This has taken the form of periodical listings of farms, homes, jobs, and business and professional opportunities in the country. These listings have been sent out without charge to those who have made request for them. In this way Adventists

in the cities have been informed regarding many opportunities which otherwise they would have known nothing about. A large number have availed themselves of these opportunities to get out of the cities into the country.

The information contained in these listings has reached us chiefly from Adventists already living in the country. We ask any of our people who know of advantageous openings in the country for Adventists, whether a farm, or house, or job or business opportunity of any kind, to describe it to us for our next listing. We are assembling material now for the eighth listing.

Between 1000 and 1200 persons ask for these listings. They have proved of real benefit. Send in your information before April 17. Otherwise it will have to be put over to the ninth listing. Our present deadline is April 17.

And be brief. Do not write long, detailed descriptions of properties. Leave out the adjectives. Never mind the scenic advantages. Just tell us what you have—acreage, how much tillable, location, number of rooms, conveniences, whether electricity or running water, price, proximity to church and school; or what kind of a job or opening. Make it short.

And, whether you send information for listing or request a copy of the listing, make sure you make your address legible and accurate. Some of our listings are returned stamped "address unknown," or "moved away, leaving no forwarding address."

Hurry to us the information you have. It may be of real help. And no colonization programs, please, no real estate promotion, just genuine opportunities which may enable city dwellers to answer the urgent call, "Get out of the large cities as fast as possible."

The following are parts of a letter received by a publishing department secretary from one of his colporteurs: "Dear Brother:

**Soul Winning—St. Helena Sanitarium**

Elder O. H. Shrewsbury, chaplain of the St. Helena Sanitarium, brought to the delegates attending the biennial constituency meeting a number of interesting experiences which we believe will be an encouragement and inspiration to all our people:

"We are thankful to God that He

is using the workers of the St. Helena Sanitarium to make good impressions for the truth. One thing that marks our work here is the fact that those who come to be with us are very often in a state of mind where the most tactful kindness is imperatively necessary in dealing with them. To the point is the experience as related to us by one of our faithful senior nurses.

"The patient had had a serious accident and had been delirious for days. He was a sturdy fellow and looked somewhat older than his twenty-two years might suggest. I had been giving him a treatment when he asked me to "say a prayer" for him. Having been so unconscious of his circumstances for so long, I thought he was perhaps talking subconsciously to me. I prayed that if it be God's will his health might again be restored to him, that he might live a new life thereafter to glorify Christ and tell others of His power.

"The prayer was very short, but the patient was in tears. I tried to comfort him as his condition would be worse if he became upset. He dozed into a light sleep, so I quietly slipped out of the room and went to lunch. Upon returning, the supervisor asked me if I had prayed with the patient. I had thought he would not remember, but he had spoken to her about it and had asked for me. Again I entered his room and fed him his dinner. He seemed very much clearer mentally than I had ever seen him before. He then related to me a short story of his life, how he had left home at twelve and joined the Navy, lying about his age. He told of the life he had lived and said he did not think God could forgive him. When I finished he cried, "If only the world could know I've heard a prayer! If only God lets me walk again I'll do what is right. I'll go to those bad places only once more and tell those men about God."

"He later asked me to write his mother and tell her that he had given his heart to God and was going to live a good life in the future. He made remarkable progress from then on and was able to fly home to be with his mother for Christmas even though he would have to wear his cast for several months. We nurses were able to give him a number of Bible studies and he took a Bible and other literature home with him."

"We wish we could express to you the fervor with which statements of

gratitude come from grateful hearts. Here are just a few:

"Here we are again. We could hardly wait to return. We came early for our vacation check-up."

"I look forward to our returning. I never heard of a place like this. Your doctor prayed with me before the operation. That's why I am here."

"I want to tell you that I am glad I have found there is still good in the world."

"Everybody seems to like to work here, really enjoys his work. Most places you go people seem to have chips on their shoulders."

