### Marine Sabbath Ruling

It is gratifying to be able to announce that the United States Marine Corps has joined the United States Air Force and the United States Navy in issuing a general Sabbath ruling. These three branches of our military forces now have Sabbath rulings which apply to all their personnel and all their installations and ships. The only branch of the military forces not having such a general Sabbath ruling, but only camp and installation rulings, is the Army. We shall not stop working with the Army to join the other three branches. The Sabbath ruling for the Marines

is as follows:

1. As specified in reference (a), it is the commanding officer's responsibility in commands to which chaplains are attached to

a cause divine services to be held on Sundays whenever the weather and other circumstances allow it to be done, and otherwise to provide for the observance of Sunday.

2. Personnel of the Marine Corps, however, whose strong religious convictions require them to observe some day other than Sunday as their Sabbath, and to refrain on their Sabbath from any but the most essential work, are entitled to respect for their religious convictions. To the extent that military conditions permit, personnel who celebrate the Sabbath on a day other than Sunday will be afforded opportunity to observe the requirements of their religious principles, and should normally be excused from duty on that day to the same extent

that other personnel are excused on Sunday. In all such cases they will be required to perform full duty on Sunday in order that their religious beliefs will not result in lesser or lighter duty than performed by other persons. Decision as to whether or not work is essential will be the prerog-

It must not be thought that the consideration thus thown us in these three branches of the military services alters in any way the counsel which we have formerly given and which we still adhere to, that the Army Medical Corps is the best place for our Seventh-day Adventist men. We do not really belong in the Marines and no noncombatant should join either the Air Force or the Navy, which do not take draftees, or any other force by voluntary enlistment. Our best procedure is to wait to be drafted and thus protect ourselves by all the concessions which have been given us in law and in Army regulations to maintain our noncombatant status.

We are pleased indeed that these other branches of the Armed Forces are recognizing the principles of religious liberty and providing for such men as get into them to have their Sabbaths free. But do not let this be an encouragement to any Seventh-day Adventist draft-age man to voluntarily enlist in any of these services.

# La Sierra College

### La Sierra Summer School in England

Summer school in England for credit on the books of La Sierra College was approved by the college board at its January meeting. A lower division English literature survey course of six semester hours, and a combination of six additional upper division hours in English literature will be taught by La Sierra College teachers while the students are in residence in England. Plans call for classroom lectures and study, correlated with side trips to places of pertinent value.

Tentatively one day in the middle of the week, and one day at the end of the week will be used for short trips. It is planned to take a half week for a trip to Scotland and a week and a half for a trip to France and Holland. These trips, with six weeks for full standard classroom credit, will mean eight weeks from arrival in England until date of return to the United States—in ample time for the next school year.

This seems like an attractive opportunity for students to get the broadening effects of travel, close acquaintance with a respected kindred people and their countryside, and familiarity with great historical and literary landmarks.

Some details are yet to be settled, but the aim is to keep expenses as low as feasible. Practically the only expense in excess of that for attending summer school in America will be transportation.

Inquiries from those interested in participating in this project should be addressed to the English Department or to the registrar at La Sierra College.

### Dean Woods Resigns to Join C.M.E. Staff

Dr. Robert W. Woods, dean of La Sierra College for the past year and a half, will become research bio-physicist . at the College of Medical Evangelists at Loma Linda early in February. In addition to serving as dean of the college, he has taught several mathematics courses here.

Dr. Woods has taught in denominational schools since 1921. During World War II he was visiting professor and lecturer in electronics at Harvard University. He served as president of Union College from 1946 to 1950.

### Faith for Today Crusade for Christ

Spirit of prophecy instruction regarding work in the cities emphasizes that it will be necessary to "put forth extraordinary efforts in order to arrest the attention of the multitudes. . . . They (ministers) must make use of every means that can possibly be devised for causing the truth to stand out clearly and distinctly."

As one of the means to follow this counsel, the Faith for Today Crusade for Christ has a dignified and effective plan of advertising. There are three avenues for the publicity: display cards, newspaper advertising, and direct mailing.

