••• THE GOOD FIGHT •••

Wars come to an end some day and are only a hideous memory; but always the Christian must be a fighter, fighting the good fight of faith.

An equal heroism and self-sacrifice like unto that which through all the sad ages men have put into war must now be poured into "the good fight." This is the hour when every one enlisted in the cause of Christ must wear spiritual khaki, must throw spiritual bombs, break down every spiritual barbed-wire entanglement, carry on a continual spiritual barrage, and in some such eager spirit as possessed the apostle Paul scale new heights every day for God.

Every true Christian will now be found not merely "doing his bit," but abandoning himself to gaining the final triumph in and for Christ and His blessed truth. He will do this with a zest and a zeal such as no army led by an earthly general can ever equal. He will do it to the last drop of his blood and the last ounce of his strength.

Over the triple doors of the cathedral of Milan there are three inscriptions spanning the arches. Over one is carved a beautiful wreath of roses and underneath is inscribed, "All that pleases is but for a moment." Over the other a sculptured cross and underneath these words, "All that troubles is but for a moment." But under the great central arch is this inscription, "That only is important that is eternal." God is revealing that fact now to the whole world.

Undoubtedly we are now moving up into one of God's mighty moments of Divine revelation, one which calls for our very best, given fully and completely. There is something unusual and eternal for each of us to do for God which demands first place of importance in our lives.

Great streams of blessing and of power are ready for us now, and into them we are privileged to plunge. A spiritual revival of historic proportions is due and God commands us to make it of first importance in our lives.

This is the biggest task God has ever given to the church. How sad that we are still making Him wait while we seek for that of lesser importance!

Paul Lawrence Dunbar touched the vulnerable spot in all our lives when he wrote:

- "The Lord had a job for me, but I had so much to do,
- I said, 'You get somebody else or wait till I get through.'
- I don't know how the Lord came out, but He seemed to get along;
- But I felt kinda sneakin' like, 'cause I know'd I done Him wrong.
- "One day I needed the Lord; needed Him myself, needed Him right away;
- And He never answered me at all, but I could hear Him say,
- Down in my accusin' heart, 'Sambo, I'se got too much to do;
- You get somebody else, or wait till I get through.'
- "Now when the Lord He have a job for me, I never tries to shirk;
- I drops what I have on hand and does the good Lord's work.
- And my affairs can run along, or wait till I get through;

Nobody else can do the job that God's marked out for you."

God judges men in regard to the estimate they put upon things of eternal value. In most of our lives there is latter rain will fall upon us as the early need of a revision of values. We capitalize things that are hardly worth the saving while we minimize things that are of eternal worth.

Even in doing God's service we must weigh values. The secondary must not have the larger attention now, while the primary gets only passing notice.

The religious feverishness, dissatisfaction, and unrest of the present hour grow largely out of the fact that we have not properly related things in our spiritual lives. If we possessed the right relationship of things religious there would be far more seeking for the fullness of the Holy Spirit as compared with the seeking after new plans and methods.

We seem many times to disagree with God as He points out the proper relationships in the things which have to do with our spiritual growth and accomplishments. We formulate our own plans when He stands ready to guide by His Spirit. Things of the highest importance in relation to our great objectives are postponed to some indefinite future date.

God's plan is the only right plan. There can be no permanent and abiding victory until the church falls into the Divine plans of possessing the fulness of the Spirit "awaiting our demand and reception." And in this connection it is well to ponder the following words of inspiration:

"Not one of us will ever receive the seal of God while our characters have one spot or stain upon them. It is left with us to remedy the defects in our characters, to cleanse the soul temple of every defilement. Then the

La Sierra College

College Items

We are happy to welcome Miss Doris Carlsen as professor of home economics at La Sierra College. For the past six years Miss Carlsen has been an instructor in arts and home economics at Pacific Union College. During the first semesters of the school years of 1938-39 and 1939-40, she taught at La Sierra and is well known to many here.

Dean K. J. Reynolds and Professor J. C. Haussler have spent several weeks calling on the young people of the Southern California Conference. They report that many young people are looking forward to attending La Sierra College next year.

