to a living human body with its members. a seer." 1 Sam. 9:9. A seer is one who The figure is very applicable although it cannot be carried out in every detail.

Unity of the Body, the Church

The apostle Paul declares, "For as the body is one, and hath many members, and all the members of that one body, being many, are one body: so also is Christ. For by one Spirit are we all baptized into one body. . . . Now are they many members, vet but one body. . . . Ye are the body of Christ, and members in particular." 1 Cor. 12:12-14, 20, 27.

Note the emphasis placed on the oneness of the body. Many members but all working in perfect harmony, unity, as one. That is God's plan for His church. Christ prayed, "That they all may be one." John 17:21. "There should be no schism in the body." 1 Cor. 12:25. "They shall be my people, and I will be their God: and I will give them one heart, and one way." Jer. 32:38, 39. Belief in the Spirit of prophecy brings unity. See Ephesians 4.

The Head of the Body, the Church The church of God is under special leadership. Speaking of Christ we read: "He is the head of the body, the church." Col. 1:18. God "gave Him to be the head over all things to the church." Eph. 1:22. Christ is the "head," the great spiritual leader of the flock. He says, "Follow me."

Eyes of the Church in Ancient Israel

What are the eyes of the church? This is not simply an interesting question, but a very important one. The Scripture declares:

"Beforetime in Israel, when a man went to inquire of God, thus he spake, Come,

sees. He is a se-er, the eyes of the church. Samuel was a se-er, he was called that. and he said, "I am the seer." (See verses 10-20.) Amaziah, the priest, said unto Amos: "O thou seer," chap. 7:8-12. The prophet Gad was David's seer. 2 Sam. 24:11.

Thus we see that the prophets were the seers, the "eves of the church" in ancient Israel.

Eyes of the Church in Modern Israel

God says, "I am the Lord, I change not." Mal. 3:6. Since God does not change, we may rightfully expect to find prophets, the seers in the new dispensation, in the church in modern Israel. The figure of the "body" is used to represent the New Testament church.

In Acts 21:10-12 we read of "a certain prophet, named Agabus" whom the Holy Ghost used in prophesying the future experience of Paul. This same prophet, or se-er, "signified by the Spirit that there should be a great dearth throughout all the world: which came to pass in the days of Claudius Caesar." Acts 11:28. Agabus saw what was coming to the apostle Paul and he saw the "great dearth" coming upon the world. He prophesied the same. We see here the eyes of the church in modern Israel.

"Now there were in the church that was at Antioch certain prophets (plural) and teachers." Acts 13:1. "And in these days came prophets (plural) from Jerusalem unto Antioch." Acts 11:27. "And Judas and Silas, being prophets also themselves, exhorted the brethren with many words, and confirmed them." Acts 15:32. Phil-

The church of God on earth is likened now called a Prophet was aforetime called virgins, which did prophesy." Acts 21:8, 9. "And there was one Anna, a prophetess ... she was of a great age." She "departed not from the temple." She "spake of Him to all them that looked for redemption in Jerusalem." Luke 2:36-38.

> These Scriptures are sufficient to show that the "eyes" are still in the church, the body of Christ.

Coming to our time, we find that the "remnant" church keep the law of God and have the "Spirit of prophecy." Rev. 12:17; 19:10. The "gift" of prophecy was manifested through Mrs. E. G. White. As the messenger of the Lord, her messages have been and continue to be "the eyes of the church." She was only seventeen years old when she had her first vision. Read it in "Early Writings," pp. 13-20. In that first vision a description of the future was portrayed. "Make known to others what I have revealed to you," said the angel. "Life Sketches of Ellen G. White," p. 71. "Deliver the message faithfully." In her declining days she said: "I am trying to prepare for publication matter that will guard the work on every side." Id., p. 434. Thus we see "the eyes of the church" in modern Israel. A Se-er Sees

To illustrate that a "se-er," led by God, sees the future, I will relate three incidents I have personally seen and known.

