The recounting of many blessings received from tithe paying, brings to you dear reader, this wonderful testimony meeting from week to week. Those who have not sent in their experiences, should mail them at once to the California Conference, 537 25th St., Oakland, Calif.

"Punctuality in tithe paying should become a fixed habit" says one, and we now quote from another who also believes this is the best way: "I believe the reason I do so well is because I am faithful in paying an honest tithe on all I earn. As soon as I get home the first thing I do is to put away one-tenth, and not until then do I feel free to spend for my own wants. God sees that I have work while others seem unable to get employment. My money seems to go farther and lasts longer and buys more than it did when I was using ten-tenths. I have kept two of my children in church school and have nearly paid for a lot and a little three-room cottage. At the same time I pay ten dollars a month for the keep of the baby who is too young for school. I give to God the glory."

From another letter we find that tithe paying is the real panacea for all troubles. We quote: "We are never in need for our daily food and clothing. The Lord helps us with health and work and gives his something to help those who are in need. The more we give to help others the more He helps us. Although we are over fifty we still feel and look quite young, and we know if we remain faithful we have the hope to see Jesus come in the clouds of heaven and take us home."

Here is from one whose blessings seem to come in good measure: "It pays to be honest with God. For every dollar given I receive two in return. Sinful though I am, shall I withhold from giving while He gives to me? The blessings received as a result of tithe paying have been many. In activities of life as a laboring man, in ships at sea, in logging camps, in railroad camps and as a housemover, I have never had a mishap, was never discharged on account of keep-

ing the Sabbath, or disabled so as not to perform my duties. I am now seventy and am still active."

A Lesson From Jehoshaphat

The Nevada Conference is passing through a somewhat similar experience to that of ancient Israel in the days of Jehoshaphat as recorded in II Chronicles, chapter 20. We are admonished that these things happened unto them for example unto us and are written for our learning, that we through comfort from the Script tures might have hope.

Israel was face to face with apparent defeat. Two great armies, far out numbering the soldiers of Israel, were encamped against them. There was no hope except as God through His mighty power should bring deliverance. Jehoshaphat cried to God and said, "Our God wilt thou not judge them? for we have no might against this great company . . . Neither know we what to do: but our eyes are upon thee."

Following this prayer came the assurance, "Believe in the Lord your God, so shall ye be established; believe his prophets, so shall ye prosper." "And when he had consulted with the people, he appointed singers unto the Lord, and that should praise the beauty of holiness, as they went out before the army and

to say: Praise the Lord: for his mercy endureth forever."

What a strange act of military tactics it was to place singers in the forefront of the army! but it was an evidence of Jehoshaphat's faith in God's willingness and power to interpose in behalf of His people. The children of Israel had done their full part. They had organized themselves and placed themselves in battle array before the enemy just as though everything depended upon them. Then having done all that lay in their human power to do, they trusted God to bring deliverance. Their faith, was honored with one of the greatest victories recorded in the annals of history.

The lesson is plain. We are not of course attacked by a literal army, vet Satan has contrived to bring about a condition of defeat in the closing of the bank in which were deposited the operating funds of the Nevada Conference. It is beyond our power to cause the bank to re-open its doors and to release the Lord's money. Our only hope is in God, and we know that He will eventually bring deliverance. Meanwhile, like the people in Jehoshaphat's days we must do everything that lies in our human power to meet the present crisis. To this end the Conference Committee were called together and council was sought from the Pacific Union Conference. Plans were laid to go forward with the work now started, believing that the loyal believers in Nevada would rally with additional funds to sustain God's ministers who are earnestly working for the salvation of souls.

The Nevada Conference had never before been in such a prosperous condition and never, were the prospects so bright for a large ingathering of souls. Long had we prayed that a strong evangelist might come to this field who could awaken the city of Reno and turn the hearts of its pleasure-loving people to seek after God. It is evident that Satan foresaw that his camp was about to be invaded and that many of his captives were to be delivered from his power. But the closing of the bank cannot stop our evangelistic efforts so long as God has a loyal, praying, believing people to sustain His cause. His work will go forward. Observations

I believe with all my heart that our first duty as fathers and mothers and as workers in the cause of Christ is to put forth every effort to save our own children and young people. It is my parpose to foster every legitimate way to hold them and to interest them in the things of God. If we could keep all of our young people in the truth, and not

bring in one outside our faith our yearly gains would be far greater than at present. Surely our own children are as precious to us as others, and surely our hearts long to see them in the kingdom of God. Why should we not do all in our power to hold them, and by holding and interesting them save them throughout eternity?

Recently I have been studying with great interest the many statements in the Spirit of Prophecy regarding the influence that the things of nature have upon the mind and heart of the youth. I am surprised at the clear, definite instruction that God has given us along this line, and I am more convinced than ever that properly managed groups of boys and girls should be taken into the great Out-of-Doors, and there, by mingling with the beauties that God has created in the mountains and valleys, and amid the scenes of nature be drawn closer to the One who created it all.

Yesterday I returned from the Southeastern California Conference Junior Camp, held this year at Idyllwild in the San Jacinto Mountains. It was my privilege to spend four days at the camp. I wish that each one of our people could have had the same opportunity. The camp was located in a beautiful meadow on the banks of Strawberry Creek. Towering pine trees covered the meadow, and then forming a background is the great range of the San Jacinto Mountains. Standing out very prominently were the peaks of San Jacinto and Tahquitz.

