Other training courses are in preparation. Your conference Sabbath school secretary can recommend many books for reading and study that will help you to become "a workman that needeth not to be ashamed."

The Light Went Out

After ten years on the air in Chicago, Faith for Today has been discontinued by ABC-TV Station WBKB, Channel 7, as the result of new station policy eliminating all paid religious time. The last program was released on October 2. Under the new arrangement, only 90 minutes of time will be allowed for religious programming each week by the station—this hour and a half to be divided among all religious organizations on a free basis.

This is but the handwriting on the wall. Often stations are thinking in this direction. With greater clarity we can understand Eph. 5:16: "Redeeming the time, because the days are evil."

In many areas Faith for Today is aired on a public service basis. How important it is in areas where Faith for Today is viewed that you periodically write the station, telling of your appreciation! More than once this has been a deciding factor when the question has come up as to whether or not the station

should continue the program. Stations are influenced a great deal by viewers' reactions.

If Faith for Today should ever be taken off the air, and you have never written a single letter of appreciation to the station, you have no brief. Work as never before to tell your friends to view the program. It is conceivable that the time will come when you will have wished you had invited someone to view the program. San Diego Union Academy Completes Major Improvements

San Diego Union Academy opened the new year with an enrollment of 170 students, the largest enrollment in the history of the school. It has been necessary to divide several classes because of the crowded condition of the classrooms. However, the large enrollment is a real inspiration to the faculty as it shows the loyal support of the parents in the area. The faculty is determined with the Lord's help to make this year one of real Christian experience for each youth.

During the past year and through the summer months several major improvements have been completed. Five new classrooms have been built to accommodate the large increase in enrollment in both the elementary and academy sections. Four of the rooms are now in use by the elementary school and another large room is used by the academy vocal and choral departments. This building project was completed at a cost of \$62,000, with the conference, churches, and school providing the funds.

In August the board authorized the grading, leveling, and surfacing with uncrushed granite the playground area to the west of the main campus. The cost of this long-needed improvement was \$7,200 and was paid for with funds made available by the nine churches and the academy. This development now provides almost five acres of playground and physical education facilities. The faculty and students appreciate so much the loyal support of the pastors and parents throughout the entire city in making this fine play area a reality.

Other improvements completed during the past summer include the expansion of the accounting and registrar's offices. Approximately 400 square feet has been added to the two offices. A new custodial building was built to house the campus equipment, provide storage space for supplies, and repair facilities for the school plant. An extensive painting project included work on

the ceilings of the walkways, several classroom interiors, trim on the outside, and outside walls.

Livermore Church Dedicatory Service

Sabbath, October 8, is a day long to be remembered by the members of the Livermore church, as that was the day of the dedicatory services for their new house of worship. Elder R. R. These faithful members held services in a number of places until the present church was begun.

Although the bids for construction were much higher in price, with many hours of donated labor by members and friends this house of worship was constructed at an approximate cost of \$35,000, including furnishings and land-scaping. The members are deeply grateful to Doctors Henry and Grace Devnich for providing the church with a grand piano and the beautiful pews,

and also to the Nixon family for the pulpit which Sister Nixon's father made just prior to his death.

As the new school year started this past September, another dream was realized with the opening of the first church school in Livermore. Truly our hearts are filled with thanksgiving that, in spite of human frailties, God leads and His work in this part of the vineyard goes forward. A quiet agricultural community in southern Alameda County in 1947, Livermore is now known as one of the nuclear capitals of the nation because of the work being carried on there in the field of nuclear science. We are grateful that the Livermore church definitely is letting its light shine.



Adventist Hour Influence

"Roll tape!"

"Tape rolling."

"Stand by one. Stand by two. Steady on your close-up one. Here I come two. Stand by audio. Roll-ET."

Those short, chopped directions are the behind-the-scenes way The Adventist Hour television program often begins. They are split-second commands of KTLA's Adventist Hour director who sits before a panel of five television screens, buttons, switches, and an exhausting interchange of voices in a mobile command truck somewhere near the Adventist church from which the program is being televised.

For the next 56 minutes and 40 seconds those commands are continuous. 

Rehearsals began Sabbath, November 5, in the new choir room at Glendale church and will continue each Sabbath at 2:30 through December 3 at the same place.



Hawaii Calls

In the light of the great controversy between truth and error we understand that where the opportunities to advance the message are the greatest there will also be seemingly insurmountable problems. A most difficult task is to group words together in their proper relationship to give a true perspective of the literature work in the fiftieth state.

President Eisenhower has signed a bill releasing ten million dollars for the development of the new East-West Center on the Island of Oahu, a project to bring better understanding between Eastern and Western cultures. Tourism in this new state is big business and thousands of restless seekers of happiness are flowing in and out of the Islands. A transient military population make up ten per cent of the Island people. Also an Island population of approximately 600,000 with mixed races, cultures, and creeds is constantly plagued with presentations of many false forms of a way of life for themto accept.

