Ingathering Funds Mean Child Evangelism in Mission Schools

A beautiful, dark haired girl of six sat at her desk in the classroom. Her black eyes sparkled as I told a story. At recess time I asked the teacher about her. "Oh, you mean Samia," the teacher answered. "This is her first year at our school and it is amazing to see her interest in the Bible stories. Samia is the daughter of a high ranking army officer. Although he is not a Christian he likes our school and wants his children to have an Adventist education."

Samia is just one of many non-Adventist boys and girls learning of Jesus and getting a Christian education in the Adventist schools in the Middle Eastern lands. The operation of mission schools is proving to be one of the most successful fields of evangelism, and yet every year we have to turn down hundreds of applications. In the land of Lebanon where the baptized membership is only slightly over five hundred, there are one thousand boys and girls attending Adventist schools. Think of the possibilities of an enlarged child evangelism through mission schools!

Many of our workers trace their acceptance of the message to their attendance at one of our mission schools. Several workers have experienced great persecution from their families because of becoming Adventists. Although some parents have exclaimed, "Why did we send our boy to the Adventist school?" others have accepted the truth because of the influence



News Notes From Mountain View Union Academy

ACADEMY TO REBUILD. Approval to rebuild Mountain View Academy on its present site was given at a recent general meeting by the members of its constituent churches. Tentative building plans call for a three step renewal of facilities adequate to give a maximum of 300 students a thorough preparation in high school subjects, using modern techniques against a background of Adventist ideals.

For a number of years studies have been aimed at enlarging the academy by rebuilding on a large site in the Cupertino area, but financial difficulties have prevented any positive building program from being started. Under the revised plans, the project can be started with the finances now available, as quickly as the architect's plans are approved. It is anticipated that the first units can be occupied by late fall.

The current proposal calls for a three part development. Phase One will erect an adequate two story administration and classroom building. In addition, shower and locker facilities will be constructed,

anticipating their eventual integration into the proposed gymnasium of Phase Two. Phase Three looks forward to the addition of an area suitable for expanded physical education activities, and a general assembly and program auditorium.


Last year's accreditation of the academy by the Western Association of Secondary Schools and Colleges was a welcome recognition of the effectiveness of the academy's scholastic program, but it was made clear that the accreditation could not be renewed at the time of its expiration in 1969 unless certain changes in the school's facilities had been made by that time. Phase One of the current program is designed to meet the minimum of these requirements, anticipating that there will then be no question in this regard when the study for reaccreditation is made.

Favorable conditions are developing for the acquisition of land adjacent to the academy's present site, which will enable the further advance of the objectives in giving a Christian education to the young people of the Bay Area. The cooperation of the churches comprising the constituency is greatly appreciated, and their enthusiasm for the proposed plans will be reflected in the firm support they offer to the various phases of the building program. Their young people are already eagerly looking forward to the time when they will be able to occupy the new facilities.

ROGER ABREW TO JOIN STAFF. Mr. Roger Abrew, a graduate of the music department of Pacific Union College, has accepted the invitation of the board of Mountain View Union Academy to assist in teaching in his chosen field, beginning with the 1966-67 school year. Mr. Abrew is at present completing the requirements for a Master's degree at his alma mater.

After being graduated from Golden Gate Academy, Mr. Abrew earned the distinction of being chosen as first chair trumpet, and as student conductor of the band at Pacific Union College. He will teach band and give private instrument lessons at the academy.

Dorcas Welfare on the Job During the Floods in Arizona

Dorcas Welfare officers and workers from the Phoenix churches responded willingly and vigorously to the needs of humanity during the recent floods in the Salt River Valley area.

The Civil Defense headquarters was contacted shortly after the flood warning was given. We reported that we were willing and ready to help with an evacuation area, soup kitchens, or dispersing clothing. Shortly after this call the Red Cross called and asked if we could set up a clothing depot for receiving and dispersing clothing. This we were happy to do.

Minutes after their call the operation was started. Clothing from the Welfare center (located in the area that the city officials had ordered evacuated) was hauled to the family center and set up on racks and in bins. The ten churches in the area brought their clothing, and clothing was received from the general public. Ladies were on hand from the church Dorcas Welfare societies to receive, sort, and disperse clothing. Fifteen or 20 of our ladies served in two of the designated evacuation areas. This was on Friday,

Early Sabbath morning the Red Cross called and asked if children's clothing could be taken to Buckeye, a town about 30 miles west of Phoenix, where some 500 people had been evacuated. By 10:30 two pickup loads of clothing and ten women were on their way to Buckeye to take care of the needs.

We were prepared to do a great deal more if there had been a need. However, we were not as prepared as we could have been. This experience has helped the Dorcas Welfare workers to realize how quickly a disaster can arise and how to be better prepared at all times. We were grateful for the privilege of relieving human suffering.

Seminar on Religious Liberty Soon to Be Held in Loma Linda

Because religious liberty and churchstate problems are increasing and will become more intense as we near Christ's second advent, the conference religious liberty department will sponsor a six day Seminar on Religious Liberty, beginning January 23, in Loma Linda.

The seminar is designed to assist pastors, school principals, and certain other church workers to better understand how to deal with these problems. The course will be directed by Dr. Horace Shaw, Andrews University, and Elder Melvin V. Jacobson, conference religious liberty secretary. It will be under the extension division of Andrews University.

