#### Let Us Build

In Elisha's day there was a pressing need for a larger and better school building. In order to attain satisfactory results, it was necessary to have the cooperation of all concerned.

In Southeastern California we are facing a similar situation with some of our church schools. In some cases the enrollment has made such a satisfactory gain that, like Samuel's school, the place is altogether too "strait" for us. Furthermore, quite a number of the buildings in use were not built in harmony with present ideas of lighting, heating, and convenience. These buildings have done good service in their day; but has not the time come to provide good, substantial, wellplanned buildings?

There is another type of building work that should receive attention and be carried on parallel with the work in wood and stucco. I refer to the matter of further building up our school enrollment. We have a good staff of consecrated and trained teachers. Our enroll= ment continues systematically to increase year by year. With the best that we have done, however, we have only about 60 per cent of the children of church school age enrolled in our own schools. These girls and boys are gradually and systematically having built into their lives a desire to live like Christians. It is a characteristic of human nature to develop as we are trained. This is evidenced by the fact that last year about one-third of the baptisms in the conference were of girls and boys in the upper grades of the church school.

If we had the remaining six or seven hundred children in church school the same average would have given a number of baptisms equal to one-half of all those baptized. As it is, these children are being trained for this world only. The one contact of Sabbath school and church weekly cannot in most cases counteract the influence of the rest of the week.

We are just starting the second semester's work. It is a good time for some pupil to start church school. Shall we not each try definitely to be hunters and W. L. AVERY.

#### Lynwood Academy

Things are moving at the Lynwood Academy. The cafeteria building is enclosed now, the doors and windows are in, the roof is on, plumbing is roughed in, and the cement floor in the first story will soon be laid.

This will be a beautiful and serviceable building 128 feet long and 56 feet wide, and a kitchen 40 feet square at the west end.

The first floor will be divided into classrooms to be used for domestic science, nursing classes, sewing, etc. The second floor will be used as a cafeteria for the camp meeting, and during school time part of the room will be used as a school cafeteria. For the present year a part will be used as an assembly room.

administration building. By the time this is read the first or subfloor will be laid and very soon the building will be taking on real proportions.

Reports show that a little better than \$10,000 of the \$25,000 to be raised by the churches for this administration building is raised and has been sent in to the conference.

The \$25,000 that the conference was to raise and put in with the money from the churches is all in hand, and will be paid out dollar for dollar as the money comes in from the churches.

At a recent meeting of the finance committee with the building committee, it was voted to request the churches to complete the raising of the remaining \$15,000 to be raised by the churches by the last of March. The conference committee, the finance committee, and the building committee have agreed that the building will proceed only as fast as the cash is in hand; and at any time that the funds are used up, the building immediately stops.

The money furnished by the conference is available with the money furnished by the churches only on the dollar for dollar basis. In other words, at the present time there is only \$10,000 available from the churches and \$10,000 available from the conference; or a total of \$20,000 dollars available at this time for work on the administration building. If that should be all used up, work on the building would have to stop. However, we feel certain the money will come in from the churches fast enough so the entire amount will be available by the last of March and work will not have to stop until the building is completed.

We are told in the Spirit of prophecy that "nothing is of greater importance than the education and training of our children and young people" and that "school buildings are as important as church buildings."

Let us continue our efforts until this school plant is completed, and our young people given the opportunity of the very best education, given in harmony with W. W. RUBLE. God's great plan.

I quote one of the actions passed by the conference constituency in session January 13.

Surely this was a most fitting action for the delegates of all of our churches to take. As a people we have been lukewarm. We have done only a small part of what we might have done to advance the work of God. It was the desire of every delegate present that the spirit of this resolution should take hold of the hearts of our people in every part of the state, and that there should be such a revival of evangelism as we have never before witnessed. It can be so if we put ourselves to the task. We must make it so.



#### Another Baptism at Lodi

After the Christmas and New Year holidays were over, the Voice of Prophecy evangelistic group returned to Lodi to gather the gleanings after the campaign which they conducted there from September to December. At the time of closing the effort December 19, 166 souls had been baptized. On returning to Lodi, Elder Richards discovered that a decided interest still remained to be cared for.

