Fire Engine for Monument Valley Mission

A bright red fire engine recently delivered to the Monument Valley Seventh-day Adventist Mission, besides giving needed fire protection, will also mean a saving of \$500 per year in fire insurance, reports Mr. Dean Lange who recently drove the engine to the mission from Los Angeles.

Mr. Lange is a fireman with the Los Angeles Fire Department. He worked with Loma Linda University School of Dentistry in outfitting the engine and while at Monument Valley gave the mission staff training in fire-fighting techniques.

The engine, a 1948 Mack, originally belonged to the Long Beach Fire Department. It was donated to the mission by Dr. Chester Moore, a Long Beach dentist, who had learned of the need from a speech given by Dr. Charles T. Smith, director of the Loma Linda University-sponsored Monument Valley dental care program, at a Long Beach dental convention. Doctor Smith mentioned the increase in the number of buildings at the mission and that there was no fire protection, except for hand extinguishers.

At the conclusion of the meeting, Doctor Moore told Doctor Smith that he had just purchased a piece of used fire apparatus from the Long Beach Fire Department. He said he would like it to be used at the Monument Valley Mission.

Through the combined cooperation of the Loma Linda School of Dentistry and the Pacific Union Conference, the necessary funds were raised to modify and equip the apparatus with hose and fittings. At the maintenance department of Loma Linda University the water tank capacity was increased from 250 gallons to 600

gallons, and the apparatus was painted and completely serviced.

The "new" engine was delivered to Los Angeles where Mr. Lange completed outfitting the apparatus. Then, on July 11, he drove the fire engine to the mission and presented it to Dr. J. Lloyd Mason.

Church Manual a Necessity for Leaders and Members



September Is Prayer Month at Voice of Prophecy Office

The Voice of Prophecy has designated September as Prayer Month, in accordance with the invitation, "Seek ye the Lord while he may be found, call ye upon him while he is near."—Isaiah 55:6. During this month there will be special prayer services for those requesting prayer, with daily vigilance by volunteer staff members who will read the requests and bow in prayer for a period each morning, noon, and evening.

This decision to set apart a specific month for prayer emphasis resulted from a discussion by the leaders of the religious radio broadcast concerning the problems in the world today which are facing many listeners to the Voice of Prophecy. These men decided that only by the grace of God can these burdens be lifted. God can bring spiritual comfort, as indicated by this letter from a formerly discouraged wife in Oregon:

"God answered your prayers for my husband. He was baptized this month!"

God can also bring physical healing, as He did in the case of a listener who wrote from New York:

"Thanks for your kind words and for the blessings you send me of Jesus. I'm sure all the prayers that the Voice of Prophecy had for me did a lot of good to make me better. Everyone here in the hospital thought I would never walk again, but now I walk all by myself. They call me 'the miracle.'"

God can bring joy to parents by touching the hearts of wayward or unthinking children, as a Missouri parent wrote:

"I hardly know how to put into words how much I thank you for your prayers in behalf of the young girl I wrote you about. Yes, God surely did know where she was! Before I received a letter from you I had heard from this dear girl. I know what it is like to shed tears of joy!"

Business problems are eased by the grace of God, as in the case of a young Oklahoma girl: "My mother wrote in to your office a while back for special prayer that I would be able to get a local job with Sabbaths off. I am happy to tell you that I have been working as a bookkeeper here at a hotel for about a month, and I do get Sabbaths off!"

Questions on II-S, Student Deferment, Are Answered

For draft and military service information, write to: National Service Organization, P.O. Box 146, Glendale, California 91209. Phone 213 241-5173.

College students who are satisfactorily pursuing a full-time course of instruction and who request a student deferment may receive a II-S classification until they receive their baccalaureate degree or become 24 years of age, whichever occurs first.

A new form, Request for Undergraduate Student Deferment (SSS Form 104), has been approved and distributed. While the form was designed for convenience, any written request for deferment by the student will be acceptable.

It is the responsibility of the registrant to file a completed SSS Form 104, or letter in lieu thereof, with his local board if he wants to be deferred because of study.

Baptisms Result From Personal Evangelism in Fontana

When the two weeks were over, the pool at the Juniper Avenue Church was filled. Elder H. M. Barker of the K Street Church baptized 16 souls who decided to march under the banner of Prince Emmanuel, and Elder Taylor of the Fontana Church baptized 20. A large number of these were young people who had decided to start out with God.

Praying, preaching, pleading, and plain hard work were the basic ingredients for this success. But without the Holy Spirit, nothing could have been accomplished. The Juniper Avenue and K Street churches are thankful that all the ingredients were present for the gratifying results.