Number One. During the time I attended the Battle Creek College, Elder A. T. Jones gave a stirring sermon on the "Spirit of Prophecy" to a congregation of some 4,000, in the "dime" tabernacle. He commended the writings of Mrs. E. G. White and laid particular stress on hearing the "voice" of God as we read and let us go to the seer: for he that is lip, the evangelist, "had four daughters, them. He then introduced the testimonies

of a lady by the name of Rice-Philips. He would read from her testimonies and ask, "Do you hear the voice?" "Thank God," said he, "we have another prophetess among us." He recommended her writings along with Mrs. White's as having the same authority. It is needless to say that it stirred the congregation. "Another prophetess," we heard from the lips of the people. We went home in deep thought.

Sunday morning I went to the Review and Herald post office. While there Elder Jones came in and asked for his mail. He was handed a large envelope and on it I saw the name, "Mrs. E. G. White." My mind immediately went to the sermon he preached just the day before, Sabbath. Brother Jones sat down and began to read. I watched him. Tears began to flow and his frame shook. I knew something was happening. At that time, Elder Tait came in and Brother Jones said, "Oscar, come here. See here, do you see the date of this testimony from Sister White, written over a month ago in Australia? Read it." Then said Elder Jones, "Who told Sister White I was going to preach that sermon vesterday on the Spirit of prophecy? I did not tell one soul. How did Mrs. White know?" Elder Tait said, in his quiet way, "Alonzo, you know."
"Yes," he replied, "God knew what I was going to do. I am wrong." The next Sabbath I heard him make his confession ceived upon this matter. . . . I was sur- fathers and mothers to their children.

to the church, and read the message God sent him from Australia over a month before he preached the sermon, reproving him. That is the work of a "seer." "the eves of the church" in modern Israel.

Number Two. When Elder O. A. Olsen was president of the General Conference, a meeting was held in College View, Nebraska. Among other questions, it was proposed and argued that all the papers should be combined in the one paper, the Review. Elder Olsen called his secretary and sent him on an errand. Soon he returned and gave a manuscript to Elder Olsen. After a lengthy discussion and a motion to unite the papers, Brother Olsen stood up and said, in substance, "You brethren have been talking, now let us hear what God has to say about this question. Some time ago the Lord showed Sister White this question would arise, but it was a wrong move." Then he read from the testimony, "The papers should not be united." That ended the discussion and saved them from making a mistake. Again, "the eyes of the church" manifested in the Spirit of prophecy.

Number Three. In the California November 7, 1939, election an amendment was found on the ballot dealing with the currency—the circulation of money. A great interest was manifested by all citizens. Had all our people been familiar with the counsel given in the Spirit of prophecy, "the eves of the church." they would have known just what position to take on the question.

A like issue was raised about 1896. changing the circulating currency from the gold standard to a silver standard, commonly known then as "sixteen to one," that is, sixteen silver dollars to one gold dollar. There was a general interest and excitement then, as in the recent California election, and many felt that the plan would bring great financial relief to poor people. Here is part of the counsel given by the Spirit of prophecy in 1897 regarding this proposed change of the currency.

"The present financial controversy has been presented to me as one of Satan's masterpieces for these last days. . . . This is not of the devising of God,—the changing of the circulating currency. What will it effect? It will cause a state of things that will bring oppression to the poor, and create great distress. It is one of the devil's schemes, and I thought those who believed the truth would not be de-

prised as I saw men who claim to believe the truth for this time, all excited in regard to matters-which relate to the Lord Jesus and eternal interests? No: but they seemed to be wonderfully excited in regard to the currency. . . . There is in this excitement just what separates those of the same faith. Is this bearing the divine credentials? Beware. . . . He (Satan) is walking about as a roaring lion, seeking whom he may devour, and he finds them among Seventh-day Adventists....

