ACADEMY LAUNDRY SERVES IN CONTINUOUS GROWTH

A delivery truck finishes its delivery of linens at Corona Community Hospital and loads up several bags of soiled linen. During the same day the truck makes similar stops at several motels, nursing homes and a hospital in the Escondido area.

Periodically through the day it returns to its home base, the Academy Laundry and Linen Supply at San Pasqual Academy near Escondido, to unload the soiled laundry and pick up a new supply.

Home base now is a newly completed large prefabricated metal building at the southeast corner of the campus near the grade school and Golden Rule Bindery. Although the laundry business is now in its fourth year of operation, it has only recently moved to its new quarters from a small building which housed the operation just west of the bindery.

A business which when completely equipped will gross up to \$20,000 a month, the laundry now has space for two washers of 400-pound dry capacity or larger and one smaller washer. One flatwork ironer is in operation and there is space for another. Soon to arrive will be a new two-lane folder and cross folder which will deliver up to 200 feet of linen per minute ready for shipment.



Near the ironer are three large dryers of 50- and 100-pound capacity. Other equipment includes presses and smaller pieces which process laundry for student needs. Feeding many of these pieces of equipment with hot water and steam are a large boiler and condensation tank and 3,000-gallon storage tank adjacent to the building.

The whole plant including building and equipment, when finished, will be worth an estimated \$166,000. Co-ordinator of the construction project is Charles Castle, maintenance superintendent. Associated with him are Gene Vestal and Ivan Lewis.

Heading the whole laundry operation since it was opened has been Mattie Wilkes, who retired at the end of 1968. Mrs. Wilkes had previously served as manager of the Forest Lake Academy laundry in Florida for 15 years.

With patience and determination she has guided the laundry to the place it is today. It has taken special dedication to care for the endless task of training student employees and maintaining a primarily student staff which works an average of about 15 hours a week per person. Although she had wanted to retire sev-

eral months ago, she was persuaded to continue until the new plant went into operation.

Now taking the helm is William R.

Benner, 41, of San Bernardino. Benner has been purchasing agent for Polar Whol-sale Electric of Redlands. His background includes sale and electrical service and some office management.

Coming with Benner to San Pasqual will be his wife, Velma, and son, Billy. He also has a daughter, Cindy, a student at the La Sierra Campus of Loma Linda University.

As the Academy Laundry and Linen Supply moves into another year, it will continue to grow and provide new revenue for the school's operation and employment for students as well as service to other businesses in the area.
