

Resolution on Spirit of Prophecy

[Following is a resolution that was voted at the General Conference session Friday, August 3, 1962.]

WHEREAS, The Lord through the Spirit of Prophecy has spoken to His church in these last days "to bring the minds of His people to His word" (Testimonies, vol. 5, p. 663); to impart to us a clearer understanding of future events and our mission and destiny as a people; to call attention to Bible "principles for the formation of correct habits of living" (Testimonies, vol. 5, pp. 663, 664); "for the comfort of His people" (Early Writings, p. 78); and to prepare us to meet the Lord, and

WHEREAS, The Spirit of Prophecy counsels have been given to build unity in God's church and to cause His people to "see eye to eye and be of the same mind" (Testimonies, vol. 3, p. 361); "to correct specious errors and to specify what is truth' E. G. White letter 117, 1910; and to "confirm the faith of" His people "in the position they have taken" (Selected Messages, book 1, p. 41); and

WHEREAS, The experience of the years has taught us the wisdom of these counsels -wisdom that is sorely needed as we enter the last days of conflict, when the people preparing for the second advent of their Lord need the special guidance God has so graciously provided; therefore

Resolved, that we express to God our deep-felt gratitude for the gracious provisions He has made in the Spirit of Prophecy writings for the protection and guidance of His church and further

We recommend: 1. That church members throughout the world be urged to study carefully and give earnest heed to the Spirit of Prophecy counsels.

2. That they be encouraged to continue to build Spirit of Prophecy libraries in their homes that they might have at hand the wealth of counsel so vital in this hour.

3. That a special effort be made to encourage the purchase and use of E. G. White books that offer instruction in soul-winning work and guidance to the church in its last final effort to win men to God's kingdom.

4. That we call to the attention of Seventh-day Adventists, and especially new members, the sound knowledge concerning the Spirit of Prophecy which may be theirs as the result of pursuing courses of study, such as the Prophetic Guidance Correspondence Course, and that our pastors be encouraged to conduct Prophetic Guidance schools periodically in their local churches.

5. That pastors and church officers be encouraged to continue their observance of Spirit of Prophecy Sabbath each year, devoting the preaching hour of the Sabbath to a consideration of this theme.

6. That we earnestly urge our brethren in overseas areas:

a. To press forward with unabated zeal in the excellent work of translating and publishing the Spirit of Prophecy books in

the languages of their constituencies; b. To take full advantage of the newly designed "Spirit of Prophecy Book of the plan which makes available to all Year" English-reading members one basic E. G. White book each year at a greatly reduced price;

c. To participate heartily in the newly designed plan for making the English edi-tions of the E. G. White books available to workers at prices within their purchasing power, capitalizing on the great potential of the English-reading ability of many of our overseas workers.

d. To promote Prophetic Guidance courses in their languages.

7. That church members in all lands be reminded that it is increasingly essential that the writings be studied in their proper context in the E. G. White books.

8. That we encourage workers and laity to avail themselves of the new three-volume Comprehensive Index to the Writings of Ellen G. White which will serve as a most valuable aid in the study of the Spirit of Prophecy counsels.

9. That the leaders of our publishing work, and literature evangelists throughout the world, be encouraged to undertake, with an increasing sense of the time in which we live, the ever-widening distribution of the subscription editions of the Spirit of Prophecy books that are designed to enlighten the world concerning the times in which we live, and the dramatic issues just before us.

Church Composed of Women

"Your church is composed mostly of women," the businessman remarked, and he meant it as a criticism. But the criticism lacks force when we face the facts. We recall that a considerable number of women followed Jesus in old Galilee, and ministered to Him regardless of opposition. The Apostle Paul gladly acknowledges the

The large majority of the world's school teachers are women, but this is no reflection on the worth of education. Yes, the women outnumber the men in many churches, but the men far outnumber the women in the penitentiaries!

It is a part of God's plan that women share in the work of the church and its institutions both at home and in the mission fields. We have often been thankful for the records of good and able women in the Bible, and we are thankful for our godly and talented women in the church today. How

splendidly they serve as Sabbath School officers and teachers, as workers in our Welfare and Dorcas service, and as leaders in other worthy activities! Blessings upon them-every one! Ernest Lloyd.

Many willing workers at home and abroad have longed for greater power in presenting Bible truth. They realize that something more than factual knowledge is necessary. Convincing argument must have with it sincere persuasion if souls are to accept the doctrines. But sincerity without knowledge and skill is not sufficient.

Arizona

Evangelism in public halls or in the church frequently presses into service many willing workers with limited preparation for or experience in Bible teaching. A new series of studies aims to assist the busy leaders of evangelistic teams by preparing talented church members for effective soul winning. Immediate application can be made of tested principles.