"A lady came to the library wanting to find the following quotation as she said it expressed her experience:

"Truth from his lips prevailed with double sway,

And fools, who came to scoff, remained to pray."

"In visiting one of our patients for the last time before she left the Sanitarium, she told me she had a remarkable dream during the early part of her stay here.

"During the night she was having what she termed a narrative dream when all of a sudden a voice seemed to speak to her, saying, 'You need Jesus Christ: find Him.' She said she awoke all of a tremble but not at all alarmed. This gave her something of a spirit of inquiry, and the constant kindness and courtesy of our nurses and other attendants made her feel that she could find the Lord here. She had an open mind to receive the studies which were given to her.

"Time will permit me to give only a few quotations from letters which have been received from patients who have returned to their homes:

"I was a bed patient at the Sanitarium, but I did so appreciate your splendid and inspiring discourses over the broadcasting system. Likewise did I appreciate your calling on me in my hour of distress. I feel that certainly this is the Lord's work."

"Your kind thought and nice prayers are always a savor of life. I hope that you and your associate workers are well. God bless them. I am working hard as can be and am well."

"I wish to thank you again for the wonderful help you gave me in the study of the Bible, and I hope that our friendship may soon be renewed by further study of the Scriptures and prayer."

"I shall never forget my stay at the St. Helena Sanitarium. I truly was ill, but you were all so good to me. I shall always feel that your prayers were heard."

"This morning I was baptized by Elder Hall, and I am so happy that it has taken place. You are always in my prayers as I am sure I am in yours.' This lady was at the Sanitarium about three months and studied the Bible with us all the time she was here. She had been a reader of the *Signs of the Times* for a number of years. Her name was referred to Elder Hall at Eureka, and he did faithful work for her.

"We have good reason to believe that what tangible results we have seen are matched by corresponding impressions of a spiritual nature upon others who have not expressed themselves. The full results of our work will be known only in the hereafter." C. L. TORREY.

One missionary writes that his little dispensary needs the following: "Some tooth forceps, including a pair of elevators, some lowers with the extra bend in them to get to back teeth through a small mouth or one that cannot open because of swelling in the jaw, also some uppers of the same order; in fact, a good set of about ten lowers, uppers, and for fronts would be most welcome."

If our dentists have an extra pair of any of these tools that they will care to donate to mission dispensaries, we shall be happy to have these sent to the home missionary department of the General Conference and we will send them on to foreign fields.

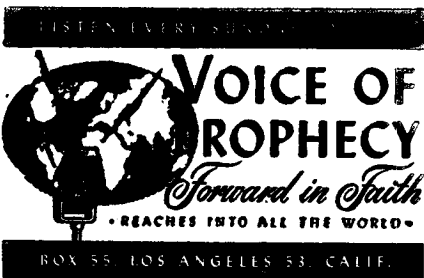
**"Great Peace Have They"**

Jemison, assistant professor of religion, will teach some classes to the four students that are participating in the effort and will do part-time work in connection with the effort.

The music department of Pacific Union College will provide some special music for the meetings. The College string quartet under Prof. John J. Hafner, the A Cappella Choir directed by Prof. J. Wesley Rhodes, and the College orchestra under Professor Hafner will be heard at various times.

## Extension Courses in Mexico

Extension courses in Mexico will be given by Pacific Union College during the summer of 1949 for graduate or undergraduate students of Spanish or history and teachers of Spanish in secondary schools. The courses will be conducted on the campus of the Escuela Agricola Industrial Mexicana, Seventh-day Adventist Training School at Montemorelos, state of Nuevo Leon.

Instruction will begin at Montemorelos June 13. Course offerings will include intermediate Spanish, two advanced courses in Spanish, an upper

division course and a graduate seminar in the history of the Caribbean area.

