Youth May Earn While They Learn at Furniture Factory

The furniture factory at Thunderbird Academy has summer job openings for youth who will be attending school there next fall.

Those who are 16 or older and in good health may earn while they are learning throughout the summer. When school starts they will, because of their summer work, be in line for the same job with an increase in hourly pay. They will have a substantial amount earned to apply on their account when the school year begins, also. However, if you are not coming until the school term begins, we plan to have plenty of job openings for you then.

Those who are 18 or over will have opportunity to train for some of the machine operator positions normally held by adults.

On-the-job Training

This on-the-job training will not only help you defray a major part of your school expenses but will be an asset to you in your adult life, either as a hobby or as a means of earning a livelihood. For those who will not be going on to college after graduation from academy there are always some opportunities to train for the positions of lead men in preparation for supervisory work.

Twice during the past 10 years Thunderbird Academy furniture has had the distinction of being chosen by a national or regional furniture manufacturing magazine for a special write-up. Message Given to Spanish People of Phoenix, Tucson

Our two Spanish churches of Phoenix and Tucson simultaneously took upon themselves the responsibility of evangelizing the Spanish population of both cities.

This program really started early in January when Elder Samuel Weiss came from Los Angeles, as union evangelist, and organized both churches for a strong program of visitation. For four consecutive Sabbaths we visited as many homes as possible, and on the fourth visit we registered folk in our correspondence school, "La Voz de la Esperanza," our Spanish Voice of Prophecy.

The office of "La Voz de la Esperanza" sent invitations to our meetings to 268 students in Phoenix and 235 in Tucson. Meetings started March 15 in the Phoenix Lowell School auditorium, and the next day in a public-school auditorium in Tucson. We were very happy for the good attendance.

At the first meeting in Phoenix, one man came to Elder Weiss and asked for "change" so he could give his offering that night. When told there would be no offering, he could hardly believe it. Not only was there no offering, but there was no public prayer either. Much private praying and fasting were done, though.

At the fifth meeting we gave Bibles to the people and Elder Weiss explained to them that we should never open the Word of God without asking Him for His guid-

ance, so he had the first prayer in public. Not only did we have prayer at the beginning of each meeting and at the end, but we had a good offering every time.

Our two Bible workers were kept busy from the beginning. We are very fortunate in having with us Concha Rodriguez, well-qualified and experienced Bible worker, whom the union conference employed to work with Elder Weiss in his efforts. She

is doing Bible work in Phoenix. Mafalda Montana is doing Bible work in Tucson.

Both churches have co-operated in a most remarkable way. We are pleased and thankful to the Lord for what He has done. We thank Him above all for His blessings and for bringing Elder and Mrs. Weiss and Concha Rodriguez to our field to help our Spanish constituency.

It is most interesting to see how the people are getting acquainted with their Bibles. Some have never had a Bible in their hands. Now they are looking up all the texts given and read together with the evangelist.

We know time is short, and we are most grateful to our conference and to the Pacific Union for their interest in the Spanish work. May God reward their interest by giving us many souls for His kingdom.

Church Activities Record Is Goal of the Photo Contest

The Review and Herald and General Conference Promotional Pictures Committee are again sponsoring a North American Photo Contest. Open to all who do not earn the major portion of their living by photography, the contest seeks to secure on film a record of Seventh-day Adventist church activities.

A grand award of \$100 cash or a complete set of the 10-volume Commentary Reference Series will be made for the best photo submitted in the contest. Second and third prizes in the grand award classification will be \$75 and \$50 respectively. A first prize of \$25 will be given qualifying pictures in each of nine categories, as follows:

1. Disaster and famine relief work of the church. Pictures showing Adventists giving aid to disaster victims or needy persons, or showing relief supplies being prepared.
2. Summer youth camp activities, including Opportunity camps, camp crafts, and Pathfinder fairs.
3. Youth activities not associated with summer camp—sunshine bands, community services, inner-city aid, student missionary activities.
4. Medical or health work of the church, not including school-related activities.
5. Evangelism—literature evangelism, Gift Bible evangelism, personal witnessing, radio or TV work, spiritual ministry, Vacation Bible School activities, and Sabbath School activities.

6. Educational or school-related activities, not including simply buildings.

7. Adventist institutions or historical buildings. Must show imagination and creativity in composition of pictures.

8. Mood pictures.

9. Close-ups. Pictures taken very close up capturing texture, expression, or unusual rendition of a subject.

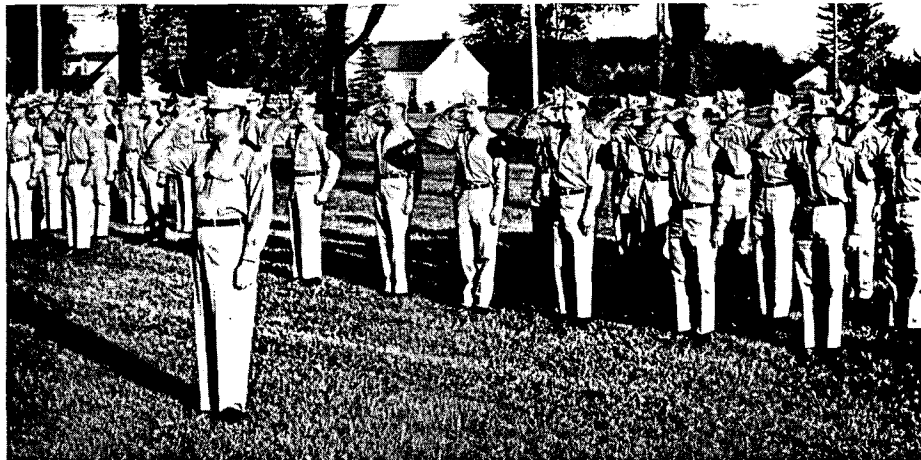
Winning photos will be featured in the Review and Herald and Tell.