With such special training and experience prospective workers for part-time or full-time employment may be selected. After participation in several evangelistic series such workers may well be encouraged to take more advanced preparation in school. Conference officials recognize that investment in the right kind of workers returns generous dividends in souls won. Even larger returns will come when those standing idle in the market-place are inspired to serve.

This new course to train Bible instructors for conference and personal work has been in use just long enough to demonstrate its effectiveness. Its ten lessons are

Good News From the San Bernardino Campaign

If you could have stepped into a side room of the San Bernardino Municipal Auditorium at 7:10 on a night when Elder J. L. Shuler was to preach, you would have seen a group of laymen on their knees, led by a minister earnestly pleading for the outpouring of the Holy Spirit upon the meeting. This is new and different from the way we have worked before, vet so basic for success. In recent vears five or six evangelistic campaigns have been conducted in this same auditorium by our men, but as far as we know this is the first time laymen prayer bands have been held preceding each meeting. These bands meet for 15 minutes every night before the song service.

God has answered these prayers by sending His Spirit upon the meetings. Here are some of the evidences. At the fourth meeting of the series 32 non-Adventists filled out decision cards indicating their acceptance of Jesus as a personal Saviour. At the eighth meeting, 19 non-Adventists decided to begin keeping the Sabbath.





May the ties between the home and the school, under the influence of God's Holy Spirit, be drawn exceedingly close through open avenues of Christian communication, thus assuring the successful progress toward the goals and objectives for which Christian education has been established.



Sanitarium School of Prayer

The number one feature of the Sanitarium church for the last six weeks has been a School of Prayer. Instructors for this project have been Elder and Mrs. T. G. Bunch, Miss Minnie Dauphinee, Elder C. M. Mellor, and Elder A. L. Ham.

The first session of the School of Prayer on October 3 emphasized our deep need for a more effective prayer life. The necessity for spiritual power in the individual and in the church has never been greater than it is at the present time. Our members feel unprepared for the mighty workings of God as will be seen in the outpouring of the "Latter Rain" and the "Loud Cry." The questions are arising in many minds everywhere, "How can I be ready? What can I do?"

"From the secret place of prayer came the power that shook the world in the Great Reformation."—*The Great Controversy*, p. 210. The power needed to finish the closing reformatory work will also come from secret prayer.

The first evening Elder Taylor G. Bunch, minister and author of deep thought and wide experience, spoke on "The Need of a Spiritual Revival." He told us that it is a very human characteristic to realize that the church needs a revival, but to forget that the only way a revival can come is for it to begin with individuals. This wonderful work will come only as the answer to individual and united prayers. As we examine ourselves in prayer, we will be able to see that only the Holy Spirit in our lives will be able to meet our spiritual needs.

On October 10 Miss Minnie Dauphinee, well known for her work as dean of women in our colleges, helped to bring out our need of preparation for prayer. We can enter the school of Christ where we can learn to pray as a little child.

On October 17, Mrs. T. G. Bunch spoke on "Types of Prayer-Reverence, Thanksgiving, Confession, Petition, and Commitment." This led us to examine our motives in prayer and to realize that even as Seventh-day Adventist Christians who have been praying for years, we must have a much deeper comprehension of communion with God. We need to "be still and know that I am God." Our concepts of God may be narrow and incomplete, but prayer will broaden them.

An interesting feature of this meeting was a question box. The faculty answered questions turned in during the preceding two weeks, such as: "I know we should persevere in prayer, but how can we know when we are pushing our will beyond God's will?" Elder A. L. Ham taught our fourth class session on the topic, "How Prayer Is Answered, Conditions of Prayer, and Prayer for Healing." Often we wonder how God will fulfill His promise, "Ask, and ye shall receive." Does the answer depend on us, or wholly upon God? All receive a great blessing when the foundations that underlie prayers of petition are understood; and most important of all-surrender, full and complete.

complete. Elder T. G. Bunch spoke on October 31 on "The Elements of Worship and Public Prayer. Family Worship Made Interesting." A panel discussion with audience participation followed on "Making Family Worship Interesting." Elder C. M. Mellor on November 7

Elder C. M. Mellor on November 7 presented "Power Through Prayer Groups. How They Are Formed. The Sharing Plan." Another question-and-answer period at the close of the talk brought answers to personal problems.

The impact of the Sanitarium School of Prayer has made itself felt on this hillside. Attendance has varied from 300 to 450 at these mid-week services. It is hoped that this spirit will spread far and wide, and that others will join in the sincere desire, "Lord, teach us to pray."