"I inquired why those who could read their Bibles and see the perils of these last days were so ready to snatch up matters

We wish to thank the students. parents, and constituents, with many of our churches, for the loval cooperation and financial assistance in this emergency. This has made it possible for the academy to reimburse, in a measure, those who lost clothing in the fire.

The conference warehouse has been moved to make room for the new laundry which is now under construction. We hope to have the laundry going in its new quarters before long. The new building will be larger and provide more adequate space. The washing is now being done in a section of the old building that was not completely destroyed, and the ironing is done in the girls' dormitory. We thank our heavenly Father that there was not more damage done.

Enrollment Report

Lodi Academy has enjoyed one of the best years in the history of the school, particularly in the large enrollment. Two hundred twenty-four academy students have been enrolled, a little over one hundred of these coming from the town of Lodi and the rest being in the dormitories. The grade school has an enrollment of 125. We have had fewer students drop out of school than in previous years. The distribution of students is of interest:

We have had students from five different states and one from the Hawaiian Islands. There will be 40 eligible for the senior class.

Missionary Activities

We were fortunate in securing the services of Elder W. B. Ochs for our Week of Prayer in the fall. Seventeen students took their stand and were baptized.

We have had a fine group in the Ministerial Seminar. Under the direction of Elder Heubach, our Bible teacher, they are planning to hold a series of Sunday night meetings in the town of Galt during the second semester. The Seminar has been a very definite factor in directing the boys to ministerial endeavor.

On Sabbath afternoons, the Sunshine band, under the direction of Miss Wichman, has been going in the school bus to the county hospital at Stockton, to sing ished the laundry at the academy. The and hand out literature. Over two hundred pieces of literature are handed out each week throughout the wards. There are 130 members in the academic Sabbath school. This is conducted entirely by the students, under the direction of the teachers.

These are some of the activities that have been carried on by the school to tie the young people with our denominational program and with the spirit of the Master in helping others.

Material Improvements

Fourteen hundred fifty dollars in labor has been provided the students each month, on the average.

In keeping with the spirit of progress that is apparent at the academy, many material improvements have been made. Many new books have been added to the library, new seating facilities for the science and language rooms, a new kitchenette for the girls' dormitory, film slides for the Bible department, a mimeograph for the Registrar's office, new walks on the campus, and a three-quarter ton Chevrolet pick-up. These are some of the items authorized and purchased by the board of the academy and which have been added this school year.

At present the students are entering enthusiastically into a campaign to purchase a Steinway Grand piano for the chapel to replace the old one which has more than served its day.

It is the earnest desire of the board and faculty of the academy to raise the standard of Christian living among our young people, to direct them nearer their Saviour and prepare them for workers in His cause. We solicit the cooperation and prayers of our constituents in behalf of our school.

Gardena Church Free Circulatina Library

On October 28, 1939, workers in the Gardena church met for prayer, and to select books to be distributed through the circulating library. Couples were assigned territory. A librarian was elected to keep record of the books-to whom they were loaned, and when they were returned. etc.

Our idea is to take the books to the homes of the people, and let them select one or two on a subject they desire to study, then the following week those books are picked up by the distributors, and other books that the reader may choosed are left. At first some were afraid there was a catch in our program, but we have assured them that our only desire is to present them with good reading matter on such subjects as health, science, prophecy, religion, etc.

Following is an experience which we have had just by taking a little twenty-five

cent book to one home:

The first Sabbath we went out with our books we stopped at Mrs.——'s house. She hesitated to take a book for fear there was a catch somewhere, but she was finally persuaded that we were giving something for nothing. The book she chose was "Health at Home." She informed us that her time is limited, that she reads mostly while riding on the street car, so wished something other than of a religious nature.

The following week our book supply was low when we reached her home, but because she wanted another book she chose "The Marked Bible." When we visited her at the close of that week she was rather indifferent, saying she didn't want any books then. We were not discouraged, and so returned the following week and she took "Plain Facts," and requested "Science Speaks" for her oldest son. The younger boys had become interested in the children's books and looked forward to our weekly visits.

