The Santa Cruz church has just finished a yearly cycle of missionary endeavor. Like Paul and his associates, who on their return to Antioch rehearsed before the church all things that God had done with them, we deem it fitting to recount what God has done with us, His humble instruments.

The remittance for the month of December was sent to the Union Conference the first of this week. We had territory enough for another evening, so we all went in together and sang in \$32 to help the Shafter folks on their 60-cents-a-week fund. In territory where we have solicited ten or fifteen dollars, in three evening, we sang in \$75. We are convinced that this is the way to work our residence territory.
