This was their method of approach: Stepping up to a passer-by they would walk beside him and say, "Good morning sir, we are out on our harvest ingathering, collecting money for schools, hospitals and churches, I'm sure you would like to help a little." And then, presenting the box, almost invariably a donation was received. These little missionaries would collect up to \$10.00, sometimes in just a few hours of work. In other towns where this is permitted other children may be trained to do this type of soliciting with success.

Another incident: Some of the boys from the junior college at La Sierra were canvassing in one of the cities of this conference. One of them was arrested for not having a city license; one of the brethren put up \$50.00 bail. I was not in the office at the time, but as soon as I returned I called up the mayor of the city and made an appointment with him, then Brother Kent and I went over and met him. We told him about the trouble the lad was in and asked him to help us. He went on at quite a length to tell us how the merchants of the city must be protected and that is the reason why they have these licenses. The license is Elder W. H. Bradley has opened a prohibitive, costing \$50.00 a week. We

told him it was impossible to pay any such amount as that. He, however, was sympathetic toward us, but did not know just what could be done. Finally, I asked him if he would not call up the city clerk who had placed the charges against the boy and introduce us to him, then we would go over and talk with the city clerk personally. He said he would do better than that; he would go with us and introduce us. By the way, I had known the mayor personally before. He went with us to the city clerk's office and briefly stated our mission after introducing us.

The city clerk knew all about the matter and stated that owing to a city ordinance it was impossible to allow anyone to canvass without having the license. I laid before him and the mayor our worldwide plan of organization and whereas it was true this book was published at Mountain View by the Pacific Press Publishing Association, yet that Association was part of our world-wide church organiaztion, that we had publishing plants in nearly all the countries of the world and that any profits that came from the operation of these plants and the sale of the books went into the world-wide organization. I also explained that the same plan was followed in our sanitarium management and that Loma Linda, with which they were familiar, came under the same plan of organization.

The mayor then started in to talk in a very definite way. Calling the city clerk by name, he told him that he had recently purchased several of our books and that he had taken the books to his home and they had been read over and over again. He told the city clerk that he had never had such books in his home before and that he wished the way could be made open so that every home in that city might have the privilege of purchasing these books for they were the best books he had ever read. (The mayor had bought \$5.50 worth of our small books and I had given him a few months before a complimentary copy of "Great Controversy.")

The city clerk, when he saw the mayor's attitude and heard the mayor's speech of commendation in favor of our books, began to thumb through his book of ordinances and stated that he thought maybe there was an ordinance under which we could sell inasmuch as the church as an organization was receiving any profits that might be made. The mayor asked him if he would dismiss the charge against the boy and he said he would. many children in the public schools. We finding it closed on that day. Pray for

He also asked him if he would see that the \$50.00 bail was returned and he answered that he would and also that in the future our colporteurs would be unmolested.

We thanked the mayor and he left. The city clerk then took Brother Kent and me to the police officer in charge of licenses and we told him the story and he asked that Brother Kent furnish him with the names of those selling our books in the city and said that in the future when complaint were lodged by policemen on their beats, or by individuals, that he would check the name with those he had on his list and would dismiss the charge immediately.

We presented both the prosecuting attorney who dismissed the charge and the police officer with copies of "Our Times." It seems to me that this is as thrilling a story as we hear from the foreign fields of how the Spirit of God works upon the hearts of city officials to open the way for our colporteur work.

Another incident: A few days ago, Brother Kent and Brother Carl Gober were canvassing over the other side of Loma Linda in the neighborhood of Redlands Junction. They called at the home of a lady and mentioned the name of the book for which they were canvassing. She said, "Yes, I have seen that book advertised," and went and got some of our twenty-five cent books and showed them the advertising of "Our Times." She had purchased the small books at the time of the Big Week campaign and had read them carefully and informed Brother Kent and Brother Gober that she believed everything she had read including the seventh-day Sabbath, the state of the dead, and every other doctrine that was told there. We believe she will take her stand with this people.

Pray for these dear colporteurs as they go from door to door that God may richly bless them and give them fruitage as a result of their labors.