Beginning February 3, busses will carry outside cards, imprinted with the Cross and Bible motif of the Crusade and information regarding the meetings. These will be changed periodically during the evangelistic series. Members of the Eagle Rock, La Crescenta, Burbank, Glendale City, and Glendale Sanitarium churches will also distribute 1,000 window cards in their communities.

Advertising is being used in the weekly and daily papers of the participating communities and in one of the Los Angeles metropolitan papers. Roger Coon, pastor of the Hawthorne church, is doing the work in these fields of publicity.

From the church office of the Crusade committee, Mrs. Marion Osborn has been directing the building of the direct mailing list. Originally planned as a 4,000 name list, it has grown to 8,000 names. One thousand of these who are listeners to the Voice of Prophecy radio broadcast and who live in this area, have received a special letter of invitation to the Crusade meetings from Elder H. M. S. Richards. All 8,000 names on file will receive a weekly card of invitation with a list of the sermon topics for the coming week.

As the advertising fulfills its mission and the people attend the meetings, the greater challenge must be met to "bear messages of a character so out of the usual order that the people will be aroused and warned." Elder John Osborn, in preparing his sermons thoughtfully and prayerfully, is endeavoring to tie his message to current world trends and needs. His topics for February 6, 8, and 10, Wednesday, Friday, and Sunday nights, in the Glendale Civic Auditorium will be "Two" Witnesses Attacked by the Beast from the Bottomless Pit," "Sure Escape from the Devastating Atom," and "Are We Headed for Armageddon?"

Publishing Department: Last year was a good year for our colporteurs in this conference. In 1951 they delivered \$94,000 worth of truth-filled books and magazines. We thank the Lord for this fine gain of more than \$24,000, and for the 44 precious souls brought into the message as the direct result of colporteur contacts. With the blessings of the Lord, the consecrated colporteurs of our field expect to deliver \$110,000 worth of subscription literature in 1952.

They have also set a goal of 100 souls to be baptized through the influence of the colporteurs and the literature  $\frac{1}{4}$  they deliver.

Colporteur Rally: A colporteur rally will be held at the conference office February 17 at 9 a.m. There is still room in the colporteur army. Why not join them now?

Church School Teachers: To keep all church schools supplied with teachers is a real task. In spite of our efforts not to change teachers too often, there are always more changes taking place than we wish. Brother Simonson, Educational secretary of the conference, was at Pacific Union College recently interviewing prospective teachers.

Church Officers' Meeting: January 13 was a high day for all church officers of the Southern California Conference. At least 800 were in attendance and heard Elder C. L. Bauer, union conference president, give a challenging sermon in the Rupp Memorial Chapel. Immediately after the sermon a male chorus sang a beautiful consecration hymn, after which the entire congrega- tion stood and Elder Ashbaugh led in a consecration prayer. Before separating into smaller groups, Elder Merlin Neff of the Pacific Press gave excellent instruction to all of the officers. Thirteen different officer groups met until three o'clock, at which time the entire group inet in the Rupp Memorial Chapel for another general meeting. The session closed at four o'clock, and all felt that it was a very profitable meeting. It was also the desire of all officers that two such meetings should be conducted each year.

Brother Mark is a credentialed colporteur and will work in that capacity in our conference. We welcome these fine people to our staff of loyal workers.

Workers' Meeting: Monday, February 4, all conference workers will meet in the Glendale City church, 9:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. A number of very important items are up for consideration. Elder J. L. McElhany will give the devotional study starting promptly at 9:30.

### Where There Is a Will

The Investment secretary of one of our smaller schools had a will. She wanted to do something for missions, and the plan selected was the Investment program. So that you will get the picture I am telling you the story largely in her own words.

