October 7 to 13 has been designated as Health Emphasis Week for Seventh-day Adventists. Below is a week's "menu" for better health from Ella Mae Stoneburner, director of health education of the General Conference's medical department.

RESOLUTION: I will follow this week's prescribed menu and practice each suggestion until I am following the pattern for optimum health every day.

Sabbath, October 7

Today—I will read Bible texts and Spirit of Prophecy references on happiness and try to retain a cheerful spirit all week.

Sunday, October 8

Today—I will walk one mile, gradually increasing the distance until I reach four miles daily, which is recommended, or do other exercise which would be the equivalent.

Monday, October 9—

Today—I will begin the day with a substantial breakfast containing one-third of the day's calorie requirement.

Tuesday, October 10

Today—I will give particular attention to eating balanced meals, being sure to include fresh fruit and vegetables and no empty calories.

Wednesday, October 11

Today—I will take at least ten deep breaths, completely filling my lungs each time with fresh air and exhaling completely each time.

Thursday, October 12

Today—I will drink at least six glasses of water.

Friday, October 13

Today—I will see that my body gets eight hours of rest and sleep with complete relaxation.

Write Your Representatives Supporting Temperance Bill

Recently Senator Wayne Morse of Oregon introduced a Bill on the floor of the United States Senate that would prohibit the advertising of alcoholic beverages on radio and television from 3 p.m. to 10 p.m.

There is no doubt but what this is one of the most significant pieces of temperance legislation that has reached the floor of the Senate in many years.

It will create a real battle and it took great courage for Senator Morse, facing re-election next year, to introduce this Bill. A copy of this may be obtained from the Pacific Union Temperance Department, Box 146, Glendale, or from the Congressional Record, Washington, D.C. Ask for Volume 113, Wednesday, August 2, 1967, No. 120, Senate Bill 2202.

At this moment Senator Morse needs our support and the support of his Senators and Congressmen.

The real burden of this message is: Would you today as a responsible citizen write your representatives in Congress and urge them to vote for this Bill? If our 95,000 members in the Pacific Union would do this it would help bring a favorable response in Congress.

There are four special items from the publishing department that we want you to share.

1. Our students have set a new record in sales. They have broken a record that has stood for 14 years. Thanks, students, for your dedication this summer. You have brought inspiration to all of us.

2. The conference has set its eyes on reaching \$500,000 in sales within a year. We know that the Holy Spirit will have much more to work with if we can put our literature in twice as many homes. Please pray that God will help us plant these seeds. We know Divine power is available. Now we dedicate our human effort to couple with His power. This formula always brings success.

3. On December 9, 1967, there will be a special meeting in the Oakland area. The purpose of this meeting is to explain the "New Look" in literature ministry. You will want to mark this date on your calendar and be present. Further announcements will be made giving details of this meeting.

4. Our colporteurs have just completed a group canvass in the Gridley Church that could set the pattern for a new approach to evangelism. We would much rather be a part of a coordinated program than have several little programs scattered throughout the conference with no planned follow-up.

Bakersfield Plans Evangelism at New Church Facilities

The Bakersfield Central Church will celebrate the completion of its Christian education and social wings with an evangelistic crusade beginning October 8.

The crusade will be conducted by the pastor, Calvin A. Sterling, as speaker, and Sherman L. Cross, San Joaquin Hospital administrator, as singing evangelist. The opening subject will be "Is Time Running Out?"

The Bakersfield Central Church began construction of its new home in January of this year on 20 acres located at 4201 Wilson Road in Bakersfield's thriving southwest. The now completed wings of the plant cover 12,000 square feet, making seven division rooms, three offices, a chapel, six restrooms, and a social hall that seats nearly 500 persons. The new sanctuary will be in the center of this complex, tying it together and seating over 800 persons in a fan-shaped pattern that will have the farthest person from the pulpit only about 60 feet away.

