## Academy Youth Attend Governor's Council

Nearly five hundred youth from all parts of northern California were enthusiastic attendants at Governor Knight's conference on narcotics held in the Capitol in Sacramento, December 13. Two students and a faculty sponsor were selected to represent each high school.

This included representatives from the following academies: Golden Gate, Lodi, Monterey Bay, and Mountain View.

As each young person registered he was given a program for the day, together with a free copy of *Listen* magazine, our Journal of Better Living. We were delighted to watch the favorable reception given this outstanding periodical by students, teachers, and officials alike. *Listen* is finding a wonderful niche of service in this most important field of education.

After the governor's challenging address the students and faculty members were divided into discussion groups where they could share their thinking with government officials in an endeavor to crystalize recommendations which will strengthen the efforts being made against the use of narcotics. It was heartening to see how the work of the American Temperance Society academy

chapters is bearing fruit. Our students were head and shoulders above their fellows because they knew where they were going and the basic problem underlying narcotic addiction among teen agers.

Typical was Miss Janice Whitten of Mountain View Academy, who set forth her convictions in a clear way when she said: "I think we would help considerably in the solution of this problem if we would warn our youth concerning the hazards of smoking and drinking alcoholic beverages. For if they did not smoke or drink the majority of them would never be tempted to use other narcotics." The chairman was quick to say, "I feel I must agree."

It is good to see men of official responsibility concerned with the moral problems of society. Surely we should give them all the encouragement we can to advance good in the land.

These periodicals are the Review, the Youth's Instructor, the bi-monthly Serviceman's paper known as the Loyalty Newsletter, the Sabbath School Quarterly, and a number of other tracts and leaflets. By special arrangement of the publishers we are also able to offer all servicemen the regular monthly missionary publica-tions, These Times or The Message Magazine. All this fine service we are prepared to give to every man in the service, regardless of location, and regardless of his frequent changes in address if the War Service Commission of the General Conference is informed concerning the man.

We are appealing, therefore, for the support of every pastor, church elder, and father and mother of every boy in the service to help us obtain and maintain this very vital information. Your boys are passing through the greatest crisis in their lives when they respond to the call of their country. They need these weekly visits. They need these monthly visits with our good church missionary papers. They need frequent letters of encouragement and spiritual comfort. There is but one reason and one reason only if your boy is denied this help. It is because his church does not have his name and address. If you will follow the suggestion given here such a misfortune need never happen to your boy. Here's how:

If he is in the service NOW, and is not receiving these papers, drop a card to your conference office giving his name, rank, service number, and address. Whenever there is a change in his address, see that this information is also promptly sent us. Perhaps there is a serviceman's secretary in your church through whom you may send this information. If not, do it yourself. The important thing is to see that this information goes in as promptly as possible upon each change of address. The conference will forward all such names and addresses to the office of the War Service Commission of the General Conferene and your boy will be placed on the mailing list for all these good papers. It is free for the asking.

As soon as your son (or husband) receives his orders to report to his first permanent place of training, be it Fort Sam Houston or wherever it may be, send this information on promptly. One of our chaplains, either a civilian or a military chaplain at this training center

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

## Freedom's Closing Door

The week of January 15-22 has been designated as Religious Liberty Week, to be observed by Seventh-day Adventists throughout the world as a period in which by act and contemplation we seek to restrain the hands of those who would banish our right to worship freely and in a manner of our own choosing.

For some, religious liberty is not an easy thing to attain.

Consider the fear that must stab at the heart of an Adventist family—the only one in any village for miles around —when the local school teacher, a very influential man, stirs up a hating mob against them because they choose not to belong to the dominant religion of their part of Indonesia.

Or consider the sense of futility in the heart of the church minister in Rome who sees civilian clothed police of his city rip down the church sign each time he puts it up.

Or imagine the frustration of mis-

sionaries in scores of lands where meetings must be conducted in secret and to openly acclaim one's religion brings abuse, torture and sometimes death.

Let us remember during Religious Liberty Week that freedom's door is already shut tight in much of the world. How long it stays open elsewhere depends quite largely on each of us. Remember to bring a liberal offering on Sabbath, January 22.



#### The Alumni Help

For a long time Prof. H. W. Clark has pioneered work at P.U.C.'s Mendocino Biological Field Station. At times it's been hard going with primitive facilities and inadequate budgets. Recently, however, Professor Clark has been getting help from a very gratifying source—the P.U.C. alumni.

In recent months the station has added a <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub>-ton pick-up truck to the equipment available. This was made possible by gifts from Dr. Charles Anderson of Anchorage, Alaska, and Dr. Harold Graham of Sacramento, California.

Now under way are plans for complete modernization of the station's water system. New pumping and plumbing systems are to be installed. Much of this work will be made possible by a fund sponsored by college alumni—notably Dr. William Greene of Bakersfield.

Professor Clark talks hopefully of a new laboratory building for the station to replace the old lumber-mill structures which have been in use in past years.

#### New Beginning

As the Registrar's Office counted noses (or rather registration books) for the new quarter last week, it developed that between 30 and 40 new students had turned up on campus for the beginning of the winter quarter.

Classing these recent arrivals as "new" students, was only partly correct, however. There was a good sprinkling of names and faces that were familiar around the campus—returning service men back from the far corners of the earth.

But there were *new* arrivals who came from far places also. Philip Giddings, a graduate student in education, came from Monrovia, Liberia, West Africa. Short, smiling, Phil Giddings was here to learn school administration techniques which he could apply to his West Africa school problems.

As the quarter started all the students, new and old, seemed in the mood for a new beginning. As President Sonnenberg put it in his new year's welcome at the opening convocation, they seemed impressed by the size and clearness of the "white canvas" before them.

#### **Better Health**

Sponsored by the Student Association of the college, this week is Student Health Week.

Beginning Friday, January 7 with student-faculty panel at assembly time, the week has concentrated on practical health problems. Among the guest speakers was Dr. Mary C. McReynolds, now of Loma Linda but a long-time member of the P.U.C. faculty.