In order to gain an understanding of the thinking of the various agencies affecting church-state relations, representatives from the following organizations will present lectures: organized labor (AFL-CIO), The Right to Work Movement, industry, Catholic university, Protestants and Other Americans United, Fair Employment Practices Agency, Unemployment Insurance, the Council of Churches, the United States Congress, and the California Legislature.

Dr. Leo Pfeffer, New York, Long Island University, one of America's foremost constitutional attorneys, will present a lecture on current trends in United States Supreme Court decisions regarding churchstate relations and how they are affecting

Congressional legislation.

The seminar will be conducted in a similar manner to the recent Seminar on Counseling Alcoholics and will carry two hours of graduate credit for those qualified. It will be conducted on the Loma Linda University campus.



This command, though given over 1900 years ago, has not lost its full meaning, and it should inspire us to serve Him in the way that He wanted, "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature."

Teenagers are interested in serving Christ this way also. They caught the fire of a new program presented by Orange County youth pastor, Elder W. E. Jamerson. Elder lamerson was able to obtain Bibles and Bible courses to start a missionary programin which the teens directed nearly every aspect. This was a year ago, and they called their missionary program "Teens for Tustin." This year they decided to continue the missionary program and to include two new areas, Huntington Beach and La Habra. These three programs will be directed by the teenagers with the supervision of Élder Jamerson for Huntington Beach and La Habra, and Pastor Larry Geraty and Jim Edwards for Tustin.

This program has a visitation theme. The teens visit the people in their homes, delivering Bibles and Bible lessons. The Bible lessons have a story on the front cover, Bibles verses on the inside covers, with an object lesson and decision boxes on the back cover. If the 24 lessons are not completed, the Bibles are taken back. If the course is completed, the Bibles are given free.

Forward Program of Christian Stewardship

Our newly created Stewardship Services is not to be considered primarily as our plan for raising money. Rather, it should be viewed as "God's plan for rearing His children." He has placed in the hands of His servants the means wherewith to carry forward His work in home and foreign missions."-Counsels on Stewardship, pp. 36 and 47.



Counsel on Sunday Laws

In dealing with Sunday law questions, the following cautions should be observed:

If they are left to rein up men who fear neither God nor man, the reining up will soon lose its novelty for them, and they will see that it is not consistent nor convenient for them to be strict in regard to the observance of Sunday. Keep right on with your missionary work, with your Bibles in your hands, and the enemy will see that he has worsted his

When we devote Sunday to missionary work, the whip will be taken out of the hands work, the whip will be taken out of the hands of the arbitrary zealots who would be well pleased to humiliate Seventh-day Adventists. When they see that we employ ourselves on Sunday in visiting the people and opening the Scriptures to them, they will know that it is useless for them to try to hinder our work by making Sunday layer. work by making Sunday laws.—Testimonies, vol. 9, pp. 232 and 233.





Recovery Team Serves Community

For the past four years, a six man team of skindivers from Pacific Union College has been performing a very important community service in recovering victims of drownings in nearby Lake Berryessa.

The request for the team's services usually comes from the Napa County Sheriff's Office. The team is on call 24 hours a day and spends from 45 minutes to four hours in the recovery process, depending upon the depth of the water and the visibility.

While some divers charge up to \$125 an hour for this kind of service, the team,

consisting of five college students and one instructor, perform this as a community service.

The Recovery Team also offers their services to the public for the salvage of personal items which have been lost. They receive a remuneration from the private individuals for this work.

The fastest and smoothest recovery was made with the assistance of a plane from the Angwin Flight Center. Within four minutes the team had arrived at Lake Berryessa, changed into their wet suits, and were in position to begin the search.

diving club, and are se-lected for the team by the captain.

Dr. Percy W. Christian, professor of history at Pacific Union College, has accepted an appointment to Andrews University as a visiting professor for the summer of 1966.



Men, Be on Guard Concerning Draft and Service Classification

There have been a number of cases of our young men arriving at the Induction Center only to find that the Army has no record from the Selective Service Board that they are a 1-A-O. The reason for this seems to be that some of the Draft Board clerks are failing to fill in the 1-A-O classification on the DD Form 47 which accompanies the man into the Army. Thus when the man surrenders his classification card, which he must do at the induction station, it leaves him without documented evidence that he is a 1-A-O.

Once such a man arrives at the Induction Center he is, of course, treated as a 1-A man and placed in regular army basic training. It can be straightened out, but it is sometimes a lengthy and troublesome affair. To prevent this problem from happening, it is suggested that at the time a man reports for induction at the Draft Board office that he request permission to look at his DD Form 47 to be certain that his 1-A-O classification is on the form.


Should a man arrive at the Induction

Center and find out that his 1-A-O classification has been lost, he should immediately contact a Chaplain and also the nearest Missionary Volunteer secretary or local pastor.

Another problem that has happened at some Draft Boards is that when the men report for induction some boards are giving them time to go to the recruiting offices and choose the branches of the Services they wish. It seems that some men have interpreted this to mean that they could be drafted in this way in any branch of the Services they wish.

This, however, is not the case, for any time a man goes into the Service through a recruiting office he is no longer a drafted man but an enlisted man. When one enlists he must give up his 1-A-O classification, so here again a young man must be wide awake and on guard.