"About the middle of the year I sent for this device (a bee hive) for an inspiration to raise money for investment. You see, we only have about 28 active members, but you made our goal \$175 for 50 members. Many of them are not here anymore, and of course a few inactive ones as always. Some undertook projects to raise money, but by November I knew I must plan something whereby the whole body might help. So on December 15 at 7:00 p.m. in the hall where we used to meet we had a secular program and dinner served cafeteria style and we raised over \$50 clear on that. On our device, every time we took up a project to make money for Investment we placed a working bee on the chart, and every time we raised \$7 we filled a section of the hive with honey and colored it vellow. Well, on Sabbath morning, December 20 we were still about \$55 short of our goal. One of our good brothers had promised us some potatoes for Investment purposes if we would come and get them and sell them. So on Sunday, December 30, in a blinding snow my husband and I started over the mountain with a trailer behind our car and drove 130 miles that day returning with both car and trailer loaded with potatoes. We sold them that same evening to a restaurant and swelled the fund \$48 more. As we had worked so hard that day and were still just a few dollars under our goal, our treasurer was so kind as to make up the balance, and we went over the top by 19 cents.

"Since our little church has never raised but a few dollars for Investment we all felt very happy. We have been working to get school equipment as well as Investment, so I had a half-way mark offering in the middle of the quarter for 13th Sabbath to avoid so much coming at Christmas time. We took in \$20 then, and then on the 13th Sabbath we marched around and placed our mission gifts at the feet of a large picture of Jesus, and we realized \$39.93 from the offering. That total amount of \$59.93 was the largest ever raised, and again we thank the Lord for His goodness."

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### Santa Cruz Progress

The church at Santa Cruz has had a very busy year in 1951. During this time with the cooperation and encouragement of Elder C. A. Heitman and Elder L. W. Hallsted, our laymen held cottage meetings with the result that twenty-two were baptized and taken into church fellowship. Brother Stevens carried the burden of the baptismal classes. On January 12, Elder Heitman baptized four and took one more into church fellowship on profession of faith, thus concluding the laymen's effort for 1951.

Throughout the year the church members distributed 23,767 booklets and periodicals. A total of 681 Bible readings were given, and over six thousand hours were spent in Christian help work, including the time spent in sorting clothing at the clothing depot for overseas shipment.

The clothing department sent away 1049 bales of clothing that weighed about 209,000 pounds. Elder Brown has now arrived and taken charge of the management of the clothing depot and will be several weeks increasing its facilities at the Monterey Bay Academy. Student labor is largely used in getting the bales ready for shipment.

Together with the Soquel church we will conduct a newspaper compaign to advertise the different features of our message, using the set of mats developed by the General Conference and each article will appear weekly opposite the church page of the local newspaper. The churches will share equally the cost of this publicity while our local conference assumes the cost of all inquiries and requests for tracts, booklets, etc. We are praying that this venture will pay off in 1952.

### THE LAY PREACHER'S CORNER

### XXVIII. Let's Make a Sermon

9. Now that we have our material gathered together, the next step is to test the unity of the sermon by working out what is variously called a Proposition, a Theme, or a Sermon Sentence. You really do not have a sermon until it can be expressed in one not too complicated sentence. If you have to use more than one sentence, or add many clauses to the sermon sentence . in order to cover all parts of the discourse, you have two or three sermons instead of one, and must eliminate those parts that do not belong until the unified material which remains can all be summed up in a good proposition.

How does the Proposition differ from the Purpose? The proposition is the sermon summed up, the purpose is what you want to do by means of the . sermon. They may be closely related, . they may be different. Our purpose was, Convincingly to show from the Bible and the writings of Mrs. E. G. White that God has an equal, active and almighty interest in the welfare of each one of His children. The proposition might read, The record of God's dealings with men, and the many promises in the Bible and the Testimonies, give us absolute assurance of His individual and unlimited care for each one of us.

As we move to the tenth step, and organize the material into the final outline, each item is checked by the proposition. If it proves to be extraneous it is rejected. Only in this way can we be sure of unity in the finished . product. Without unity the attention . of the hearers will be diverted from the central theme and they will be uncertain of what we are seeking to drive home. WILLIAM T. HYDE.
