Defense Plans Adopted

Thorough prepartion is being made to meet any emergency that might arise from aerial attack or any other war situation. Under the direction of Dr. A. W. Johnson, dean and business manager, blackout wardens have been appointed and provisions have been made to darken rooms in the school homes.

Air-raid rules have been drawn up and posted in all the student rooms, departments, and homes in the village. Professor H. W. Clark, as general chairman, has announced definite plans to cover the evacuation of all the large buildings by day or night. Air-raid drills are planned so as to familiarize everyone with the quickest and safest means of escape in case of alarm. Maps of the shelters have been placed in all main buildings on the campus.

Called to the service of the nation, nine young men have left Pacific Union College during the last two weeks.

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Temperance Organization Planned

The chapel talk Wednesday, January 28, was of particular interest, for it was a discourse on temperance, given by Mrs. E. R. Mays who represents the State Temperance Society. She presented a graphic review of present-day conditions in this country, and pointed out in clear and impressive language the privileges and responsibilities of Christian young people toward those who are less fortunate.

Mrs. Mays suggested the organization of a temperance group here at the college, and at the close President Smith asked for an expression from the student body. After a brief discussion, it was agreed to ask the M. V. Society to sponsor such an organization. Prof. C. E. Weniger will lead in making plans.

A Wonderful Response

In our Signs campaign last year we accepted the goal of double our previous subscription list. Loma Linda differs from most places in that we do not have a city or town of our own to work. The population is practically all Adventist so we must look outside for territory for our missionary endeavor.

The highest previous subscription list for the Signs was 600 for the year. To double this we had to reach out into territory of other churches for lists of names. I decided to get lists of all the high-school teachers, the county officials, the lawyers, city school teachers, various other professional groups, and firms that give to Harvest Ingathering and we added one hundred to members of the United States Senate.

I presented these lists by groups, and asked for members to take 50 Signs for this group or another, then down to groups of five. I found a quick response in the church. We raised a total of 2,250 subscriptions for the Signs. I am informed this is the largest amount raised by any church in the world during the last campaign. Surely our people are ready to respond when we present the need of putting our truth-filled papers into circulation.

We pray that many have been reading the soul-stirring messages in the Signs each week, and in the great harvest day we believe that we shall see some souls saved as a result of this endeavor by our church.

_____ **Civilian Defense**

In the face of the grave emergency, the greatest desire that comes to all of us is to be able to do something to help. How can I help men, assist my country, what can I do to cooperate?

Seventh-day Adventists are asking, too, what effect defense activities may properly have upon the practice of their religious faith. The President has proclaimed a seven-day work week for enterprises doing defense work. Is that to be interpreted to mean that we must

abandon Sabbath observance, and work seven days a week?

Now, as always, our allegiance to God and His truth is to be given foremost consideration. Let us be clear that no contingencies can ever arise which will justify any departure from the way of God's commandments.

The proclamation of a seven-day work week clearly has reference to factory operation, not to the individual worker. This does not take away our prerogative and duty to adjust our work so that we may still observe the Sabbath.

Seventh-day Adventists should be wise and considerate enough to volunteer for extra hours of labor, preferably upon Sunday, in lieu of their Sabbath. We have been able to arrange for our men in army camps to be released from their routine duties on the Sabbath, with the undestanding that they will be available for extra duty upon Sunday. Let us follow the same course in defense and public welfare activities.

Volunteer Defense Service

Seventh-day Adventists ought to be foremost in offering their services in every form of activity which they are able to perform, while keeping within the circle of God's will.

Throughout the country, volunteer bureaus have been set up. These ask for volunteers to serve in one or more of many capacities in defense lines. In some of these capacities, many Seventhday Adventists have special skill, and they should be quick to place this skill at the service of their communities. They should do this by going to the volunteer bureaus and making out applications for the particular kind of volunteer service they are qualified to render, or the particular kind of training for service which they would prefer to take. Some of these are:

Business, which includes administration, typing, shorthand, filing, adding machine opetating bookkeeping, switchboard operating.

erating, bookkeeping, switchboard operating. *Civil Protection*, which covers police auxiliary and fire force.

Homemaking, including child care, cooking, sewing, knitting, housework.

Medical Aid, including trained nursing, practical nursing, nurses' aid, first aid, home hygiene, surgical dressings, occupational therapy, health education.

Manual Labor, including heavy labor, light labor, caretaker, watchman, gardening.

Motor, including driving, mechanics, repairs, truck driving.

Nutrition, including cooking, canteen, dietetics, counterman. Public Relations, including newspaper reporting, radio work, public speaking, etc.

Social Welfare, including case work, institution work, playground supervision, etc.

Go to the proper place and place at the disposal of your community the amount of time you can give to the doing of the service you can do best. The type of service, the mount of time, and the day or days of performing the service, will be left for you to determine.

All of these are voluntary services without remuneration, and civilians are asked to apply for services, giving as much time as they feel they can spare.

There are many things which Seventh-day Adventists can do. In health lines, in nursing, in cooking, in welfare work, we should feel that we have come to the time of our greatest opportunity and should be quick to place our special training at the service of our communities.

