It Is Written, the TV evangelistic program, has just been launched in Southeastern with rallies in the north, south, and west areas of the conference. Ten thousand enthusiastic laymen turned out and pledged \$105,000 to prove their interest! Elder George Vandeman (1), featured personality in the telecast series, challenged those present to commit themselves anew to Christ and permit God's Spirit to finish the work.

Rallies were held in Balboa Park, San Diego (2), and the Swing Auditorium in San Bernardino (3) on September 8. Orange County members met in Disneyland Hotel (4) September 22.

Previous to the rallies, two banquets were held for our physicians and dentists, one in San Diego at the El Cortez (5) and the other in the Loma Linda University Cafeteria (6). The response far exceeded available supplies as over 450 doctors and their wives attended these banquets, expressing their desire and eagerness to have a part in this unique form of evangelism.



Six hundred fifty-four Arizona boys and girls entered our 14 elementary and intermediate schools this year, which is a nice increase over last year's opening enrollment figures. Some of the classrooms are very crowded and additional facilities will be necessary in the future.

The Tempe school added a new classroom and a third teacher. The enrollment increased from 46 to 63, so the faith of those that worked on this project was rewarded.

Mr. Winston DeHaven has 42 seventh and eighth grade students in his room which means that desks are literally against the walls.

The Glendale school had to add another teacher when they found that they had 45 in the lower primary grades.

Mr. A. T. King has 14 pupils at the Patagonia school which is about double what they had last year.

The Navajo, Twin Buttes, and Maricopa Indian mission schools all have capacity enrollments.




Preaching By the Wayside

"For a man who had retired from active business 15 years ago, Brother D. E. Pierson of the Santa Rosa, California, church is leading anything but a life of relaxation. His current interest is the Investment program which is turning out to be almost a full-time activity. Some appliances are repaired to be sold through classified ads; soft rags are sold to mechanics, and coarser ones to rag dealers.

"Not only has the project brought in much-needed funds for missions, but it has also afforded opportunity to explain its purposes to many not of the Adventist faith. Brother Pierson is particularly gratified by the whole-hearted cooperation of the church members.



University President Speaks At LSC Founders' Day Fete

Dr. G. T. Anderson, president of Loma Linda University, gave the Founders' Day address commemorating the fortieth anniversary of La Sierra College October 3.

Special guests invited to the ceremony included representatives of Riverside and Corona city governments, businessmen, bankers, church officials, publishers of Riverside and Corona newspapers, and former presidents of the college.

Study by Dr. Tarr Reported In Journal of True Education

Results of a study of speech defects among children attending Seventh-day Adventist elementary schools in the Southeastern California Conference are reported in the October issue of *Journal of True Education*, in an article written by Dr. Wilfred F. Tarr, head of the Speech Department of La Sierra College.

A total of 1,268 youngsters attending five schools were included in the study, which consisted of a phonetic inventory, study of conversation, and a study of comprehension of sounds.

In his study, Dr. Tarr found a higher incidence of deviate speech in the church schools than in the public schools. He discovered that stuttering occurs less frequently in the church schools, but that other types of speech difficulty are found equally in both kinds of schools.

Parents and educators are invited to read the conclusions and recommendations made by Dr. Tarr in his report on the "Incidence of Speech Defects in Some Seventh-day Adventist Schools."

World Temperance Day, October 27

As each succeeding month brings further evidence that cigarette smoking constitutes



a major public health hazard, it is comforting to view the effort being made by the American Temperance Society to discourage smoking, particularly among young people.

Perhaps the most insidious aspect of the cigarette epidemic has been the massive use

the ranks of youthful smokers. It does not take an expert in motivation research to discover that the glorification of a game of tennis—followed by a smoke—or a brisk swim—followed by a smoke—is designed solely to convince youth that cigarette smoking is a concomitant of the good life.

If this were not sufficient proof of the youth-directed appeal of cigarette advertising, consider the sad fact that tobacco companies account for forty per cent of all national advertising placed in college newspapers.

The work of the American Temperance Society in helping to pierce the smoke-screen generated by the tobacco industry must stand as an inspiration and a model to all who are concerned with the welfare of the youth of this country.

reach every Adventist family. The Review has character and personality. It is the weekly visiting pastor of the denomination!

Many church members complain because they do not receive enough visits from their church pastor. They would welcome every visit and give their pastor undivided attention. If every family would thus welcome the weekly visits of the Review and give it similar undivided attention, they would find that the Review would bring them a rich spiritual blessing. It would not only give spiritual counsel but would take them around the world for a close look at our missionary work.

So much for the importance and place and value of the Review. I want to speak of the more mundane matter of how more families could be receiving the weekly visits of our "visiting pastor" and how more families could find more time to read the precious pages of our own church paper.

Nearly every family in America takes a daily newspaper. It is considered a necessity. But is it? In our home we have not taken a daily newspaper for more than twenty years. Why? There are several reasons. For one thing, I found to my surprise that I was spending an average of about thirty minutes a day reading it. How much time is that in a year? Not far from 200 hours, or a full working month out of the year! (A work week is forty hours. Four weeks in a month or four times forty hours equal 160 hours.)

Was I willing to go on spending a month out of every year just reading a newspaper, much of which was of dubious value? Then I remembered a timely and pertinent quotation from the Spirit of Prophecy writings. "Our time belongs to God. Every moment is His, and we are under the most solemn obligation to improve it to His glory. Of no talent He has given will He require a more strict account than of our time."—Christ's Object Lessons, p. 342.

The second reason we stopped taking a daily newspaper was the money we were spending for it. At \$1.50 a month it meant \$18 a year besides any tip for the newsboy. Now it happens that less than that, only \$15.95 (during this special Review and Herald campaign), will bring the Review and Herald and the entire Family Group to your home for an entire year.