La Sierra Minister of Youth Goes to the New York Center

The La Sierra Church minister of youth, Elder Henry A. Barron, and his family left Southeastern California Conference

August 31 to take up new responsibilities as director of the New York Center and coordinator of evangelism for the Greater New York Conference.

The New York Center is located just a half block off Times

Square. Plans for the Cen-

ter's future cover many phases of religious emphasis, and Elder Barron says it is the determination of the staff to follow the instruction laid down in Evangelism, page 13, "Here let a center for God's work be made, and let all that is done be a symbol of the work the Lord desires to see done in the world. . . . You are to make in New York a center for missionary effort, from which work can be carried forward successfully. The Lord desires this center to be a training school for workers, and nothing is to be allowed to interrupt the work."

Elder Barron said his new duties will include sponsoring a daily radio broadcast, printing a magazine, conducting summer Youth Leadership Training programs in conjunction with our colleges, teen rallies in New York parks, producing taped youth programs with color slides using music by the La Sierra Paramount Trio.

Mr. and Mrs. Steve Doyle and daughter Kathy, Westminster, will be moving to the Center. Mr. Doyle, whom Elder Barron baptized at Westminster, is from Brooklyn and will be instructor of the Positive Living Clinic. Elman Folkenberg will conduct the Five-Day Plan to Stop Smoking and the new weight control program. Monthly special features will include such guests as Desmond Doss, the New York mayor, and leading evangelists.

Further plans include starting a businessmen's health food lunch service and a museum of artifacts from Adventist foreign missions around the world. As evangelism coordinator, Elder Barron will work with the pastors of all the conference churches, scheduling evangelists for reaping campaigns and gathering souls for Christ.

Elder and Mrs. Barron and their four children plan to live on Long Island, keeping an apartment at the Center for use during special campaigns.

Elder Barron is a native of the Arlington area of Riverside. His father is Dr. H. C. Barron, 4156-10th Street, Riverside. Elder Barron was graduated from La Sierra College in 1952. His wife is the former Pansy Strickland of Escondido. They spent nine and a half years in the Texas Conference in evangelism and pastoral work, going to Orange County five years ago, and back to La Sierra in 1966. Many will remember him for his messages in singing evangelism.

As La Sierra minister of youth, Elder Barron started monthly youth church services, sponsored youth teams, held a series of evangelistic meetings by the youth, and sponsored a summer missionary program. In the recreational area, besides camps and outings, he originated "Gym Nights" which will carry on under the direction of Kenny Roberts, a LLU student on the La Sierra campus.


Women teachers and youth helpers of various churches willingly offered their services. The pupils were divided into classes from nursery to junior. Arts and crafts were also included.

Aides, Orderlies Complete Course at Feather River Hospital

Twenty women and two men received certificates at recent ceremonies at the Feather River Sanitarium and Hospital as a result of successfully completing work as nurse's aides and orderlies.

The course, which demands 90 hours of theory and 45 hours of clinical practice in the hospital, is the only course of its kind approved and licensed by the State Department of Education north of Sacramento, and thus students from Willows, Durham, Oroville, Chico, Magalia, and Paradise were in attendance.

Seventeen physicians from the Paradise and Chico areas donated an hour of time to give lectures to the students. Catherine

Gearing, R.N., B.S.N.E., director of nurses, was the chief instructor for the course. She was assisted by Mrs. Richard Haas, R.N., B.S., clinical instructor.

Also in recent ceremonies at the hospital 17 students from Paradise High School and Junior Academy were cited for volunteer hospital work. These students met the scholastic requirement of 175 hours of hospital work, 34 hours of which were spent in formal classroom study.

At a reception held for the students, Harvey Rudisaile, hospital administrator, presented \$150 scholarships to the two top 'Candy Stripers," Wendy Thomas and Gloria Christianson.


Mount Peale Climbed by the Young and "Young in Heart"

French University Recognizes PUC's Modern Language Department

The modern language department at Pacific Union College announces a newlyestablished link with the Sorbonne, University of Paris, which assures an academic acceptance of American French students to the "Alliance Française" in France.

The purpose of this international arrangement is to "facilitate the acceptance of foreigners in the French universities."
The "Alliance Francaise" is a world-

wide cultural organization. It was founded in 1883 to facilitate cooperative measures between universities and colleges all over the world.

Pacific Union College is carrying on this "Alliance Francaise" through the Seventh-day Adventist college in France, "Seminaire Adventiste de Collonges sous Saleve.'

In the autumn quarter of 1967 the French section of the modern language department of PUC will introduce the teaching methods of this new system to students of the French language. The "Alliance Francaise" will be under the direction of Mrs. Doraine Buyck. Mrs. Buyck has worked with this system in the European colleges.

