

Coast to Coast Sunday Evening Mutual System

We feel that we must tell you how well the work is going in spite of the change in our broadcasting time.

The month of October saw no drop in mail, and our offerings were the second largest of any month thus far. You have no idea the load this has lifted from our hearts. (We have not yet received a report of the October 16 Voice of Prophecy Offering given through the local churches and conferences.)

The last few weeks we have faced a real crisis, but we feel that God's people have been praying for this work and the Lord has again triumphed. We are adding many new stations by transcription. The English program is now being carried by over three hundred stations.

Add to this nearly one hundred stations in Central and South America carrying the program in Portuguese and Spanish and you get a glimpse of the speed with which the third angel's message is going to the whole western hemisphere.

Elder L. H. Lindbeck of South America has written us that Bible school enrollments are pouring in by the thousands. He states that ninety per cent of the enrollees continue their courses. A high percentage of these are Catholic.

In one country it was necessary to have the broadcast approved by a board of Catholic bishops. The board passed the programs and now eleven powerful stations in that country are broadcasting the message.

Indeed God has set His hand to the finishing of the work. Indeed the end must be very near. You will not forget us with your gifts and in your prayers, will you?

Till We Meet Again

Early in September, we received an invitation to connect with the General Conference as associate secretary of the Young People's Missionary Volunteer Department. After very thoughtful and prayerful consideration of this call, Mrs. Dunbar and I accepted, and on October 5 we left the Pacific Union Conference.

We have never worked with more cordial Christian relationships with our workers or people than was our experience in the Pacific Union. It was a constant source of pleasure to labor for and with the young people in this field. We have no greater desire than that by precept and example we might appeal to our youth to give themselves to Jesus Christ and the finishing of His work.

Unforgettable are the occasions when we saw so many of our youth accept the challenge. The personal interviews with hundreds of young people, the Senior and Junior training camps, the camp meetings, the Weeks of Prayer, the Missionary Volunteer rallies, the officers' conventions, etc., are bright mileposts in the life of an M. 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Among the Navahos

The Lord has been richly blessing the work in Navaho land. One family has been especially interested and they are keeping the Sabbath and drinking in the truth as fast as we can give it to them.

The freewill offerings given by the people during the past two months amounted to over \$11. Of course their offerings are given in produce-squash, melons, potatoes and corn-which is purchased by the mission and the money turned in to the conference through the regular channels. We are holding Bible studies and meetings in several camps each week. We have made our first contacts with most of these people through the medical work, and now they are pleading with us to open a school for their children. They are truly crying, as the Macedonians of old, "Come over and help us!"

Winter is coming early in the Navaho country this year, and it is already very cold. There is a shortage of children's clothing in all the trading posts due to the war, and the people have been coming to us asking for help to clothe their little ones for the cold winPACIFIC UNION RECORDER

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

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



A Gain That Is Not a Gain

It is hard for us to realize that the gain we have enjoyed in mission offerings during the last two years, as compared to a like period prior to the war, is not actually a gain at all as we consider what these means could accomplish in their respective times. Money values have decreased as much, and in many cases more, than the increase that we have seen in our mission offerings. Some of our foreign mission fields have been closed, while others remain open and fruitful; but should we be permitted to labor in all the places that we have labored in before the war it is doubtful if we could more than sustain our normal program in the light of costs today.

It is the common impression that a gain in mission offerings will permit a corresponding increase in mission endeavor in a foreign field. This would be true if money values and costs of operation were stabilized, but in these unusual times in many cases our increases are taken from us by the economic trend. Money is plentiful today, and we as a people are receiving financial blessings without measure. The income of our people, as portrayed by tithe receipts, is phenomenal. However, as we see the amount per income dollar given for foreign missions in this area the lowest in the nation, we feel constrained to call these facts to mind. We are enjoying the largest income per person and giving the smallest percentage of it to the cause of foreign missions.

The following is a paragraph from a recent letter from the General Conference treasurer:

"During the last few weeks the Treasury Department has been very busy collecting and compiling the budget requests for 1944. These requests are larger than we have ever before received, and we find in our study of them that they are all worthy enterprises and mean much in the advancement of the cause. However, we shall be able to meet only a small per cent of the amounts requested. I know this will be a keen disappointment to our overseas divisions."

We realize that we are living in a strenuous time, and that calls upon our financial resources, increased as they are, are many. Loyalty to our country in its hour of crisis is our duty, but let us also examine anew the systematic plans we have made to carry forward God's work in foreign lands. C. J. NAGELE,


