## Elder L. K. Dickson Chosen Vice President of the General Conference for North America

No doubt many have read Associated Press dispatches in the various newspapers, telling of the appointment of Elder Louis K. Dickson as vice president of the General Conference for North America.

We very much regret losing Elder Dickson from our union conference, where he has served so efficiently as president. We are, however, very pleased to have one of his capabilities to act in this larger capacity as president of the North American Division.

Elder Dickson began his career as an evangelist at the age of nineteen, in the old California Conference, following which he spent a number of years in the Pacific Northwest. He returned to California, locating in Los Angeles, and after a short period was transferred to New York City, where he served as evangelist and pastor of the Temple church for a few years. He was then elected president of the Greater New York Conference, where he served six years. From New York he went to the Florida Conference, where he was president for three years.

Elder Dickson returned to the Pacific Coast when he was elected president of the Northern California Conference in 1936. After four years of most successful work in that field he was transferred to the presidency of the Southeastern California Conference, serving in that capacity until the General Conference of 1941, when he was unanimously chosen as president of the Pacific Union Conference. His spiritual and successful leadership in this office has won for him a very

dear place in the hearts of his close associates and fellow workers.

The experience gained through the years of successful service in these various capacities has well qualified him for the position to which he has now been appointed, and is accepting. He will, however, not sever his connection with the Pacific Union for a few weeks. I am sure all will be pleased to learn that Elder and Mrs. Dickson are continuing their home on the West Coast for the present.

Certainly our prayers and best wishes go with Elder and Mrs. Dickson as they take on these large responsibilities to which God has called them. May God give them wisdom sufficent for the task that lies before them.

No successor has yet been chosen to fill the vacancy left by Elder Dickson's resignation. A meeting of the union conference committee will give study to this at an early date. C. L. BAUER.

## Our Medical Ministry Reaches Jamaica

In beautiful Jamaica, where the people respond so readily to the preaching of the message by both evangelist and colporteur, plans have been perfected for the starting of medical missionary work in the city of Kingston, the capital of the island. The program includes a city clinic for the poor (whose name is legion in this city) with 20 beds and appropriate equipment to care for a large number of people daily. This clinic is now being constructed on a fine site connected with a commodious church in Kingston, which

seats 1100 people and which is always overcrowded.

Then a few miles out on the outskirts of the city, the brethren have purchased a beautiful site with a large home upon it. This residence will be utilized as a nurses' home, and a modest sanitarium and hospital will be erected on this property. It is situated in the best residential section of the city and quite near the Governor's residence.

In the city, itself, the brethren have rented a nice office for Dr. Clifford Anderson who is to be in charge of this medical program. Thus at long last this little land of Jamaica, where we have over 10,000 faithful believers, and where they are baptizing over 1,000 souls a year, is to be blessed with the ministrations of our doctors and nurses. Miss Ruth Munroe who was in Siam when the Japanese army entered there, and who was repatriated on the first trip of the "Gripsholm," is now in Jamaica, and is giving preliminary training to a group of young women at the West Indian Training College, preparatory to setting up a nurses' course in connection with the new institution.

Only those who know the sad physical condition of the people of this little island can realize what a boon it will be to our own membership, and what an influence will be added to our work, by this new development which is long overdue.

But, for the completion of such a broad program as I have here outlined, much more money than what is now in sight must be provided. This is one of the projects which will benefit from the overflow of the Thirteenth Sabbath offering on March 31.

Won't you, dear readers, put a few bricks in this new sanitarium or a few planks in this city clinic by doubling your regular Thirteenth Sabbath offering this time? H. M. Blunden.

## Speaker Stresses Importance of Will

Elder Eric B. Hare outlined the importance of training the will of a child when he spoke Thursday evening, March 8, at the regular monthly meeting of the Home and School Association in the Phoenix Central church.

Quoting from the Spirit of prophecy, Elder Hare explained the real meaning of the will. He then drew a sketch to illustrate the working of the will, which is the deciding power of the individual.

If the will of the child is not properly trained, the speaker declared, it is broken or crushed, whether that be because of too much use of the rod, or because of a total lack of discipline. Before the child can exercise the will intelligently, he must know how to reason.

Therefore, it is of utmost importance to begin while the child is still an infant to be consistent in disciplining him so that he will have the proper background to learn to reason. Then he should also early be given opportunities to make decisions, with the parents making sure before he is called upon to make these decisions, that he has a sufficient background in that particular subject to help him to decide for the right. This will help to develop the child's will and prepare him to surrender it to God.

Mrs. A. J. Werner, leader of the association, made a few remarks concerning the plans for the year, and urged that parents visit the school, and that teachers visit the parents.