The prospects are bright for an excellent enrollment at the college during the school year of 1942-43. If you have not seen the new 1942-43 catalog and are interested in securing one, and if you wish information about expenses and courses to be given during the next school year, we invite you to write to President L. R. Rasmussen, La Sierra College, Arlington, California.

Our summer school enrollment has reached 115. This is the largest summer session in the history of the college. During the last half of this summer session, opportunity will be given to anyone interested to enter classes starting at that time. The beginning dates and the names of the classes are as follows: August 2-Evidences of Christianity, European History Survey, Human Anatomy, Elements of Public Speaking, Intermediate Spanish, Music, Applied Arts; August 17-Bible Survey and Intermediate Accounting; August 30-Health Principles.

A large number of former students and prospective students are working in the various departments of the college and in the Loma Linda Food Factory this summer. The number has now reached 141.

Summer at La Sierra College

There are 115 students availing themselves of the accelerated program at La Sierra College this summer. They have found many courses that fit into their chosen curriculum. Are you, young person, among those who are

making use of the scholastic opportunities offered you this summer? Let me suggest you plan definitely to enroll for the last six weeks of our summer session beginning August 2.

Miss Glee King, who for thirteen years, has been head of the Secretarial Department at Emmanuel Missionary College, has accepted the call to connect with La Sierra College in the same capacity. Miss King is a graduate of Emmanuel Missionary College and of Northwestern University. She comes to us with a wealth of teaching experience and ability which will strengthen this department in the college.

A number of the instructors of La Sierra College are availing themselves of advanced graduate study this summer. Professor and Mrs. L. C. Palmer and Miss Maybel Jensen are at the University of Southern California; Prof. W. J. Airey is studying at the University of Washington; Miss Mildred Ostich at the Northwestern University in Chicago; Mrs. Mary Groome, Mrs. W. J. Shafer, Miss Edna Farnsworth, and Mr. Elmer Digneo are taking work at the Redlands University. We are indeed happy that these instructors have the opportunity of attending the summer session at these universities where they may receive additional help along their special lines of instruction.

One cannot help being impressed these days with the appealing advertising that the government is using to solicit the cooperation of the American public. The other day my eyes were directed to a large picture which appeared in the Oakland Tribune. It was a picture of a young mother with a small baby in her arms. A larger child was clinging to her. Her face was sober with the growing reality of the



sacrifice she had made and above her head appeared in print the words, "I GAVE A MAN!"

As the full force of these words gripped my heart, I had a mental picture of millions of mothers and wives who have made similar sacrifices. The whole country is moved by the spirit of sacrifice and responsibility to do its utmost to aid the war effort, so vital to the future welfare of our nation.

Sabbath, July 11, was a Sabbath which will linger long in the memory of the Lodi Central church. The pastor, Elder F. L. Abbott, appealed to the church to pay the last dollar of obligations on the new church building. In just a few minutes cash and pledges to the amount of \$3,000 were raised. When the pledges are paid the church will be dedicated free of debt. This is a wonderful achievement on the part of our members, and the new building is filling a great need.

The annual graduation exercises of the St. Helena Sanitarium were held recently and the graduating class received their diplomas after listening to a stirring address by Dr. G. K. Abbott. At this writing the sanitarium is filled to overflowing. In a few weeks the new class of nurses will be admitted which promises to be the largest class the sanitarium has had in years.

The first six months of 1942 our colporteurs have taken \$21,521 worth of orders, and delivered \$13,007 worth of subscription books in Northern California. Many interested people are studying the message all over the field as a result of all this literature.

The Berkeley church has set out to raise \$1,000 through their singing bands. This high goal will demand steady work for achievement, but judging from their start they will reach it by the help of the Lord. At a recent meeting of the Golden Gate Academy Board Prof. E. J. Henning was elected as its principal, and has now entered upon his duties. Since Professor Henning is well known in the Bay area we feel that he will take a special interest in the progress of the school. We bespeak for him the hearty cooperation of the constituency and the faculty.

