## Camp Meeting in Southern

Because of fire regulations, adjustments are necessary in the camping program. Last year a tent burned. Firemen went through the tents and found stoves, lamps, candles, etc. Representatives from the State Fire Marshal's office conrtinued their investigation and study of the fire hazard. We are living in a time of strict regulations. Their recommendations include the removal of a large number of family tents and the spending of thousands of dollars

meeting specifications.

The conference administration has spent a number of hours with representatives from the office of the State Fire Marshal. The requirements have been presented to the camp meeting and Conference committees. It is the unanimous opinion of both committees that it is impractical to erect the family tents. Basically, we have no choice in the matter. Fire regulations are written to give maximum protection to the public. The fire code has been upgraded year by year until now a tent village represents near insurmountable problems in qualifying. The fact that our campground is now surrounded by a residential area further emphasizes the hazard.

This announcement is made with regret. We know it will bring keen disappointment. Even though fire regulations have caused an adjustment, we believe camp meeting at Lynwood can remain one of the most important general meetings in the denomination. Two meetings will be conducted each week night beginning at 6 p.m. A full schedule will be maintained over the two weekends. We are developing a program that will give a maximum of fellowship and spiritual nourishment to the members of Southern. Join with us in praying that the spirit of God will flow unmeasured and unrestrained into the hearts of His people during this important convocation. We hope to see you Friday evening, June 16, at the Lynwood campground.