Instructors will be: Dr. L. M. Hamilton, head of the history department; Prof. G. B. Taylor, head of the Spanish department and director of the extension courses in Mexico; and Mrs. Gladys King-Taylor, instructor in Spanish.

### Report on the Feather River Sanitarium Project

Paradise, California

The Feather River Sanitarium and Hospital, situated in the hills of Paradise, eighteen miles east of Chico, is being established by a group of physicians, ministers and laymen who have given earnest study to the light that has been given us through the Spirit of prophecy regarding our medical institutions.

A corporation was formed, a board of directors elected, also an advisory committee. Then the matter of finances loomed upon the horizon. Armed with the statement: "The Lord would move upon worldly men, even idolators, to give of their abundance for the support of the work, if we would approach them wisely, and give them an opportunity of doing those things which it is their privilege to do." *Testimonies to Ministers*, page 197,

we set forth to raise funds for the sanitarium project.

God blessed our efforts in a wonderful way, and within a few months we are able to make the following report: 106½ acres of wooded land purchased, 6 acres planted in garden (on rebuilt soil), large warehouse 60 x 30 ft. built (all materials donated), ground cleared and excavated ready for building operations, over one mile of well-graveled roads have been built, \$65,000 in cash pledges from wealthy farmers and business men, 150,000 feet of lumber donated and delivered, and 150,000 feet to be delivered as soon as the weather permits, 1275 tons of ready-mix concrete, 1½-ton flat-bed truck, ½-ton pick-up truck, four-yard dump truck, all completely overhauled and painted, with the sanitarium name lettered on the sides; 1000 gallons of gasoline, a storage tank with a 550-gallon capacity and a pump, 6000 feet of reinforcing steel, \$2000 worth of beds for the sanitarium, a wood planer, two large electric motors, paint, shovels, axes, and a tractor, all donated. We also have about \$2500 pledged in labor.

In connection with the sanitarium we have an experimental garden, and we needed a special type of fertilizer to enrich the soil. We were able to secure 1200 tons of the best fertilizer. This is worth approximately \$2500.

Many other items have been donated, too numerous to mention. Men and women have given of their time to sit with us in council meetings to discuss the many problems. Others have invested their money without interest. The ladies have formed an auxiliary and are working to raise funds to furnish the sanitarium kitchen. The people in the surrounding communities have their eyes turned upon Paradise and are anxiously waiting to see the outcome of this non-profit, self-supporting sanitarium which they have helped to build. As soon as the weather clears the concrete will be poured for the foundation, and then it will be only a matter of months before the doors will be opened to serve the people who need the physical and spiritual help which the workers will be prepared to give.

Every person who has taken part in this project has been richly blessed, and our prayer is that many souls may be won for God's kingdom as a result

of heeding God's command and building a memorial to Him.

Indeed, the assurance which the Spirit of prophecy so clearly sets forth, that largely through the printed page will the third angel's message be given to the world, is of special significance in this late hour of earth's history.

Last year our people responded nobly to this missionary call, and shall we not unitedly—a year nearer the end of probation, a year nearer the time of trouble that has already begun to come upon the earth—re-double our efforts to do even more in circulating this gospel-filled periodical than we did a year ago?

### Evangelistic News

If by the aid of some super-television, you could have looked in on the arena of the Oakland Civic Auditorium at 8:30 o'clock on Sunday night of March 13, as the first meeting of the East Bay Evangelistic Campaign was getting under way, your heart would have thrilled. You would have seen a robed choir of 100 sitting on the stage. You would have noticed to the right of the pulpit an eight-foot figure of a man, illustrating the composite metal man of Daniel 2. But most striking of all you would have seen 3,450 people listening intently to the sure word of prophecy.

The offering at this opening meeting was \$640.31. There were 877 of the non-Adventists sufficiently interested to turn in their names and addresses for a copy of the sermon of the evening or for the Bible Course. In many cases one name represents husband and wife, who were both present, so that 877 names gathered on this opening night before the sermon was preached, represents a total of interested people far

in excess of the 877 names turned in. It is gratifying to note that 507 requested the Bible Correspondence Course, and 1,240 reserved seat tickets were requested for the next Sunday night's lecture.