We should not, however, feel that anything connected with this emergency should be allowed to drive us from the path of strict obedience to God. God's law commands, "Remember the Sabbath day to keep it holy."

While this should be clear, we should also understand that Christ's example makes plain that rescue work, or healing, or ministering to human needs, or the meeting of emergencies, is not incompatible with Sabbath observance.

If there is a bombing raid or other attack, or fire, or public disaster upon our city during the hours of the Sabbath, of course Seventh-day Adventists will help to save life, to minister to the sick, to rescue the wounded, the crippled, the helpless, the needy, just as our divine Lord would do were He present, even if this means the very hardest kind of labor during all the sacred hours. There is nothing incompatible with the truest Sabbath observance in so doing, as our Lord has shown us.—Abridged from a Statement Adopted by the General Conference Committee.

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Interest in Prophecy

On opening a copy of a leading denominational weekly Protestant church paper a few weeks ago, I was attracted to an article by its title, "A Timely Word on the War, Revelation and the Future." Eagerly I scanned the opening paragraph. "Interest in the 'end of the world' always comes to the front during periods of crisis and turmoil," it began. "Many Christian people, with a faith in the Bible that is only a short distance removed from superstition pore over its pages in an effort to find 'signs of the end,'" it continued.

Then we read that "Tens of thousands of well-intentioned and genuinely devout people are being led astray during these days by the sects and cults because they have not had, and are not getting, trustworthy instruction on the subject." Even then I was hardly prepared for the series of arguments from this point on, designed to disprove any relation whatsoever of the Revelation of Scripture with future events.

What a pity, I thought, that this is the kind of spirtual help on prophecy and all the hope that is given to the 270,000 families into which this, one of the leading church papers of the country, is going.

In contrast, how blessed and inspiring is the message going out to the world in our own denominational missionary paper, the Signs of the Times. And we know for a surety from the daily touch with those using it, and the testimony of large numbers of readers that it is piercing the present darkness with the light of Scripture, and bringing hope and assurance for which people are longing.

General interest in prophecy was never so keen as now. There may be, and are, misinterpretations, it is true. But in its 67 years of service, the Signs of the Times holding faithfully to the Bible has won the confidence of countless numbers of people of all classes, many of whom are now looking to it to point the way. Every day there is growing evidence that this is true.

Writing in appreciation of the Signs of the Times coming into his Army Camp Library, a U. S. Army chaplain recently said this: "It does my heart good to know of the close study your writers are making of the world's conditions today. I pray God that America may see the 'Handwriting on the wall' before it is too late. However, many will not see. They do not understand. I have in my study a number of your tracts and booklets which I am studying very carefully."

From copies of letters received by the mailing band of one of our large churches sending out almost 500 Signs a week, we find such expressions as these: (The Signs of the Times is referred to.)

"I find them to be very helpful and inspirational, most especially your interpretations of the Biblical prophecies foretelling events and circumleading up to the second coming of Christ, which have always been vague and confusing to me. I find you very definitely associate them with our present world conditions."

"I have never had the Revelation: explained so clearly in anything I have read before as regards the present conditions of the world. I have come to the conclusion that the things taking place in the world today are but the fulfillment of the Scriptures."

"Your paper is like a flashlight in the dark in showing us the way, and it really teaches the blind to see."

"You are filling a need in these critical times and you deserve success."

A very fine letter from a gentleman in Upper Middletown, Pa., tells of his deep appreciation of the Signs in this way: "It has cleared up a lot of questions in my study of the Bible, and given me a stronger belief. I feel I can work for God now."

Such is the reaction coming from far and wide wherever people are reading the Signs of the Times. We need not be disturbed by warnings given in religious papers or elsewhere against studying the prophecies. They may even be the means of stirring many who read them to a more earnest search for the truth. The light from the Signs of the Times is shining brightly. School Progress

The conference mid-year report for church schools has just been completed. This report shows 27 church schools with an enrollment of 965. There are 7 schools doing ninth and tenth grade work, in which 104 pupils are enrolled. Forty-eight teachers are employed in the church schools.

The Bakersfield church school is now occupying the first half of the new building. The new location provides space for school gardens and abundant room for playgrounds.

The San Francisco school is making a very encouraging growth. Seventy-six pupils are now enrolled. More are expected next week. The serious need for another teacher is being considered.

A note just received from Professor Shephard of Armona Academy states that a sprinkler system has been installed for the new lawn. Grass will be seeded and shrubbery placed as soon as soil conditions will permit.

An addition to the church school building is planned as part of the remodeling program of the Pacific Grove church.

Twenty-three physiology and hygiene charts have been purchased for the physiology classes of the church schools. This equipment has been much needed and is being thoroughly appreciated by the girls and boys.

As a part of the follow-up health program in the church schools, new dispensers of powdered soap are being placed in all the church schools.

A good interest is being manifest in the campaign for new library books. Several schoolrooms have qualified for the conference help and we expect similar reports from others very soon. The new books are a source of real pleasure to the pupils. W. L. AVERY.
