"He was baptized and accepted into church fellowship during the month of May." But this is the sequel to a thrilling story in which *Signs of the Times* made the initial appeal. Brother LaVerne Albin, whose picture is presented with this story, operated a tire and supply store in Wellington, Kansas. Whenever the late Elder J. R. Williams visited him during Ingathering he always responded liberally. Following



the usual procedure the pastor sponsored a *Signs* subscription for him. Frequently it found a final resting place in the wastebasket. In due time, however, its heart-warming message prompted him to enroll in the Bible correspondence course featured in *Signs*.

The lesson on the Sabbath question temporarily chilled his enthusiasm. Visiting the local library a few days later, he found ample confir-

It is interesting to observe the steps and agencies involved in bringing Brother Albin to that thrilling and dramatic moment, when he received the hand of welcome to fellowship with the remnant church:

1. An Ingathering contact by the pastor of the church.
2. A sponsored subscription to *Signs of the Times*.
3. Enrollment in the Bible correspondence course.
4. A final Sabbath morning visit to

the Adventist church in his home town.

5. Continued visits and indoctrination by the pastor.

6. Baptism and the hand of fellowship.

7. Currently engaged in literature-evangelistic work in Kansas.

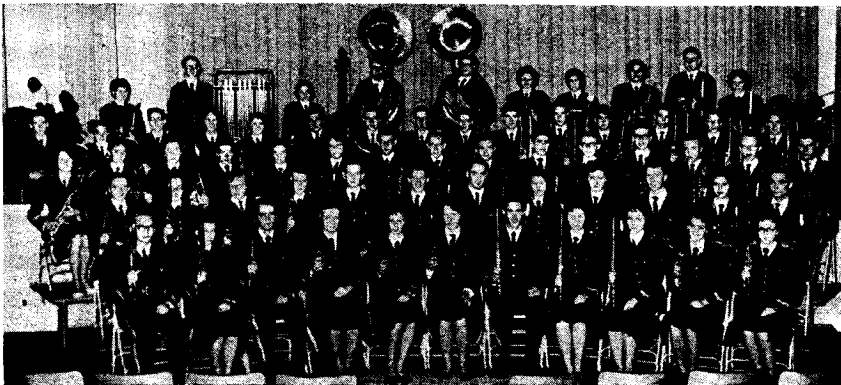

Three Students Awarded State Scholarships

California State Scholarships for the school year 1959-1960 have been awarded to three Pacific Union College students, and two others have been named as alternates. Four academy students who took the test in January were also listed as alternates. They are Barbara Howe, Pacific Union College Preparatory School; Sherman McCormick, Mountain View Union Academy; Gary Bradley, Monterey Bay Academy; and Stephen Grice, Walnut Creek.

According to a report from the business office, there are seven students currently attending college on State Scholarship Awards.

Several additions to the college staff have been announced by M. E. Mathisen, academic dean. Allan B. Munroe, M.D., has accepted a call to head the health education program of the college. Along with being the student physician, he will teach health education and premedical courses and coordinate the health and physical education program. Dr. Munroe will arrive on campus about the first of August.

Prof. J. G. Fallon, former coordinator of the health education program, has been granted a two-year leave of absence for further study. He flew to Europe last week to be a participating delegate in the Fourth International Conference of the International Union for Health Education of the Public. The meetings, which are being held in Dusseldorf,

Germany, and Geneva, Switzerland, are for the purpose of advancing public health education. Professor Fallon, who is accompanied by his young son John, will spend some time following the conference visiting schools and other institutions to study the health program.

Enola Davis, currently the coordinator of the collegiate nursing program at PUC, Manila, and the Manila Sanitarium and Hospital, will join the nursing education department in September. Miss Davis will teach in the clinical areas of medical and surgical nursing.

Assisting in the chemistry department will be James Larson, a graduate student in the field of chemistry.