The evangelistic crusade will be conducted each night of the week through October 29 in the new social hall. Temple City Church Member Copies Entire Bible by Hand

Mrs. Helen Carvallo, a member of the Temple City Seventh-day Adventist Church, recently completed a very interesting project. She has copied the Bible in its entirety in longhand.

The story of Mrs. Carvallo's interest in the Bible began when she was a member of the Anglican Church in England. It continued during her student days at Saint Hilda's College in Buenos Aires, South America, from which she graduated.

It was evident to her in her limited knowledge of the Bible that what she learned did not agree with her study of the Bible. She, therefore, undertook to copy first the passages of just exactly what Jesus Christ said, as recorded in Scripture. First she copied the New Testament and then the Old.

The five notebooks which she now has total 2,931 pages. The project took her approximately eight months during which she set aside three hours a day for writing. During the course of her Bible-writing project she became more convinced than ever that what many churches taught was not substantiated by Bible passages.

By coincidence she tuned in on a television broadcast sponsored by the Southern California Conference. This subsequently led her to consult the yellow pages for the listing of the Seventh-day Adventist Church in her area. She called the church and was told that she would be most welcome to attend. From her first Sabbath she was convinced that the Seventh-day Adventist Church taught the Bible in its entirety as she knew it from her many months of study and writing.

Elder Winders, the associate pastor of the Temple City Church, with whom she studied, says that she has a remarkable knowledge of the Bible. Mrs. Carvallo hopes that what she has done will encourage not only Seventh-day Adventists, but others to read their Bibles more diligently.

Two Lancaster Dentists Serve at Monument Valley Mission

Their regular service to Lancaster area dental patients was interrupted last month, but Doctors Harold C. Brockmann and Alvin D. Schnell weren't sunning themselves at a vacation resort.

The two dentists spent three weeks in a professional continuing-education course at Loma Linda University's extension dental clinic in Monument Valley, Utah. The clinic in which the course was conducted serves Indian residents of that vast, colorful valley.

Working with the clinic's full-time resident director, Dr. Kenneth E. Wical, and three assistants, the Lancaster dentists saw several hundred Indian patients, mostly Navajo and Paiutes. According to Doctor Brockmann, most of the service in the clinic was routine. One objective of this new university-run program is to encourage regular dental check-up by the 10,000 Monument Valley residents, thus lessening the need for emergency treatment.

The non-profit clinic, operating under the name "Monument Valley Community Oral Health Service," was remodeled and enlarged from another building in 1966. It now comprises five dental operating units, x-ray processing facilities, laboratory, waiting room, and administrative office area.

At the clinic the Lancaster dentists and their families occupied housing units recently constructed near the clinic to provide living quarters for visiting dentists and dental students from Loma Linda University.

Adjacent to the dental clinic is the Monument Valley Mission Hospital, established as a clinic in 1950 at the request of Harry Goulding, a pioneer Indian trader. The hospital's medical director is J. Lloyd Mason, M.D., formerly of Bishop.

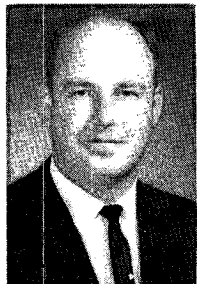

An Association for Volunteer Teachers for Mission Lands

Have you wished all your life that you could have been a foreign missionary? If you are an experienced elementary teacher, in good health, this may now come true regardless of your age.

There is a great need for teachers of the children of our missionaries in all parts of the world field. Missionaries have found the education of their children one of their most perplexing problems. This is often the sole cause of the return home of excellent missionaries who love their work.

The General Conference furnishes some elementary schools in certain central areas. This permanent arrangement is often not feasible in certain other areas just as needy, where the needs fluctuate. In these cases a more direct method has been found satisfactory.

If the teacher can pay her own transportation to the field, the parents can pay her a living wage at little more cost than that of their combined Home Study Institute courses. If need arises she can be quickly moved to a more needy group in the same general area. There are also places where an isolated missionary family would be happy to have the teacher live with them to take over the busy mother's teaching load.

