"Avert The Crisis"

The following letter from Elder Shaw. treasurer of the General Conference, sets forth in a strong way the importance of the Week of Sacrifice. Let us all cooperate to "avert the crisis" which Brother Shaw refers to. Read his letter. Pray. Give.---I. E. Fulton.

"Dear Brother:

"I write you at this time regarding the Week of Sacrifice Offering to be received in our churches on Sabbath. November 28. It is important that we get this offering under promotion in all our churches very early. I thought you might like to know the plan of promotion that we expect to put in full operation before going to Autumn Council.

"First, we are appealing to all of our workers in all of our institutions and conferences to give one week's salary to the Week of Sacrifice fund. Much will depend upon the leadership of our union and local conference presidents in carrying this out. One week's sacrifice by our workers in North America would amount to about One Hundred Thousand Dollars. If we could add to that a similar amount from our people who are not employed by the denomination, it would enable us to hold every missionary at his fice as shall not only hold our work inpost.

"It was wonderful how our workers responded to the first Week of Sacrifice offering in 1922. It averted a crisis in our work. We believe it will do the same at this time, for this is God's work and it must be maintained and strengthened in all the earth. No doubt you have it in mind to take this up with each worker in your field, and also with your churches, that they may seriously take it upon their hearts and do their utmost in the way of sacrifice.

"Brother Spicer and Brother Evans and one or two other General Conference brethren will have articles in the indicated your deep interest in the cause

Review on the Week of Sacrifice. On the back page of the Review there will appear short articles, one for each Sabbath, to be read in our churches on the Sabbaths leading up to the date of the offering so that our people may be wellinformed. These same readings will be sent to our church elders in mimeograph form. We wish our union and local conference presidents would put on such promotion through their papers and in their churches as will make the offering what it ought to be.

"The Advent band are with Christ in sacrifice. They are giving themselves and their money. They are sending and supporting their missionaries in all parts of the world. Their giving and gathering of funds in these times of depression is an outstanding miracle and an evidence of their spirit. They plan to hold their soul-winning workers at their posts around the world. We expect the forthcoming Week of Sacrifice to surpass any in our history because the needs of the cause are greater. We are asking our people everywhere to do their utmost through self-denial and sacrifice, that the very spirit that moved Jesus in His earthly ministry may dominate their lives and make possible such self-denial and sacritact in these troublous times but cry out for a new advance in every land.

"For your benefit I am giving you a statement of the Week of Sacrifice in vour Union and conferences for the years 1928, 1929, and 1930:

Season's Greeting Cards

Professor O. J. Graf, formerly one of our prominent educational leaders, has written in on the topic of using Christmas and Season's greeting cards and making Christmas gifts, feeling that word should go out to our people far and near discouraging the custom on account of the times in which we live, and the need of using all the funds possible for missions. The brother is so concerned that he is thinking of sending word by air-mail or wire to our leaders in Washington that something might be said in the Review and Herald on this topic. Is not this good counsel, dear brethren and sisters of the Pacific Union?

Professor Graf sends the resolution passed by the two Loma Linda churches on this matter. They are as follows:

"In view of the distressing needs all about us, the critical condition of our mission treasury, and the possible necessity of calling workers from the mission fields, we, the members of the Loma Linda churches, have determined as the holidays approach to economize in every way possible. We are therefore resolved:

"First: Not to send out any expensive Christmas or New Year cards, and none of any kind to Adventists who will have an opportunity to learn of this move to save for missions.

"Second: To refrain from making expensive gifts and as far as possible and expedient, to come to an understanding with friends and relatives that no gifts will be given or received. That gifts to our own children be useful and inexpensive.

be placed in a separate fund to be known as the Christ Self-denial Fund and devoted to God's great mission work."

Shall we not all decide to refrain from sending out these sometimes expensive cards and place in the mission treasury what might accrue? This brother suggests that possibly \$50,000 a year is spent throughout the world by our people in this custom. \$50,000 would be a wonderful sum just now to go into our mission funds, and every five, ten, or twenty-five cent piece used in this custom might be saved.

"How Much Owest Thou Unto My Lord?" Luke 16:5

Yea! How much? "In Him we live, and move, and have our being." "Every good gift and every perfect gift. . . cometh down from the Father of lights." "All things come of Thee, and of Thine own have we given Thee." Then how much do we owe?