On the program stub where these people turned in their names, there was a place where they indicated to what denomination they belonged, or checked a square if they belonged to no church. It is interesting to note that among these 877 non-Adventists, who turned in their names, 462 are not members of any church, while 415 are members of various denominations. This means that over one-half the non-Adventist part of the audience are people from the world with no religious affiliation. This speaks well for this evangelism, and should be a matter for serious reflection by some of our church enemies, who are so quick to fight our public evangelistic campaigns. We are reaching hundreds of people with the gospel, whom all the other churches combined are not reaching. This fact will be made use of here in a prominent way, if organized opposition should arise as the campaign proceeds.

While there is no accurate way of knowing how many of the 3,450 people at the first meeting were Adventists, those who are acquainted with the area are of the opinion that at least one-half of the opening audience, if not more, were non-Adventists. The tabulation on the request stubs turned in at the meeting appears to confirm this.

#### Good Results from Preparing the Field

The interest at the meetings to a large extent stems forth from the work which was done in preparing the field. A total of 3,848 reserved tickets for this first lecture were requested by non-Adventists, by their own written request mailed to our office, or by calling our office telephone, before this opening Sunday on which the first lecture was delivered. We had in our files 3,591 requests for the Bible Course before the first sermon was preached. At the first workers' meeting on Monday afternoon following this opening Sunday night of March 13, we turned over to the workers 3,973 names of interested people in this Bay area, who had either written in to our office or telephoned the office for the Bible Course or reserved seat tickets for the first lecture. It pays to prepare the soil before you sow the seed from the pulpit.

While our company of workers is

large, it is not nearly large enough. Many of them have twice as many names as they can handle now, to say nothing of many additional names, which will come in as the campaign moves forward. Pray for these workers and these people whose names they have, that hundreds may be won for the faith of Jesus and the commandments of God.

A glass jar with screen top, shovel, sack, and container to carry shells will be useful to bring. Wear old, heavy shoes to protect feet.

Several conchology guides will be present to help identify shells at field stations and will aid in the hunt.

in getting a shell collection for an M.V. vocational honor in Conchology, or those wishing to add to their present collection plan to come on this nature trip.

## Nature Study for M.V. Leaders

One of the most important phases of M.V. work is nature study. The realization of this fact is leading to vigorous activity on the part of many M.V. leaders in organizing nature clubs in conferences and large church centers.

Along with the development of nature study in the churches must go the training of nature leaders. Many are forced, because of their own unfamiliarity with the field, to depend on others to present their programs and field studies. While at times the assistance of others is desirable, yet on the M.V. leader depends to a large degree the success of the project, and he ought to be sufficiently acquainted with the world of living things to be able to direct nature clubs and nature activities, and to contribute his part to their success.

The Mendocino Biological Field Station of Pacific Union College offers courses that give the background needed for successful nature leadership. Not only courses, but experience, as well, assist in building up nature knowledge

of the finest type. A student may enroll for work in botany, ornithology, nature education, ecology, mammalogy, or marine life. While pursuing his studies, he undergoes delightful experiences in observing the birds, trees, and flowers on the shore, or along the river, or in searching for the marvelous array of sea life at low tide.

It is possible in the course in Nature Education to complete several vocational honors in nature. One young woman completed nine such honors last summer. There ought to be many more who will do the same. Some leaders in our churches, aside from the teachers, would find the study very profitable.

There has been some fear on the part of those who are not at present at college, that the work is so technical that they could not do it. This need not deter anyone of ordinary scholastic ability from taking certain courses. While some of the work is technical, other courses, particularly the one in Nature Education, are organized in such a way that they do not depend on a large amount of highly technical information.