Elder L. A. Wilcox is planning to hold a series of meetings in the Mt. Shasta-Dunsmuir district this summer. We wish Brother Wilcox the blessings of the Lord as he lays plans for this important effort.

Recent word from Elder Imai, our Japanese minister, reveals that he, with many others of our Japanese believers, have been moved to the permanent camp at Tule Lake. Brother Imai writes that about sixteen thousand Japanese are in the camp and it is giving him a fine opportunity to present the truth. Let us remember our Japanese brethren and sisters in our prayers that God may use them to bring the light of truth to others of their people.

The report of our colporteurs for the week ending July 11 deserves special mention. During this week they report sales totaling \$2,001.98, and deliveries, \$1,055.96. Brethren Leslie and Henderson are hard at work. They say there is still plenty of room for more colporteurs. Never has our literature sold so well; never have we faced such an eager public.

Elder Hackman met with the Ukiah and Willits churches in the morning and afternoon of July 11. Following the afternoon service Elder Wittenberg baptized four precious souls. Others are looking forward to baptism soon. Brother Hackman found the work in this district moving forward and our people determined to reach their Harvest Ingathering goal in record time.

Here Am I, Lord, Send Me The Prophet Isaiah was given a vision of "the Lord sitting upon a throne, high and lifted up, and His train filled the temple." The vision of the glory of God and of man's unworthiness not only drove the prophet to his knees, but caused him to cry out for cleansing. The Lord answered the heart cry of Isaiah, and all sin and selfishness were burned out of his life by the live coal taken from the altar of God.

When all sin and selfishness was gone there came an inrushing of the love, the Spirit, and the power of the Almighty. The prophet found himself to be "a new creature in Christ Jesus." All of self-sacredness was gone. In tune with God, and empowered with His love, Isaiah's heart cried out for the souls of men who are lost in sin, and then he heard a voice speaking, "Whom shall I send, and who will go for us?" Then he said, "Here am I; send me."

When any man, when any woman, passes through regenerative fires kindled from off the altar of God, when sin is purged and selfishness is burned out of the life, it is only natural that the soul should cast itself into the furrow of the world's need, to give itself for those without hope and without God. It is only natural for that individual to say, "Here am I, send me." The complete regenerated heart, vested of all self and selfishness, will be willing, and will be anxious, to do the will of Him who has called him, who has redeemed him, who has commissioned him, who has sent him forth to labor in Christ's stead.

When this experience in its fullness is had, the only question which will be asked by the individual concerned, is "What is the will of my Heavenly Father?"

While it is true that the Lord assigns certain individuals to special lines of work, it is also true that there are lines of work which are to be carried on by the church membership in general. Among these more general lines of work is that of the Harvest Ingathering, and it is well for us to reflect upon the special testimonies sent by the Lord through the Spirit of prophecy regarding this general church campaign.

God's Blessing In Hawaii

Sunday, July 5, Hawaii went over its Harvest Ingathering goal of \$19,200. The island of Kauai was the first to reach its island goal of \$3,000 and it was done in fifteen working days this year, and now they are well on their way to reaching \$4,000 which they have set as their overflow goal. Next Maui reached its goal of \$2,450 and they report they will have \$3,000 before the end of this month. Molokai was next with its goal of \$450 and a nice overflow. Then the "big island" of Hawaii reported its goal of \$2,800 and they too are working for a large overflow.

It is remarkable how the Lord blessed our humble efforts this year. In Honolulu we gathered in over \$1,000 on each of two Sundays as our churches went out in field days. This year we were unable to have singing bands but as a few solicitors have gone out each evening the Lord has blessed them with over \$300 a night on a number of nights for just an hour and forty-five minutes work. We have set \$10,000 as our overflow goal which will make \$30,800 for our island field. If we reach this goal, and we are confident we will, it will give us a per capita of over \$30. We give God all the credit for what has been done, for we started the campaign a little fearful because over nine hundred places of business have closed their doors since December 7.
