Register and Vote

Vote for Local Option, November 3, 1936.

The first victory for Local Option was won by the dry forces, the measure will be on the November ballot. But the real battle has only begun. Every true temperance soldier should line up on the side of right.

Local Option Amendment

The proposed Constitutional Amendment, a Local Option measure, will be placed on the November 3 ballot, and if carried, will repeal Section 22, Article XX of the Constitution of California. It will also give cities, towns, counties, incorporated and unincorporated territory, the right and power to regulate or prohibit the liquor traffic within their respective boundary lines.

If this Amendment is approved by the voters and becomes law it will be a step in the right direction and we shall be happy. It seems that is all we can reasonably expect this year.

Must Register To Vote

We have a strong, deceptive, well-financed enemy, the liquor traffic, to fight, but we can win if all will do their part at the polls next November 3.

Your influence and vote is important. But remember you cannot vote if you have not registered since January 1, 1936. registered this year, if you have moved your residence. In that case be sure to re-register.

Time To Register

At this late date the only time you can register is from August 26 to September 24. Because of the State primaries, August 25, all registration places are now closed, but will be open August 26 on to midnight of September 24. The law requires that all registration closes forty days prior to the general election, which is Tuesday, November 3, this year. So | virtue?

A Serious Trend

We would call attention to what we think to be a very serious situation, and wish that all of God's people would study what we set forth in this short article.

Our church statistics show very plainly that Seventh-day Adventists, in some parts of the field especially, are not reading our denominational books as heretofore. It has always been pointed out that those who have been brought into the truth through reading usually make the staunchest Seventh-day Adventists of any, and that those who come into the truth in other ways, through the preaching of the Word and through Bible studies, must, of necessity, be readers of our denominational books; else they do not become strong Adventists. And we claim it is a most serious trend when our people are turning away from the reading of our denominational books. It is a fact that numbers of our new Sabbath keepers have very few of our message filled books in their homes. This is truly a grave matter.

Special instruction has been given us by the Spirit of the Lord in regard to the importance of the study of our denominational books. I quote:

"The light was given that Thoughts on Daniel and the Revelation,' 'The

Church Missionary Service Topic for Sabbath, August 22 "Organizing for the Harvest Ingathering.

Great Controversy,' and 'Patriarchs and Prophets,' would make their way. They contain the very message the people must have, the special light God had given His people. The angels of God would prepare the way for these books in the hearts of the people.

"Oh, how much good would be accomplished if the books containing this light were read with a determination to carry out the principles they contain. There woud be a thousandfold greater vigilance, a thousandfold more self-denial and resolute effort. And many more would now be rejoicing in the light of present truth."

Again we read:

"Fathers and mothers, obtain all the help you can from the study of our books and publications. . . . Form a home reading-circle, in which every member of the family shall lay aside the busy cares of the day, and unite in study."-"Counsels to Teachers," p. 138.

We have a wealth of literature in this denomination, and Seventh-day Adventists should be familiar with our leading books, and they should be studied. It is truly tragic when God's people turn away from the reading of our books to the radio or to other matter that may be unimportant. The Scripture tells us to give attendance to reading. It also tells us to study to show ourselves approved. There is grave danger that we turn away from a very important exercise, namely the reading of our books, and become occupied in a thousand nothings. In the days of Josiah God's people had lost sight of the reading of God's word, and the Book of the Law was discovered. The young king proclaimed the importance of reading the book and it was read in the hearing of the people. As the result of this study a great revival was started.

Today there is grave need that we find the book and that we study. In one conference in our union as low as 30 cents per capita is shown as the amount spent on our denominational books. We are throwing out a danger signal. We would like for all of God's people to take heed. J. E. FULTON.

A Good Report

It is a pleasure to report that the amount sent in for the Midsummer Offering for missions totaled \$2,540.15, a gain of \$839.59 over 1935. No doubt considerable more will come in from the churches in this month's remittance. We thank all who had a share in this offering and trust it will, in the hands of the Lord, accomplish new advancements for the truth.

Now that we have reached the halfway mark in the year, each church should carefully check up its record of mission offerings and lay definite plans to reach forty cents a week per member for 1936. At the present time our conference stands at 23 cents per member in its giving to missions. This is 17 cents short of the General Conference goal. However, the best part of the year is before us, and if every church will enter heartily into the Harvest Ingathering and at the same time give liberally through the Sabbath school and uphold all other mission offerings as they come, we shall have a fine chance of placing the Southeastern California Conference in the list of those who have raised a full forty-cents-per-member for missions for every week of the year.

Let all remember that we are living on the verge of the finishing of God's work on the earth. It is nearer completion than we realize. World conditions clearly indicate that time is short, and the church member is short-sighted indeed who does not realize that his offering for missions is accomplishing more for the salvation of souls than at any time since he accepted the truth. The time has come when we all should be so consecrated to God that everything we possess will be on the altar. Let us remember these words from the servant of the Lord: "Those who are truly converted will regard themselves as God's almoners, and will dispense, for the advancement of the work, the means He has placed in their hands. If Christ's words were obeyed, there would be sufficient means in His treasury for the needs of His cause. He has entrusted to men and women an abundance of means for the carrying forward of His lukewarm in His work? plan of mercy and benevolence. He bids His stewards of means invest their of His mouth?

News Items

Seven persons were recently baptized at the Lodi German church by Elder Huenergardt.

The Oakland young people were out three times in a singing band, before the Ingathering campaign was launched in the church. They had good results, and are aiming to reach their goal in a short time.

Elder and Sister Howard Curran are surely getting the Stockton church out in early Harvest Ingathering service. The church has already raised \$600 or more of their goal. By the first week of August they had called on about sixty business men. More than 50 per cent of those approached increased their offerings by 100 per cent and some 300 per cent or more. "We have about thirty \$10 donations, a couple \$25 donations, and about fifteen \$5.00 donations," writes Elder Curran. At the consecration service on August 1 a goodly number signed up for active work. They are aiming to finish the work in two months' time.

"I don't wonder that the missing members have dropped from 50 to 12," said

Elder E. B. Hare, Sabbath school secretary, "for I like to go to Vallejo myself. There's something about it-it feels like consecrated enthusiasm. It surely is contagious." With pleasure we welcome Vallejo into the ranks of Pennant Sabbath schools, bringing up the number to 22 for last quarter. In 1934, with a membership of 130 they gave \$210 per quarter; in 1935, 138 members averaged \$221 per quarter; but in 1936, with a membership of 169, the donations jumped to \$411. And for the second quarter of 1936 they gave \$509.30, or a per capita of 27.7 cents. Little wonder that the missing members have dropped from 50 to 12. The Sabbath before General Conference began the Vallejo Sabbath school had the pleasure of having Sister L. Flora Plummer meet with them.

Our treasurer reports a spendid gain in both tithe and missions offerings during July. The total tithe was \$16,978.39, representing a gain of \$3,854.76 over July of last year. Our July mission offerings were \$6,754.03, or a gain of \$1,171.26 over July of last year.