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Dowell Martz Assists With Scientific Project

A significant scientific advance was achieved when Prof. Dowell Martz, of the Physics Department, as one of a four-man team assisted in measuring temperatures of the dark side of the moon, the planet Jupiter, and certain stars with infrared detectors sensitive in the 8-14 micron wave length regions October 28 to 30. Dr. Bruce Murray, research fellow in space physics at Cal Tech, requested the collaboration of Professor Martz in the project which was carried out at Mount Palomar using the 200-inch telescope there. Last summer the same team of scientists consisting of Professor Martz, Dr. Murray, Dr. Robert Wildey, astronomer from Cal Tech, and Mr. James Westphal, geophysicist from Cal Tech, proved the feasibility of the experiment by making measurements through a 20-inch telescope located at the 12,800 foot level on White Mountain, near Bishop, California. The observatory on White Mountain, which was built as a joint project by the Navy and Cal Tech for that particular purpose, is the highest observatory in the world.

Professor Martz began working with infrared detectors when he first went to the Naval Research Station at China Lake in 1953. He and Mr. Westphal adapted infrared detectors for field use and designed and built the necessary equipment for measuring star temperatures through telescopes.

Èxplaining the technical aspects of the experiments, Professor Martz stated that visible light waves begin at 0.4 of a micron and end at 0.7 of a micron. For some time scientists have desired to measure stellar bodies in the invisible longer wavelength range at 8-14 microns. Mr. Martz expressed great pleasure at having a part in making this possible for the first time. This opens a whole new region of the electromagnetic spectrum to astronomers to take its place along with visible and radio astronomy.

The infrared detector used will operate only at extremely low temperatures. It was necessary, therefore, to design and build special equipment using liquid hydrogen at 253 degrees below zero centigrade to cool the detector to as near absolute zero (minus 273 degrees centigrade) as possible. Using this equipment in connection with the 200-inch telescope, the team of scientists accurately measured the temperature of the dark side of the moon and several stars. The team will continue its work in this field according to Mr. Martz.

The devil endeavors to blunt this God-given ability to make clear choices. Ill health, intemperance, and the use of harmful drugs and stimulants are all tools of the devil for this purpose," declared Dr. Hardinge. Though he has earned three doctorates (M.D., Doctor of Public Health, and Ph.D.), this educator feels that the wisdom of man is insignificant and completely untrustworthy. "Truth lies within the perimeters of God's revelation, principally in the Bible and the writings of Ellen G. White, and anything outside of these is mere human speculation," emphasized the speaker.

On Friday night at the close of the meeting held in the college gymnasium hundreds of students, faculty members and adults from the village responded to Dr. Hardinge's appeal to come forward and yield their wills completely to the Lord.

No longer will the three phases of the total ministry be divided among various categories of workers. Each will go out to serve body, mind, and soul in one well-integrated individual ministry.

Christ's method alone will give true success in reaching the people. The Saviour

"Warfare Against the Church" – November 25. mingled with men as one who desired their good. He showed His sympathy for them, ministered to their needs, and won their confidence. Then He bade them, "Follow Me." --Ministry of Healing, p. 143.

Permit me to quote a few more vital statements from Sister White.

The monotony of our service for God needs to be broken up. Every church-member should be engaged in some line of service for the Master. Some can not do so much as others [doctors, nurses, etc.], but every one should do his utmost to roll back the tide of disease and distress that is sweeping over our world....

Every church should be a training-school for Christian workers. Its members should be taught . . . how best to help the poor and to care for the sick . . . There should be *schools of health*, cooking schools. . . . *Ibid.*, p. 149.

Let our people show that they have a living interest in medical missionary work. Let them prepare themselves for usefulness by studying the books that have heen written for our instruction in these lines.—*Testimonies*, vol. 7, p. 63.

The final quotation is especially significant.

As religious aggression subverts the libertics of our nation, those who would stand for freedom of conscience will be placed in unfavorable positions. For their own sake they should, while they have the opportunity, become intelligent in regard to disease, its causes, prevention, and cure. All those who do this will find a field of labor anywhere. ... The shortness of time demands an energy that has not been aroused among those who claim to believe the present truth.—Counsels on Health, p. 506. (Italics supplied in all quotations.)

God seems to appeal here to our selfinterest. That religious aggression is imminent, there is no doubt. The "storm, relentless in its fury," will be the inevitable consequence. God is pleading with His people to study the laws of health, the nature, causes of disease and also its cures, so that we may be able to witness for Him when every other avenue will be cut off. This preparation should receive priority because the hour is so late.

Now is the time, *before* the storm breaks, to prepare to do the same work Christ did. "Health Guardian" courses from Loma Linda University *combined* with study of other church-sponsored courses in prevention and simple cures will provide the necessary training to do the prescribed medical missionary work.