One Sabbath afternoon when we stopped, Mrs.—— was in a talkative mood. She told us she had remarried a few years ago, and that her husband is Catholic. She and her boys had joined the church to please him. She wanted to be a good member, but did not see through the idea of confession to the

Another Church Succeeds With the Circulating Library

We purchased \$8.00 worth of \$.25 books early in January of this year. We made a call for all such books which our members had at home and wished to loan us. In these two ways we secured about 300 books.

The first Sabbath we worked (January 13), seventeen workers came to distribute books. The next Sabbath twenty-two came, and since that time we have never fallen below nineteen workers, and we have had as many as twenty-five.

The first Sabbath we loaned 39 books; the second, sixty-one. To date, after five Sabbaths of work we have approximately 300 books out, 120 families are reading these or have read enough to know what we are trying to do. There are ten families who are showing definite interest, four families have expressed a desire to come to church. Last Sabbath, one visitor said she had three families who wished to attend Sunday-night meetings.

Many of our readers have stated they are sure the Lord was sending us around at this time. The people are really happy to read the books, and they can not understand how we can do this work free of charge. The good reception we have had is well worth the five weeks of effort. The best part of the whole program is the enthusiasm shown by our own members who are taking part. Many say they have never enjoyed anything so much as this type of work. Our only difficulty is

keeping enough books on hand. Several times we have had to send workers away without books. We need 300 more books at least to properly carry on this project. At a recent meeting of the Pacific Union Conference Committee, it was voted to cooperate with the Loma Linda Food Company, which has offered to pay one cent for all labels turned in by our people from their use of Loma Linda Food products, providing that 100 or more labels are turned in at any one time.

The action further provides that the first half cent per label is to be credited to the Sabbath School Investment Fund, and the second half cent for the church school. In case the church does not operate a church school this half cent will be available for other church needs.

This new plan will accomplish a twofold purpose. It wil popularize our health foods with our people and at the same time provide funds for the Sabbath School Investment. "Two years ago last January, I sent my son in Port Orchard, Washington, a subscription to Present Truth. Until he left home, my boy belonged to the Seventhday Adventist Church, but when he got away he drifted from the truth. I was, of course, trying to lead him back into the message. On receiving the papers, he passed them over to a Catholic family with six children living near him. The mother and children got to reading the papers and became somewhat interested.

The second experience comes to us from Elder Passebois:

Some months ago I heard of a backslidden Seventh-day Adventist in Imperial Beach. I went to visit him and left him a bundle of Signs of the Times. The old backslider read some of these Signs and gave some to one of his neighbors. One day when I was calling on him, he told me of this lady who was enjoying the papers. I visited her and found her interested. I suggested some Bible studies and she accepted. One of our sisters has been studying with her. For some time I have had a burden on my heart for this kind of work, and for this reason I am so thankful for the development of the community Bible school plan of locating interests through literature, and of binding off these interests through community Bible schools. I thoroughly believe that in no way can this plan be so efficiently conducted as through a well planned and properly conducted Bible training class.

We are combining these two methods in E! Centro. During the class instruction we have had two small community schools in operation where the class members have been observing the methods of giving Bible readings, and to which they have brought their interested friends and relatives. These two schools have resulted in the baptism of three persons to date, and five more who have been prepared for baptism will be baptized soon.

The training class is now ready for their certificates, and we have in progress one community Bible school held on Sabbath afternoon in the El Centro church school building, in which nineteen non-Adventists are enrolled. All of these are persons with whom the training class members are working. They have located the interests through the community Bible school method, and when one of the persons is absent from the community Bible school the training class member who is working with that person becomes responsible to give the study to him before the next session, thus keeping the interested person up-to-date with the studies and giving the training class member the experience in giving the study. It is one of the most interesting groups I have ever worked with.

they had best let alone. How can they connect with men who are advancing principles that originated in the councils of demons? Why do they not see that this is no work the Lord has set them to do.... There are many who will be deluded, and who, by pen and voice, will cast their whole influence to create an evil condition of things (a condition that will exist just the same whatever they may do); but they should not be bound up with the evil workers," Test. to M. and W., pp. 331-

Also, in connection with the currency problem, there is the political angle which we should avoid. We read:

"Would we know how we may best please the Saviour? It is not in engaging in political speeches, either in or out of the pulpit. It is in considering with fear and trembling every word we utter." Id., p. 331.