Nearly sixty girls were in attendance, and the boys' camp, which was held the preceding week had an attendance of seventy-two. Before they were allowed to come they had to meet certain requirements. The requirements are as follows: The age limit is ten to sixteen. They must know and keep the Junior pledge and law. 'The Junior pledge is as follows: "Loving the Lord Jesus and trusting Him to help me, I will try to read my Bible and to pray every day; to be pure, honest, kind, cheerful, obedient, and reverent always; and to take some active part in the work or meetings of our society every week." The Junior law:

- 1. Keep the Morning Watch.
- 2. Do my honest part.
- 3. Care for my body.
- 4. Keep a level eye.
- 5. Be courteous and obedient.
- 6. Walk softly in the sanctuary.

- 7. Keep a song in my heart.
- 8. Go on God's errands.
- (3) The next requirement was that they were to repeat and explain the Ten Commandments, the Twenty-third Psalm, the Lord's Prayer, and the Lord's Promise (John 14:1-3). (4) Have a current Junior Reading Course Certificate. (5) Have a Home Efficiency Certificate: By this is meant a statement from the parents or guardians that the boy or girl has met the standard of home efficiency by taking care of his or her own room, person, and clothes, and by doing well a certain assigned duty over a period of six months. (6) They are to have a Health Habit Certificate. (7) To be able to tie ten knots. (8) To know the eight general directions without the aid of the compass. These requirements were met by each one of the young people before they were admitted to the camp.

The daily program was as follows, and I will tell you, friends, that unless you have been there and entered into the program yourself you calmot comprohand the spiritual atmosphere that seemed to pervade the entire camp. At 6:00 o'clock the rising bell was sounded; 6:20 the Morning Watch was observed, and 6:35 they were divided into their units, going out for their prayer bands. This was especially impressive to me as each little group of five with an adult leader went out into the woods and there sought God for help for the day. Many a victory was gained while those dear young people were on their knees at that early morning hour. Upon their return from the prayer bands their beds were made and their tents cleaned up in preparation for inspection. Everything had to be done just right. Otherwise, they would receive demerits. After inspection came flag raising; following that breakfast, and if you could see those young people marching in quietly taking their places around the table and reverently standing, waiting for grace to be said, it would have touched your heart. Following breakfast, general camp duties were attended to for a time. At 9:00 o'clock camp council was held where they met together and studied over the problems of the camp, making suggestions and receiving counsel; 9:30 vocational instruction by units in camp craft, first aid, and nature study; 10:00 o'clock, swimming in the pool at Idyllwild. The pool was turned over by Mr. Emmerson and Mr. Percival for one hour. During the time no one else was allowed in the pool. At 11:00 o'clock quiet time or rest hour; 12:00 to 12:15, a short time that they could do as they pleased, only remaining within the camp itself. Following dinner camp duties were attended to once more, then a rest hour during which time no one was to make a sound, but all were to remain in their tents resting or writing letters home. the afternoon they received instruction in field and trail work, and other vocational studies. After supper in the evening came the camp fire service. These were always very impressive. Throughout the entire program there was that spirit of quiet reverence that just thrilled one's soul.

A Crisis

Occasionally, in the experience of an individual or organization, we are brought face to face with a serious crisis. Such was the recent experience of the Nevada Conference.

For some months the Nevada Conference Committee has been planning an aggressive evangelistic program throughout the conference, and the brethren were especially anxious to conduct a strong effort in the city of Reno. Elder Phillip Knox, from the Southern California Conference, attended the Nevada camp meeting during the summer of 1928, which was held near Reno. His lectures on astronomy created quite an interest in the churches, clubs, among leading educators, and among townspeople generally. Favorable impressions were made, and many inspiritor have been received as to the possibility of his returning to

Naturally, the conference committee, in arranging for the Reno effort, was anxious to secure Elder Phillip Knox to conduct it. Elder J. H. McEachern, the president of the conference, was instructed by his committee to arrange with the Southern California Conference for his release for a few weeks, and personally to extend to Elder Knox the invitation of the committee to conduct the effort. Elder Knox being willing, the Southern California Conference Committee granted the request for his temporary release.

The Reno' High School auditorium was secured in which to hold the effort, and it was arranged to begin the meetings Sunday evening, July 7. July 5, the bank with which the Nevada Conference has been doing business for a long period of time, failed to open. This situation brought grave concern to the officers of the conference, for how could they carry forward in a strong way, with their

funds tied up? Elder McEachern and his workers faced the situation courageously.

A meeting of the conference committee was called in Reno for Tuesday, July 6. As the committee opened its meeting, a very earnest season of prayer was held, that God would give wisdom in meeting the situation and that He would not permit the enemy, at this critical moment, to defeat the advancement of His work. The committee settled itself into a serious, sober study of the situation. A new budget was worked out for the last six months of the year, and it was found, by effecting the strictest economy possible, with a probable spring in the tithe, the conference can operate and nearly break even by the end of the year. In carrying this economical program into effect, the committee decided to hold week-end meetings, grouping the churches as far as is possible, instead of holding the camp meeting this summer, as was originally planned, as this will mean a saving of several hundred of dollars for the conference. Elder . Knox's effort will be carried on in a strong way by funds which will have to be provided from outside the conference, pending the outcome of the bank situa-

While all regret the bank failure, yet we thank God it did not come a few days later, after the remittances from the churches for June would have also been in and the missions offerings for June would have been tied up. As it was, the offerings to missions from Nevada for June, went forward as usual.

We earnestly request not only the constituency in Nevada, but also all our believers in this Union, to pray God to overrule this situation to the glory of His cause. Also, kindly remember Elder Knox daily before the throne of grace as he is preaching the Word of God in the city of Reno. Our people there are doing all they can in supporting the effort, yet we have only a small constituency and surely they need the prayers of God's people.