Likewise, there are situations where a teacher's husband, if gifted in building, mechanics, farming, repair work, or colporteur, would be very useful.

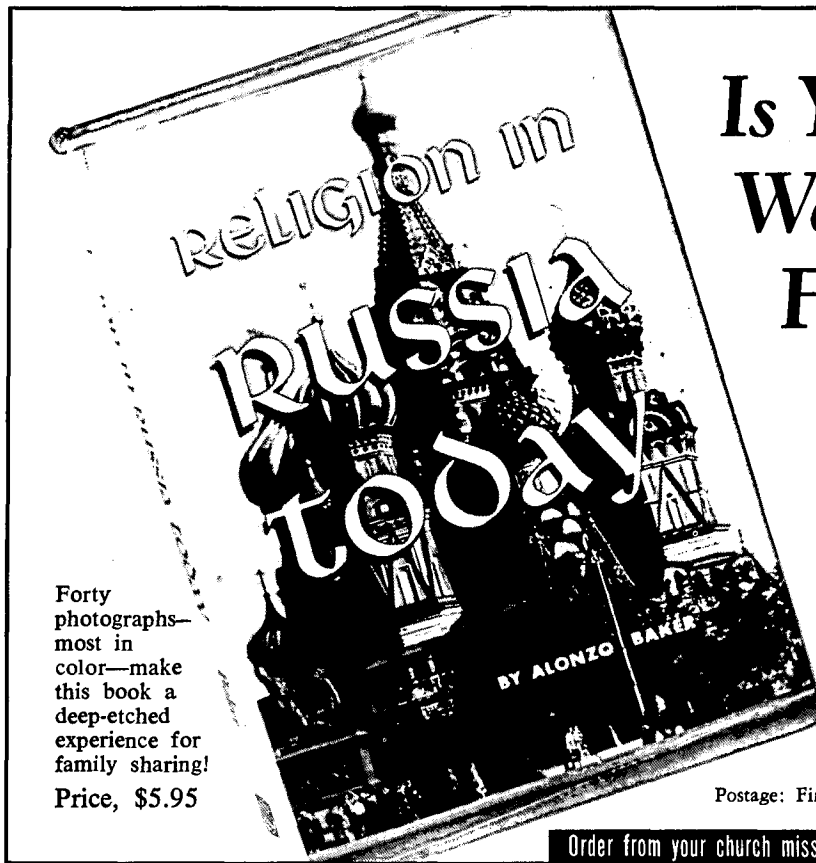

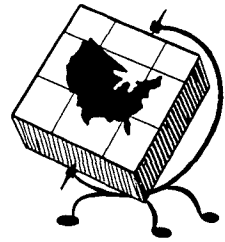

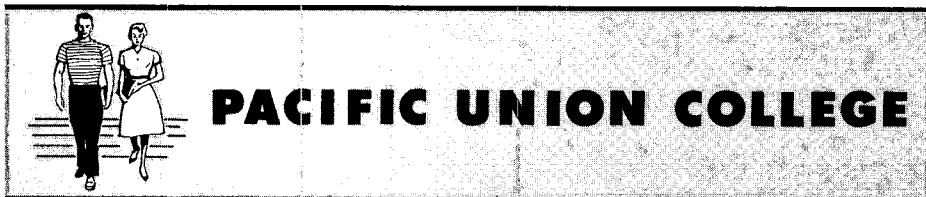

Army Issues Policy Regarding Assignment to Reserve Units

Many inquiries are received by the National Service Organization from Adventist servicemen concerning the problem of regular drill in reserve and National Guard units during the hours of the Sabbath.

A recent policy issued by the Department of the Army provides that no serviceman with at least two years' active duty and Vietnam service will be assigned involuntarily to ready reserve units for weekly drill. They will serve the remainder of their six-year obligation in a standby status. However, they could be called for 15 days' annual summer training. Men so assigned now will be released as soon as practical but at least by December 1, 1967.