On January 7, meetings were commenced in the auditorium of the High School, with an attendance of about 800 people. After a few nights of preaching altar calls were made and scores of people came forward for prayer. From these, another baptismal class was formed. On the night of January 24, in the English Seventh-day Adventist church, we witnessed the baptism of another forty-four precious souls.

Among those baptized are a number of backslidden Adventists, some of whom have been out of the church for fifteen. twenty, and more years. In some instances they were smoking and drinking and were recognized as hardened cases. There has also been the joyful experience of many of the unsaved children and young people of Adventist families experiencing conversion and joining the church.

A woman had prayed for husband and sons for long years. It was a precious sight to see father and three strong young men go down into the baptismal waters together.

A good sister who accepted the message was threatened by her husband if she went forward. Yet she and her young daughter were there together and looked supremely happy as they were buried in baptism and thus took their stand with God's remnant people.

On the Sabbath it was a grand sight to see sixty souls accepted into the German church at one time, as they stood before the congregation. On the previous Sabbath upwards of one hundred had been similarly taken into the English church.

One lady corresponding with our radio office said, "An angel has passed through Lodi." We believe she is right. Pray for the work of the Voice of Prophecy, both on the air and on the platform. And don't forget that any-


Many, many other interesting things are renewing and strengthening their work with the Signs of the Times.

S WE enter the shadowed portals of 1938 we all know in our hearts that we have begun to live in a great new time, in a period of history more tense, more perilous than ever, and preg-

nant with terrific possibilities.

The stupendous happenings of the past few months have not only changed the face of the earth, the map of the world, and the destiny of untold millions; they have altered the balance of power, turned the course of political thinking into new and unexpected channels, uprooted a thousand ancient landmarks, and set mankind adrift again upon a wild, uncharted sea.

"There has been a huge transformation of all former proportions and values in world affairs," writes that veteran author and editor, J. L. Garvin. "A new epoch has opened. We must be guided by a new sense of relativity; and let us see well to it that we are so guided in time."

But all these dangerous issues -even the Spanish civil war and the problems of Palestine-have shrunk into insignificance before the tremenBritish battleships plow through raging seas in the Mediterranean, where England is holding fast her "life line" to India and Australia.

dous new issues breaking open before our eyes in the Far East.

And what we see today, fearful and ominous as it is, is but the gigantic prelude of a development unparalleled in the annals of man-the establishment by one nation of political and economic ascendancy over the whole vast resources of the most populous country on earth, the uniting of the yellow races in one huge hegemony controlling more than one fifth of the population of the globe.

#### YELLOW PERIL LOOMS

"The Emperor is marching from the Island of the Rising Sun," writes General Sir Ian Hamilton. "His fighters drink up the great rivers of China. The smoke of their bombs makes dark the air. His road is clearly marked-Hankow, Hong Kong, Singapore, Bhamo, Burma, Assam, Bengal. That is the prospect if nothing is done. Nothing less than Europe can definitely hold up the army."

The so-called bogey of the yellow peril, so long laughed to scorn by many, is actually taking form and substance before us!

"World peace," according to Admiral Nobumasa Suyetsugu, Japan's home minister, "awaits the liberation of the passing of democracy.

colored races from the shackles of white supremacy." "I am determined," he says, "to eliminate all obstacles, whatever they may be, in attaining this sacred mission. The white races should not carry on trade in the Far East based solely on their own self-interest. A three-power entente of Japan, China, and Manchukuo can alone establish peace in East Asia. Whether or not this means the immediate exclusion of the white races constitutes one of the most serious questions facing the world."

The "kings of the East" have clearly prepared their program. And they are not only marshaling their forces to accomplish it; they are already sending them into battle, with sweeping victories that have amazed the world.

Thus the very developments that Seventh-day Adventists, for many

years, have said would take place before the end are now-on a scale far beyond our feeble imaginingscoming to pass in grim and terrible reality.

And if, besides looking at the Far East, we consider the rise of the new autocracies of the Right and Left in Europe, the alliance of the Fascist powers, the


