WHAT OF YOUR INFLUENCE?

Some think little of the influence of their acts on others. "No man liveth to himself." Our daily life, our kind or unkind words, our loyalty to those over us, or our criticism of them, have all a blessed or a blasting influence on others. The judgment day only can reveal the results.

"Every soul is surrounded by an atmosphere of its own,—an atmosphere, it may be, charged with the life-giving power of faith, courage, and hope, and sweet with the fragrance of love. Or it may be heavy and chill with the gloom of discontent and selfishness, or poisonous with the deadly taint of cherished sin. By the atmosphere surrounding us, every person with whom we come in contact is consciously or unconsciously affected.

"This is a responsibility from which we cannot free ourselves. Our words, our acts, our dress, our deportment, even the expression of the countenance, has an influence. Upon the impression thus made there hang results for good or evil which no man can measure. . . .

"That our influence should be a savour of death unto death is a fearful thought; yet this is possible. Many who profess to gather with Christ are scattering from Him. This is why the church is so weak. Many indulge freely in criticism and accusing. By giving expression to suspicion, jealousy, and discontent, they yield themselves as instruments to Satan...

"They do not realize that these sad wrecks of character are the work of their own unbridled tongues and rebellious hearts. It is through their influence that these tempted ones have fallen. So frivolity, selfish indulgence, and careless indifference on the part of professed Christians, are

turning away many souls from the path of life. Many there are who will fear to meet at the bar of God the results of their influence." "Christ's Object Lessons," pp. 339-341.

"God takes men as they are, with the human element in their character, and then trains them for His service if they will be disciplined and learn of Him. The root of bitterness, envy, distrust, jealousy, and even hatred, which exists in the hearts of some church members, is the work of Satan. Such elements have a poisonous influence upon the church. 'A little leaven leaveneth the whole lump.' The religious zeal which is manifested in a raid upon brethren, is a zeal not according to knowledge. Christ has nothing to do with such testimony."—Vol. 4, p. 489.

"Those who hold responsible positions in the church may have faults in common with other people, and may err in their decisions; but notwithstanding this, the church of Christ on earth has given to them an authority that cannot be lightly esteemed." *Id.*, p. 17.

With such timely instruction as the above, does it not behoove us to be more careful of our every act, that we do not exert an influence that shall drive souls the wrong way? Our gloom and discontent, our "words, our acts, our dress," how we follow the instruction of the Lord in regard to health reform—all these things influence not only ourselves, but others as well. Frivolity, leading lives for self, and engaging in amusements of a questionable character all hurt not only our own souls and our children, but others outside our own fold. How careful our conduct should be!

East Los Angeles Church Dedication

Two-hundred fifty members friends of the East Los Angeles church arose to their feet in reconsecration at the conclusion of the dedicatory sermon by Elder J. E. Fulton, on Sabbath afternoon, December 31. While all were standing in this personal dedication of their own lives, Elder Voth offered the dedicatory prayer, setting apart the church building, free from debt, to the cause of God.

Sixteen years ago, in 1932, eleven Sabbathkeepers banded together as a company, and were later organized as the Belvedere Gardens church in 1925, according to the history related by Elder Wm. Guthrie, who was pastor there from 1930 to 1936.

In 1927 a tabernacle was built in which evangelistic meetings were conducted by Elders Rich, Parmele, and Sage, then in 1934, Elder Richards held a series of meetings there at which time 27 new members out of the 93 baptisms, were added to this organization.

Elder Spear began meetings in 1936, and from the many baptisms as a result of his efforts, the present membership of the East Los Angeles church, as it is now called, numbers 250.

The main auditorium will seat about 350, there is a pleasant and appropriate room for young people's meetings, a kindergarten room, and the two church school rooms, which will also serve the junior and primary divisions on Sabbath,

Special Loma Linda Food Sale

I am sure all of our churches will be happy to learn that the Loma Linda Food Company is planning another food campaign for this conference. They have set aside the months of January and February for this special effort. Discounts totalling 40 per cent from the regular retail prices will be allowed by the company. Twenty per cent of this amount will be passed to the conference by the food company when all accounts are settled. This amount will later be sent on to the various churches in proportion to their business, to be used for the benefit of church schools or other church projects as may be determined. During the last campaign over \$500 was turned back to the churches. This year we should make it \$1,000. The remaining 20 per cent will provide a discount of 10 per cent to our people who buy the foods, and 10 per cent will be available to the church to cover expenses.

Tucson is leading all the churches in the number of persons taking the couse. They report the number as thirty-two. Yuma reports fourteen. Buckeye reports four having completed the course. Several in Phoenix are waiting for their certificates. Others are taking the course by themselves because of their isolation. Prescott holds the record for the largest number awarded certificates. Eleven of our brethren and sisters finished the course with high honors.

Recent Educational Actions

The Pacific Union Conference Educational Board at its annual session passed several important actions, some of which are of general interest. A few of these are given herewith:

"TEACHING THE SPIRIT OF PROPHECY

"WHEREAS, our academies should offer and require the subject of the Spirit of prophecy, and

"WHEREAS, the half unit of the 3½ years of Bible now required has not

been definitely defined,

"WE RECOMMEND, that, in addition to Old Testament History, New Testament History, and Bible Doctrines, we require the Spirit of prophecy as a half-year subject in the eleventh year.

"WE RECOMMEND FURTHER, that we make available to be used wherever possible, one-half unit of Denominational History."

"PRIVATE TUTORING

"Where private tutoring during the summer period is necessary, proper authorization may be granted on the following basis:

"1. Only teachers holding secondary teachers' certificates from the General Conference Educational Department, preferably teachers regularly employed during the school year, be acceptable for summer school work.

"2. Only one academic subject be completed during one summer session. This equivalent would require at least ninety hours' recitation in the presence of the teacher in classes of five or less, and one hundred and twenty hours' class recitation in the presence of the teacher for classes of six or more. All time for study by students is to be in addition to above time.

"3. All summer tutoring by teachers connected with an accredited academy must be arranged for by the principal and academy faculty where academy credit is to be granted. All other authorization for private tutoring must be secured through the Union Conference Educational Department and credits issued by the Union Department. That no grade higher than 'B' be granted or accepted for privately tutored credits as outlined above."

"WHEREAS, We are instructed in the Spirit of prophecy to teach the correct use of the voice and to instruct young people to play skillfully upon instruments of music, and

"WHEREAS, Music was made to Hilo

serve a holy purpose in the schools of the prophets which schools we are to emulate in these last days, and

"WHEREAS, Music instruction in secular schools does not serve this purpose, but is becoming more and more linked with the drama;

"WE THEREFORE RECOMMEND

"(1) That our young people be given special encouragement to study music with the teachers in our own institutions,

"(2) That our institutions may accept credit from private music teachers according to the accomplishment of the student as agreed upon by the institution and after the student has pursued musical studies in the academy or college for one year.

"(3) That the standard of music be raised to include only the best of secular

material,

"(4) That special emphasis be placed

upon sacred music,

"(5) That interest in sacred music be stimulated among our pupils by holding festivals of sacred music next spring at which time schools in neighboring communities unite in forming one great chorus."

"CLASS PINS

"WHEREAS, the expenses of the Senior Class are a burden to some of the members of the class, and

"WHEREAS, our academies do not offer finishing courses where class pins

might be allowable, and


"WHEREAS, the students finishing in our academies will continue their education in the higher institutions where finishing courses are granted;

"WE RECOMMEND, that the purchase of class pins by our graduating classes in the academies be disapproved."