We may attempt to answer the question by saying, "We owe Him everything we now possess." But that does not answer the question. Such an answer has to do with the short space of life here on this earth and with the material things that, evtn if given to God, will be consumed in the fires of the last day. True, our means and possessions, if given to Him, will be used by God to further His cause in the earth, but they will not be preserved and taken to heaven. They will finally be consumed on the earth.

How much, then, do we really owe our Lord? We might say we owe our Lord all we possess here and our affection and love and praise throughout eternity, and with this we may think we have answered the question. So far as our present human vision extends, we have answered the question; and yet on that other shore, with vision divinely enlightened, we shall see, not through a glass darkly as now, but with ever-expanding vision we shall see clearly and anew from day to day added reasons for lifting our voice in praise for the redemption He gave, and thus in acknowledgment of our unspeakable, but joyous, debt. The more we pay on this debt by praise and acknowledgment, the more we shall see to call forth our renewed praise and acknowledgment of indebtedness to Him.

Dear friends, the question will never be answered because we will never have found, even in eternity, all the reasons for praise to Him on account of the great debt He assumed for us. And yet, we should answer that question so far as our present responsibility is concerned, and make efforts to contact every public- our responsibility covers the things of

this life only. There is a very material and present side to the question, as well as a deeply spiritual and eternal one. God has ordained that man here in this life shall recognize obligation to Him and shall meet that obligation to the full extent of his ability to do so.

He tells us we have robbed Him in tithes and offerings. Then we are certainly under obligation to pay again what we have robbed. In the light of this, let us ask ourselves, "How much do I owe my Lord? Is there any unpaid tithe in my possession of money, of goods, or property of any kind?"

Have you inherited property that has not been tithed? Do you now have property, or other possessions, that were acquired before you knew the privilege and obligation of tithing? Are you a trader and are you increasing, or have you increased, your goods so that now your equities and possessions are greater than before, and have you failed to render to God His own on the gains you have made? You may say, "Oh, but I do not know how I stand: I cannot know how much I have made till I sell for cash. I have no way of computing the tithe." Is it not a bit peculiar that on each transaction made, if trading through a dealer, you have somehow been able to make settlement of his five per cent on a fixed and recognized sum, and that you have been willing to pay the five per cent, which, of itself, is a tentative acknowledgment that you bettered yourself at least that five per cent or more, and yet you cannot make any payment

of tithe whatever? Would it not be safe to at least recognize between yourself and God that it has been to your advantage to trade as well as to recognize that same thing between yourself and the real estate dealer? Why not make the matter a subject of earnest prayer, asking God, "How much do I owe?" Then search your heart and search your possessions of every sort and see if anything that is holy is hidden among your stuff. When you have found and given full material answer to the question, you may then claim the promise of such blessing from God that you cannot receive it. Unless full answer is found and given, God must fulfill the other promise of a curse with a curse. May God help us to know how much we owe here and now to our Lord, and may He help each of us here and now to make settlement with Him in full.

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Southern California Sabbath Schools

There are at the present time fiftythree Sabbath schools in the Southern California Conference, with a total membership of 6,527. There are 417 members of the Home Division, and the donations from the Home Division last quarter amounted to \$1,169.35. The total donations from our Sabbath schools in Southern California, for the quarter ending September 30, amounted to \$23,-610.21. The number who have studied their lesson every day and attended Sabbath school every Sabbath on time was 1,234. Seventy-five ribbons were issued this quarter for those who had kept up this record for one year. Thirty-one bookmarks were issued to those who had kept up a perfect record for a period of more than one year.

One feature that is very encouraging to the Sabbath school Department is that during the quarter ninety-seven were baptized. It will also be interesting to know that there are sixteen Sabbath schools who reached their membership goal; twentythree Sabbath schools reached 30 cents per week per member; twenty-one reached 40 cents per week per member; six Sabbath schools doubled their thirteenth Sabbath goal-one gave \$4.00 per member and one \$6.00 per member for thirteenth Sabbath.

What a wonderful work our Sabbath schools can do. If every member of the church were attending regularly, how much this might be increased. It is interesting and also startling when we stop to think that two-thirds of the church membership have made this Sabbath definitely seen the Lord's hand guiding school record. We have just finished our Harvest Ingathering campaign with the church school children. Our schools had taken a goal of \$2,000 to be raised by October 30. We are happy to say that over \$2,400 has been reported to date, and no doubt there will be some more coming in. The money has been only a small part of the returns of this campaign. The children have been learning real lessons of faith and answered prayer as they have gone from door to door, and and caring for them in their work. Nowhere else except in a Seventh-day Ad-