This newly-established link between Pacific Union College and the oldest international organization of French studies for foreigners will promote interest in the French language. The French language is used as an international cultural and diplomatic language; and its mastery is of great value to graduates whether in denominational work or not. There is a great need for denominational workers in many parts of the world where the French language is spoken.

Pacific Union College offers a major and a minor in French. Mr. Robert Buyck, assistant professor of French, holds degrees from the University of Nancy, and the University of Toulouse, France. 
Tower and Antenna Set Up for New FM Radio Station, KANG

Pacific Union College has just completed the tower and antenna setup for the new, high-powered FM radio station scheduled to be in full use by October 1, 1967. The new station will serve all of the Bay Area and will reach into the Sacramento Valley.

KANG at present has been operating on 10 watts of power and has been in use mainly on the college campus and in the

Angwin community.

The new KANG will operate with an effective radiated power of 20,000 watts as licensed by the Federal Communications

Commission. It is owned by the college, is operated by the communications department under the chairmanship of Dr. Elton Wallace, and its technical engineering arrangements are under the supervision of Walter M. Bolinger of the physics department. Students will handle most of the programing and announcing.

On August 2 the 80-foot tower, carrying an additional 40 feet of antenna, was raised into position on the site of the equipment center high on the hill behind Irwin Hall.

Complete with lighting, antenna direction cables, and all necessary equipment, the huge, steel, free-standing tower was hoisted into position onto a base platform of 22 tons of cement. The actual placing in position was accomplished by PUC's maintenance department under the direction of Gerald Young.

Two students have spent many weeks assembling the steel tower. Stanley Bisel of the physics department and Lance Campbell of the communications department cleaned, assembled, and painted the pieces of surplus steel that now hold PUC's KANG antenna. The antenna has been tested and already the efficiency is greatly increased in the present station. With a complete hook-up of the 20,000-watt equipment the new KANG will be an effective means of communication in Northern California.

Doctor Wallace reports increased activity in regard to programing. There will be collège campus news, agricultural weather reports, children's programs, as well as features for homemakers and area listen-

Under the new law, no person who has requested and received a deferment for undergraduate study shall be eligible for an additional deferment, except in cases involving extreme hardship, graduate study, or employment necessary to the maintenance of the national health, safety, or interest.

The following questions and answers were distributed by National Headquarters of Selective Service and reflect their interpretation of the provisions of the new law:

Question: What requirements must I meet to qualify for a II-S classification as an undergraduate college student?

Answer: You must file a written request with

your local board for deferment as an underyour local board for deferment as an under-graduate college student. Additionally, you must provide your local board each year with convincing evidence that you are continuing to pursue satisfactorily a full-time course of instruction at a college, uni-versity or similar institution of leaving versity or similar institution of learning.

Question: How does the Selective Service System define the phrase "satisfactorily pursuing a full-time course of instruction" when the deferment of undergraduate college students is being considered?

inswer: To be considered as "satisfactorily pursuing a full-time course of instruction," an undergraduate student who is taking a four-year course should earn 25 percent of the credits required for his baccalaureate degree at the end of his first academic year, 50 percent at the end of his second academic year, and 75 percent at the end of his third academic year. In the case of a baccalaureate degree for which five years of study are prescribed by the institution, a student should earn 20 percent each year of the total credits required for the degree.

Question: What is meant by a "student's

Question: What is meant by a student's academic year"?

Answer: In determining elegibility for classification in Class II-S (college student), a student's academic year should include the 12-month period following the beginning of his course of study. of his course of study.

Question: In regard to college student defer-

Question: In regard to college student determents, is a junior college considered an institution of higher learning?

Answer: Yes, if the credits given by the junior college are acceptable toward the granting of a baccalaureate degree by a college, university or similar institution of learning. university, or similar institution of learn-

ing.

Question: What are the limitations, if any, on how long a person can be deferred as an undergraduate college student?

Answer: A registrant can be deferred in Class II-S as an undergraduate college student until he satisfies the requirement for his baccalaureate degree if completed within the normal and specified time, fails to pursue satisfactorily a full-time course of instruction, or becomes 24 years of age, whichever occurs first. whichever occurs first.

Question: Will registrants who become fathers after the new selective service law becomes effective be deferred in Class III-A?

Answer: Every case is considered on an indinature: Every case is considered on an individual basis, hence an all-inclusive answer cannot be given. The only change made in eligibility requirements for deferment as a father (Class III-A) under the Military Selective Service Act of 1967, as compared with the former Universal Military Training and Service Act is the addition of the control of th ing and Service Act, is the addition of a restriction that registrants who are classified in Class II-S after the new Selective Service law went into effect (June 30, 1967) shall not be eligible for classification in Class III-A as fathers but may qualify on the basis of hardship to dependents.
