Space Available in World Youth Congress Tour Quota

This will be good news for some who have hoped that they might go to the World Youth Congress—July 22 to 26, but have felt that the tour quota was filled.

Due to a number who find they lack funds, we now have space available for people in the first three priority categories which include:

1. Youth 16 through 30

2. Parents of children in academy or college who will go with their children

3. Open since February 1, the third category for people 31 through 50.

It appears we will be able to absorb all those on standby lists and still have seats available for others. One thing must be understood: In balancing out the four plane loads, which we must do, it will be necessary for a number of people living in southern California to go to Oakland at their own expense for departure from that point. This means, too, they will return to Oakland from overseas.

We are trying to keep this number at an absolute minimum, but the fact is that we have more people going from southern California than northern California. If you should fall into this category you will be notified. The departure dates for the four planes are definite:

Tour one will leave in two sections. One

plane from Long Beach on July 2 and one plane from Oakland on July 3.

Tour two will be leaving in two sections. One plane from Long Beach July 17 and one plane from Oakland on July 17.

The exact hours for departures have not been fixed. When these times are determined, tour members will be notified along with tour assignments and points of departure.

The itineraries as stated in the brochure have been changed to conform with present departure dates, also Sabbath observance while on tour, as well as attendance at the Youth Congress. A daily schedule for each tour will be mailed to tour members shortly.

children there are in the crowded cities that have not even a spot of green grass to set their feet upon. If they could be educated in the country amid the beauty, peace, and purity of nature, it would seem to them the spot nearest heaven. In retired places, where we are furthest from the corrupting maxims, customs, and excitements of the world, and nearest to the heart of nature, Christ makes His presence real to us, and speaks to our souls of His peace and love." p. 424.

"We shall find it necessary to establish our schools out of and away from the cities and yet not so far away that they can not be within touch with them to do them good, to let light shine amid the moral darkness. Students need to be placed under the most favorable circumstances to counteract very much of the education they have received." p. 313.

Establishment of Schools

"Schools should be established where there is as much as possible to be found in nature to delight the senses to give variety to the scenery. We should choose a location for our schools apart from the cities where the eye will not rest continually upon dwellings of men, but upon the works of God, where there shall be places of interest for them to visit other than what the city affords. Let our students be placed where nature can speak to the senses and in her voice they may hear the voice of God. Let them be where they can look upon His wondrous works and through nature behold her creator." p. 320.

In Counsels to Parents, Teachers, and Students, we are told that if we establish our schools out of the cities, we shall give the students an opportunity to train the muscles to work as well as the brain to think.

The book *Education* informs us that problems of recreation and amusement are minimized when the setting is predominantly rural and students have access to fields, woods, and mountains.

It was the foregoing quotations in mind that San Pasqual Academy was located. The San Pasqual Valley was the sight of the closing battles between General Kearny and the Californians in the Mexican War. In the succeeding years the valley was settled and flourished with a wide variety of agricultural products. This fertile area still fosters a vigorous citrus industry as well as being the avocado capi-

tal of the nation. In addition, large dairy and poultry farms continue to thrive.

The climate is unexcelled in continental United States with moderate temperature through the summer regulated by the cool breeze from the ocean only 20 miles away—while the winters remain sufficiently temperate that picnics are in order throughout the year. The rural setting of the school is ideally suited for the vigorous application of study, work, and recreation. It therefore compliments the pursuit of spiritual values.

Only 45 minutes by car brings the following possibilities within reach of the teacher and his class: the Anza Borrego Desert, the lofty and beautiful Laguna Mountains, the University of California (San Diego), San Diego State University, San Diego naval complex, the world-famous San Diego Zoo, and a host of heavy industrial and aerospace facilities as well as the quaint and unique culture of Old Mexico.



FLOOD DISASTER RELIEF IS PROVIDED

When recent prolonged storms hit Southern California causing extensive flood disaster several Riverside-Sam Bernardino County areas were affected.

Churches in the area were prepared to provide relief assistance in several ways. Shortly before Sabbath began January 24, Santa Ana river banks began to crumble under on-rushing water. Norco, La Sierra, and Arlington church members who had been organized into an Adventist Community Service organization to provide man power in just such situations received an appeal for help from the Norco Fire Department.

Under the leadership of Jay Robinson, chairman of the Norco group, key individuals in each group were contacted and they in turn notified members of their group to report to the Norco Fire Department

Working late into the night, the men filled sandbags and helped shore up weak-

end river banks. The next day Robinson received another appeal for help and nearly 100 men left church services to help save an area occupied by 35 homes.

In the afternoon the Arlington Pathfinder Chuck Wagon arrived to supply food for the workers.

Later, the Norco Fire Chief commented to a newspaper representative, "I don't know what would have happened if it hadn't been for the Adventists."

As rains continued into the following week appeals for food, clothing and bedding came from the Riverside and Cucamonga areas and goods were sent to both areas in the conference welfare van. As La Sierra food stock became depleted a call was sent to the La Sierra Teen Torchbearers organization to help gather more food. They in turn contacted grade school rooms and total response included some 500 cans of food from the grade school students and 800 cans from community homes. They also received some 500 articles of clothing and bedding.

These articles arrived just in time to fulfill a request from flood victims in the Mira Loma area. Much of these supplies were used for victims being housed in

one section of a Mira Loma children's home.

The La Sierra Teen Torchbearer group had been previously organized for this type of solicitation service having given assistance over several years to a Riverside Easter. Seal campaign. Directed by Roland Rhymus, seventh- and eight-grade mathematics teacher, the 55 junior high youths were quickly organized to accomplish the project in one evening. Rhymus was assisted by 10 adults.

Distribution of goods in the Riverside area was directed by Kansas Avenue Church dorcas welfare leader, Autie Rowlett.