Considering the facts, it appears that God's people of Hawaii have similar opportunities to those that the Jews of old had in Jerusalem. Yes, Hawaii is a unique place in the world for spreading the message. We must not fail our God as Israel did of old. There are few other fields that have the potentials of Hawaii. Colporteurs are needed who are willing to be spent for God. Men are needed who will experiment and conquer systematically some real problems. Under the control of the Holy Spirit, new projects and plans must continually be sought to meet the needs of this field.

What is being done? A handful of loyal colporteurs are working. Recently a special project was launched on the windward side of the Island of Oahu. One lady contacted through the project said, "I am confused. I want to know how to know which is the true church." The colporteur presented a book answering her question—she purchased

Literature evangelists are Christian businessmen and their methods of selling, of collecting money, etc., must be guided by the highest Christian principles. People will recognize the difference and the work will advance. For example, a letter dated August 31, 1960, from a customer to a colporteur said: "You are truly a very nice man as you did not press me as some other people would have done." A check was enclosed in the envelope.

Rufino Bernardino, colporteur, walked with a customer of his down to the baptismal fount on Sabbath, September 3, 1960, and watched Elder Don Duncan raise him up out of the water to newness of life. Much work, time, and prayer was devoted to this our brother. First a sale of *Bible Stories*, then call backs and another sale, then taking him to evangelistic meetings, then Sabbath school, and finally baptism. It was over two years from the time of the first sale to the baptism with tender loving care along the way by a consecrated colporteur.

The Spirit of prophecy says, God "calls for volunteers who will put all their energies and enlightenment into the work, helping wherever there is opportunity. The Master calls for every one to do the part given him according to his ability. . . . Who will sacrifice ease and pleasure, and enter the places of error, superstition, and darkness,

working earnestly and perseveringly, speaking the truth in simplicity, praying initaith, doing house-to-house labor? ... We have no time to lose. We must encourage the work. Who will go forth now with our publications?"—C.M., pp. 13, 14.

Are not these statements appropriate for our time and for Hawaii?

Before my husband's death, he (Wilbert Wilcox) was secretary-treasurer of the old Inter-mountain Conference with headquarters at Grand Junction, Colorado. I was carrying the Sabbath school work in the conference and often helped in the office. One day a gentleman came into the office and asked for a copy of the Watchman magazine in

which he had seen an article on the Sabbath. In those days most of the Bible Houses did not stock the magazines; and, as we did not have a copy of the paper asked for, my husband turned to me and asked what he should give the gentleman. I suggested Marked Bible, which Wilbert gave him. The man took it home, and as a result such an interest was created that a minister was sent to the community and a public effort was held at Whitewater, Colorado. A small church was organized; and among those baptized was the gentleman who came into the office, his wife, another man and his wife and some of their children, and other individuals. Since that time I believe the church has been absorbed by the Grand Junction church.

After my husband's death in 1921, I went to the Inca Union Mission office in Lima, Peru, for a few years. Shortly after reaching Lima, I received a letter from the wife of the first man who came into the office. She stated that they wanted me to know that it was the copy of Marked Bible which her husband had received at the conference office that had made them decide for the Sabbath. One son of the second family was in the colporteur work for a while at least. After I came back to the States and was in Arizona I met a daughter of the second family, who with her husband was attending the Phoenix church. I told him the story of Marked Bible and he said, "That means me too, for it was through the influence of my wife's people that I was brought into the truth."


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
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


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Death of Elder Miklos

On Thursday, November 3, Elder John C. Miklos, who has been principal of the Pacific Union College Preparatory School for the past four years, gave up the struggle which he has been waging against leukemia since 1956. He passed away at the St. Helena Sanitarium at 11:45 a.m. The funeral services were held in Irwin Hall at Pacific Union College on Sunday morning, November 6.

The entire community has been saddened at the loss of this highly-respected and much-loved denominational leader. A large congregation and the banks of flowers from students, churches, the college, and individuals attested to the deep regard in which Elder Miklos was held. He had served the denomination loyally and well as a colporteur, academy Bible teacher, pastor, educational superintendent, Missionary Volunteer secretary, and academy principal.

During the funeral service, Dr. R. W. Fowler, president of the college, read several scriptures which were known to be precious to Elder Miklos. The Troubadours, a special choral group of the academy, sang "The Beautiful Hills" and "Never Part Again." The sermon was presented by Dr. A. G. Maxwell of the college Bible department. Dr. M. E. Mathisen, academic dean of the college, sang a solo, "Calvary." Organ music was provided by Mrs. Barbara Tonsberg, Preparatory School registrar, and viola music was brought by Dr. George Wargo of the college music department. The obituary was read by Elder A. H. Rulkoetter, and prayer was offered by Elder L. H. Hartin of the college Bible department.

Interment took place in the St. Helena Cemetery November 7.