"Some ministers were distinguishing themselves by weaving these subjects into their discourses. They were excitably involving themselves, taking sides in regard to these questions, that the Lord did not lay upon them the burden to engage in." Id., p. 332.

"We should reserve all our influence to act in upholding the truth. The sentiments brought to the front by politicians will be voiced by some who claim to be Sabbath-keepers." Id., p. 334.

"When the speaker shall, in a haphazard way, strike in anywhere, as the fancy takes him, when he talks politics to the people, he is mingling the common fire with the sacred. He dishonors God." Id., p. 337.

"All this excitement and unrest is placing the mind where it will not dwell on the truth." Id., p. 334.

"We are not to take part in this political money strife." Id., p. 335.

Here again the Spirit of prophecy, the "eyes of the church," sees the danger and counsel comes to save God's people from the pitfall of Satan.

Let us all ponder these things well, read more carefully, accept more wholeheartedly, and follow more closely the instruction given in the Spirit of prophecy, the "eyes of the church."

Note carefully again these words in Volume 9, p. 13: "Those who hold the reins of government are not able to solve the problems of moral corruption, poverty, pauperism, and increasing crime. They

are struggling in vain to place business operations on a more secure basis. If men would give more heed to the teaching of God's word, they would find a solution of the problems that perplex them."

Our Brother Haight up in Chiriqui, Panama, operates a soap factory. A man came with a large amount of tallow to sell. He dumped it down and said, "I'll be back for the money later."

Brother Haight said, "Wait, and let us weigh it." But the man said, "No, I'm in a hurry, I want to go to town." Brother Haight insisted: "Don't you want to watch us weigh it?" But the man replied, "No, just weigh it like an Adventist would weigh it and it will be all right." The man was a Catholic.

In the Colombia Islands east of Panama we have a Brother Archbold. A firm was looking for someone to operate a large store and approached Brother Archbold because he has the reputation of being strictly honest. He answered: "I cannot take your store because I am a Seventh-day Adventist and cannot operate it on Saturday."

They urged that Saturday is the best and busiest day of the week but he said, "I know, but if I take the store it will close on Saturday." In spite of that they asked him to take the store and close it on Saturday.

He went to look at the store and found a stock of liquor. He told them, "I cannot sell liquor. If I operate this store liquor will have to go out." The company agreed. He took over the store, teople did their buying on Friday, and the store has done well.

They looked for someone to build a road for the government, a \$50,000 job. Brother Archbold was asked to take it, and accepted it under certain conditions. He handled the money honestly and to the satisfaction of the government.

When they have an election in that place they call Brother Archbold to count the votes because they know he is trustworthy.

Brother Orley Ford states that Guatemala has the largest population of any Central American country. It is a country with no saloons. The doors are wide open there and our work is advancing.

The field missionary secretary, Brother Santos, has twelve regular colporteurs. In addition to directing their work he sold \$2,000 worth of books in one year.

large. The proprietor required payment of the rent in advance and warned Elder Ford that he would not return the rent even though there was no attendance at the meetings. The first night 350 came. They added chairs and now 500 are seated and others stand night after night.

The laymen are winning souls. In three years they have built eight church buildings and rebuilt their church in the capital city. In one place the laymen have won 23 souls. The church elder lives out four miles, but walks to all church services and was a leader in winning these souls.

The personal guard of the president of Guatemala is not an Adventist but he took a "Win One" card during a service. True to his word, he brought in a man who was found to be practically ready for baptism.
