

having to use crutches to get around. He got hold of "Practical Guide" and applied the treatment prescribed with the result that he threw his crutches away. When the doctors gave Mr. Richards up saying that he could not live, he applied the treatment prescribed for influenza with the result that Mr. Richards is today back at his old job directing the work at the round-house.

I could tell you how Bro. Dale twice brought himself and his family through the "flu" with the knowledge of treatment that he gained through the study of this book, also how he nursed another "flu" victim back to life, giving him treatments through the night after selling books through the day.

Brethren Nelson and Sauder are having some remarkable experiences in Santa Barbara getting testimony after testimony from those who have the book. One of the very prominent ladies very readily wrote a recommendation for the book, saying that she would not take \$50 for hers if she could not get another.

If space would permit we could go on multiplying these experiences. However, all may see by this something of the work we are doing. Not only are we doing a good work now, but we are laying the foundation for a large and permanent work with our good books treating upon the Bible, as practically each one is planning on reworking their own territory.

Another reason why we are working with a health book is that we believe that we are following the instruction the Lord has given us through the "Testimonies." Let me give some references:—

"The people are in sad need of the light shining from the pages of our health books and journals. God desires to use these books and journals as mediums through which flashes of light shall arrest the attention of the people, and cause them to heed the warning of the message of the third angel." Vol. 7, page 136.

"The indifference with which the health books have been treated by many is an offense to God. To separate the health work from the great body of the work is not in His order.

Present truth lies in the work of health reform as verily as in other features of gospel work. No one branch when separated from others can be a perfect whole."

"While very little respect has been shown to this department by many of the people, and by some of the ministers, the Lord has shown His regard for it by giving it abundant prosperity. When properly conducted, the health work is an entering wedge, making a way for other truths to reach the heart." Vol. 6, page 327.

That "the Lord has shown his respect for it by giving it abundant prosperity" in this field, let me give you a few figures. For the first three months of this year our conference stands with only two conferences in all Pacific Press territory ahead of us. We are now leading this Union by almost \$2000.

Parties, picnics, and school make a very poor combination for real progress especially now that the closing days of the school term are here. Every pupil should be in school every day, and on time, if the best work is done. Each time a pupil is out, the entire class suffers. If parents fully realized this fact, surely not so many would keep their children out for any cause but sickness, nor permit any social affairs to hinder the work of the school.