Those who have completed at least two years' active duty without Vietnam service will no longer be assigned involuntarily to ready reserve units for regular drill, unless vacancies for their specialties cannot otherwise be filled.

Adventist servicemen in this category of two years' active duty without Vietnam service and who have a Sabbath problem with regular drill where they are now assigned should continue to request assignment to a control group or other assignment which has no regular drill on the Sabbath. The basis for this request would be their inability to attend regular drill due to their religious beliefs.

of the Phoenix Central Church, spoke at the worship hour on the nature of man. Monday morning he delivered his sermon script to Judge Myers' office for his consideration. A copy of the script was also given to the two main newspapers. The *Phoenix Gazette* ran a news article three columns wide with a bold headline at the upper right hand part of the page, in a prime position. The headline read, "Pastor Offers Suggestion on Disposal of Kidd Fund."

In this article Pastor Stevens was quoted as stating that the case should be disallowed. A number of direct quotations were knit together in the context of the legal matter that has seen 134 individuals or groups making claims to the fortune left by the miner. It pointed out the brevity of life, the mortality of man, and life only in Christ.

"What a pity Kidd worked so hard and deprived himself of the normal comforts of life, only to leave a will and his fortune for a project that cannot in all honesty be carried out," the pastor pointed out. A radio station reported the article, giving nearly all of it word for word. Another radio report gave an editorial on the same article. A television station learned about the sermon from other news agencies and contacted Pastor Stevens and filmed, in color, a discussion that was consequently used on a news telecast. A number of phone calls were received at the church and the parsonage from non-members indicating their interest in the matter and the sermon.

Religion in Russia Today

Can the Communist philosophy destroy belief in God?

Has public worship disappeared completely in Iron Curtain countries?

Will the hammer and sickle outlast the cross in the world's largest nation?

These are some of the questions of contemporary concern answered in *Religion in Russia Today*, by Alonzo L. Baker, Ph.D. This new Southern Publishing Association release reveals an aspect of Russian life of which few people are aware.

Doctor Baker, who just this year has completed his third tour of the Soviet Union, is a noted political scientist, currently serving as professor of political science and international relations at Loma Linda University, La Sierra campus. He is professor emeritus at University of the Pacific, where he taught for more than 15 years. His depth of knowledge of the Russian people, their attitudes and problems, is obvious in his writing.

The Soviets are at war against God, Doctor Baker declares, and they fully expect to win. They have many points in their favor. For one thing, religion as we know it exists in Russia mainly among two classes of people: the elderly, whose generation is obviously fast disappearing, and the peasants, who are also vanishing rapidly, due to the continuing urbanization of Russian society.

Although the Soviet government in word insures the right of citizens to worship as they choose, they are, particularly through their educational system and their use of mass media to advocate atheism, endeavoring to abolish all semblance of religious observance. "The Commissars pledged themselves to the total elimination of religion by the substitution of Karl Marx for God," Doctor Baker says.

It is usual, of course, to think of Communism in contrast to Christianity. And it is true that the several million Catholics and Protestants in the Soviet Union suffer from the inability to evangelize actively and thus add to their membership. But religion in Russia encompasses a much broader spectrum. Sixteen million Moslems and three million Jews suffer likewise from governmental intolerance.

What is the future of religion in Russia? Doctor Baker believes that religion may perhaps be more meaningful to those who practice it behind the Iron Curtain than it is in the permissive atmosphere of the free world. It takes courage to believe, to worship according to conscience. It's definitely not the "in" thing to do.

However, as past ages have so clearly proved, belief in God is indestructible. As Doctor Baker points out, the same Joseph Stalin, who ordered millions of Russians annihilated for their beliefs, could not banish God from the heart of his own daughter. Religion in Russia, though severely hampered, will survive in the hearts of many Soviet citizens.
