# Parochial School Denied Use of Buses in West Sacramento

At the request of D. E. Leamon, pastor of the Oak Park and West Sacramento churches, I accompanied him to a public hearing of the Washington District School Board which met for discussion on a request made by the Roman Catholic Parochial School of West Sacramento to allow its students to be transported by public school bus.

The hearing room was completely filled, and approximately 15 Seventh-day Adventist laymen whose children would be affected by this ruling were present to voice their opposition. Brother Weir, of the West Sacramento group, gave a very quiet but forceful opinion expressing his objection to this request on the basis of our stand in the separation of church and state, and also his strong feeling that public schools should not be required to serve parochial schools.

The Washington District School Board representatives heard several witnesses. One was Dr. E. D. Giddens, director of POAU, Americans United, of the Los Angeles area. It was interesting to note that many non-Seventh-day Adventists expressed their opinions forcefully, opposing the idea of parochial school children riding public school buses. It was a lively discussion, and after approximately two and a half hours, the vote was taken and the Washington School District voted to deny the request of the Roman Catholic church in the area.

We feel this was a definite defeat of another attempt to break down the wall of separation of church and state. The entire group felt relieved when the action of denial took place.

We will see more of this type of activity, and we should be prepared to register our opinions as laymen by standing to our feet and expressing our views at the grass roots level where it is most effective. We counsel and encourage every individual Christian to know what he believes and to be willing to defend his beliefs before school boards, legislative committees, labor unions, and other organizations where attacks are being made upon personal and church freedoms.

Your religious liberty department stands ready to assist you in any of these areas. We would appreciate being kept informed by church members where issues of this nature arise on the local level.

Dr. Woods taught at Atlantic Union College and also at Harvard University. He served as president of Union College and of La Sierra College. For twelve years he served Loma Linda University, supervising research, and teaching. Dr. Woods and his wife have lived at

Dr. Woods and his wife have lived at Pacific Union College for the past two years. His efforts as head of the physics department are greatly appreciated.



At the present time Dr. Woods has traveled to our sister college in Puerto Rico where he is the acting administrator of this college for the Antillian Union. He hopes while there to build an accreditable physics department, as well as to aid in establishing a modern, well equipped training college. This college will serve the more than 500 students now in attendance and will make possible accommodations for some 1.500 students who desire to attend.

Elder William Hyde has been with the Pacific Union College department of religion since 1946. His background of mission and administrative leadership has helped to strengthen this department throughout the years.

Elder and Mrs. Hyde spent some twenty years in Africa prior to their coming to Pacific Union College. During those years he not only served as an executive in mission work, but also founded the Advent Press and built and directed a training school for national workers.

Elder Hyde is now retiring from the full teaching load, but with his retirement has accepted the temporary responsibility of being chairman of the religion department during the interim of Elder Robert Olson's leave of absence.

Elder Hyde states that present plans and policies of the department will remain unchanged. The student participation program will continue to expand with more branch Sabbath schools; more student pastors will assist neighboring churches with evangelistic meetings and visitation.

# Student Pastors Gain Experience

Pacific Union College religion department is making a contribution in service to several churches in the Northern California Conference. At the present time there are three active student pastors and the coming school year will see two or three more. The student, or associate pastor, works in cooperation with the local church pastor and under the sponsorship of the college religion department. Elder Carl Coffman supervises and directs in the pastoral duties of each group, and Elder Leo Van Dolson directs in evangelistic activities involving students from the college.

The Calistoga church has benefited from the help of student pastors for several years. Gerald Haeger, Don Lane, and others have contributed to the progress there. During this summer Dale Ratzlaff has been carrying the pastoral responsibilities, which he will continue during the coming winter.

The Middletown church group is served in similar capacity by Mr. Ronald Warpole. During the coming school year Mr. Warpole will continue to care for the pastoral responsibilities, which at the present time include a full schedule of Bible studies. With the help of students from the college the Middletown church sponsors a weekly Story Hour attended by approximately 25 non-Adventist children.

The Mill Valley group is a new addition to Northern California churches. As a direct result of PUC missionary activities, the Mill Valley group is now entering the first phase of organization. Students from the college found nearly thirty interested persons in their house-to-house visitation program last spring, and these interests are being nurtured by Mr. Charles Klatt, who is now acting as student pastor. Mr. Klatt is taking up the duties that Lloyd Munson carried previously.

Another expansion of the student pastor experience is expected to take place this fall. The Napa area, under the direction of Elder C. M. Mellor, will give experience to several students, who will in turn benefit the local church with the efforts in pastoral visitation and in evangelism.