Without these well-established organizations this welfare work could not have been accomplished. Disaster occurs without warning and organizations must be established and workable before disaster is expected. We commend these organizations which were prepared.




Former Years of Service

A baby floating in swirling water rescued alive . . . a mother of five swept from a roof top by flood waters, whose body has not been found . . . homes washed away . . . areas less hard hit by the storm had no electricity, no telephone, and, in some cases, no water-except from the sky -and there was plenty of that!

This was Ojai, January 25, 1969. It was Sabbath morning, but there was no meeting at the Ojai church. No one had announced it as telephones were not ringing that day.

Pastor and Mrs. Stephen B. Olney were out in the downpour, taking drinking water and supplies to a school nearby



where hundreds of refugees were huddled. When telephone service revived briefly, Elder Olney called the Seventh-day Adventist Welfare Center and asked for a van load of supplies to aid the stricken

The van wasn't permitted to drive through until Sunday evening. Immediately, blankets and other articles were dispensed. In the meantime, Pastor Olney ar-


ranged to use an empty market in downtown Ojai. The owner was willing to donate his building and he also had the electricity turned on. Newspaper articles and two radio stations informed local citizens daily that "Seventh-day Adventists stood ready to be of assistance to those in need due to the storm and flooding.

Mrs. Elmer Widstrand, Dorcas director and dress designer, phoned clients to tell them of the relief center, and money began to pour in. One lady gave a check for \$500. Various people brought clothing, bedding, canned goods, and one person gave an entire houseful of furniture. The Red Cross and Lions Club moved in to

Pastor and Mrs. Olney are working from early until late at the "emergency relief" center, and it may be open for five or six weeks more. Members of the Ventura and Oxnard Seventh-day Adventist churches have turned out to help fold and "size" clothes for Ojai relief.

To reach hearts in the Ojai area with the "good news" has not been easy. This is the heart of Theosophist country. However, we do believe that God is using this disaster to make His presence felt here-"and who knows but that we have come to the kingdom for such a time as this?"

These improvements cost approximately \$7,500 and less than a thousand dollars of this amount remains to be raised.

New Members

Fifty new members were taken into church membership by baptism and church letters and our Sabbath School and church attendance shows a remarkable increase. Our tithes, Sabbath School, and mission offerings showed a substantial gain over the previous year of 1967.

Through careful planning by the pastor and our lay activities leader, Allen Sovory, and by diligent work and liberal giving on the part of our members, our Ingathering goal was reached in one week. One Sabbath School class, taught and directed by Miss Helen Stevenson, gave \$406 of their own funds to Ingathering the day the campaign was launched. This same Sabbath School class, of about 10 members, gave \$180 to missions this past 13th Sabbath. The total 13th Sabbath offering for the fourth quarter amounted to more than \$450. This was the largest 13th Sabbath offering in Miramonte's history and was reached even though a third or more of our Sabbath School members were absent that day with the flu.

Two college young men are aspiring to be preachers, and this summer two of our young ladies will receive the R.N. degree from our local Seventh-day Adventist schools. A Women's Club Raises Funds for Three Orphanages' Needs

Nearly \$500 was raised by members of the Kalindha Club, a club for the Loma Linda campus women's residence hall, during their annual week of sacrifice.

The funds will be used to help sponsor three orphanages—the Seoul Sanitarium and Hospital Orphanage, Seoul, South Korea; the Cross Orphanage, Pusan, Korea; and a small orphanage in Honduras.

Club members stipulated that some of the money be used for the purchase of fruit and dessert for the orphans, some things they seldom have, says Melba M. Olmstead, dean of women on the Loma Linda campus.

The orphanage in Seoul used most of the money to purchase needed playground equipment; the Cross Orphanage purchased 60 books to start a library; and the orphanage in Honduras has not been heard from as yet.

Dentistry Refresher Courses Precede Dental Convention

Attendance of more than 1,200 dentists, dental hygienists, and students of the two professions is expected at Loma Linda University School of Dentistry Alumni-Student Convention scheduled for March 6 and 7 in Loma Linda.

Keynote speech will be given Thursday morning, March 6, by Carlton H. Williams, D.D.S., speaker, House of Delegates of the American Dental Association.

Highlighting the convention will be the student table clinic competition, to be judged by a panel of seven leading dental authorities. The scientific exhibits, originated and prepared by dental and dental hygiene students, display advances in basic science and research and in clinical application and techniques.

Prior to the convention, March 2 to 5, 16 continuing education refresher courses in dentistry will be offered at the university.

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Christian Education Plays a Very Strong Role in Hawaii

Seventh-day Adventism came to Hawaii in 1885 when William Scott and Abraham LaRue came to place our literature in the homes of the people. A few months after this, the first Adventist minister came to Hawaii to take up the work, and within a few years, in 1895, the first school was opened.

Hawaiian Mission Élementary School had its early roots in other related educational programs conducted by the Hawaiian Mission, and some 48 years ago moved to its present site, 1415 Makiki Street. Today Hawaiian Mission Elementary School is a strong church school with 315 students taught and served by five faculty members. The school plant is commodious, well kept, and well equipped, enabling the faculty to do a thorough work.

Many of the teachers hold master's degrees and have taken a good deal of specialized work. Brother Paul Kravig, the principal of the school, is a man seasoned and experienced in our church school, having the background to be able to counsel the students and faculty from first-hand experience.

Through the years it has been interesting to notice that the faculty of Hawaiian Mission Elementary School has remained quite constant, which serves to build an institution of influence, permanence and high accomplishment. Into the classroom


of this school come the many children of our Adventist homes, in addition to other children who come from Buddhist, Shinto, Catholic, and various Protestant religious backgrounds.