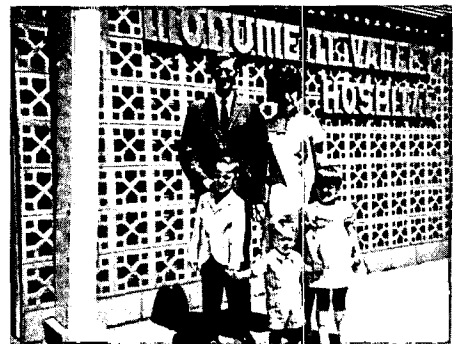

A Successful Five-Day Plan Helps Many Overcome Habit

The smoking habit has its hold upon many residents in Paradise, California, as deeply as anywhere else in the country. A Five-Day Plan to Stop Smoking that concluded March 13 at the Feather River Hospital gave assistance to 55 smokers seeking to break the habit.

Dr. Dean Hoiland and Chaplain L. R. Langworthy conducted the successful series, assisted by Everett Saulsbury, director of nurses, Roy Matthews of the hospital's maintenance department, and Jim Stanley from the Paradise Church.

Thirty-two of those attending the group therapy sessions had quit smoking entirely from the first night on, and the remaining number had cut down considerably, from two to four packs a day to as few as two to four cigarettes.

It was an enthusiastic group consisting of prominent businessmen and women of Paradise, some retired individuals, and young people with families for whom they wished to preserve their health.

A follow-up meeting was held March 18. The group which attended received additional help in staying with their choice to quit the habit. The new temperance film, "Countdown," was a feature of the evening.

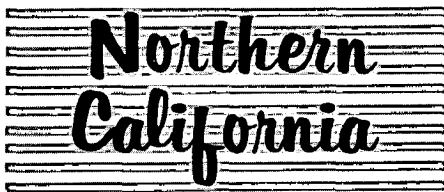

All 10 members participating in the coronary risk reduction program for executives at St. Helena Sanitarium registered approval and satisfaction at the end of the one-week pilot program on April 13.

Sanitarium officials plan to offer the program as a one-week or two-week package program beginning the first week of each month through November. Classes in tension management, meal preparation, nicotine withdrawal, and physical fitness combine to provide a balanced program of health education in an institution with

NEW SPA PRINCIPAL WILL BEGIN WORK THIS SUMMER

It has been previously announced that Elder N. C. Sorensen had been called to be the associate educational secretary by vote of the delegates at the biennial constituency meeting in March. However, Elder Sorensen, who was principal at San Pasqual Academy, has accepted a call to be educational secretary of the Southern California Conference.

Elder Bietz has been closely associated with denominational education since graduation from Union College in 1955.

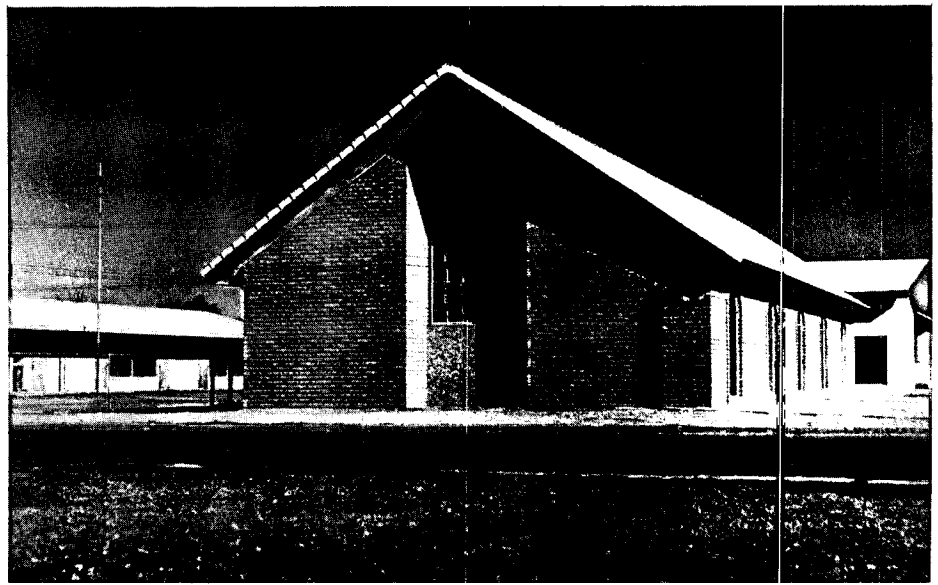

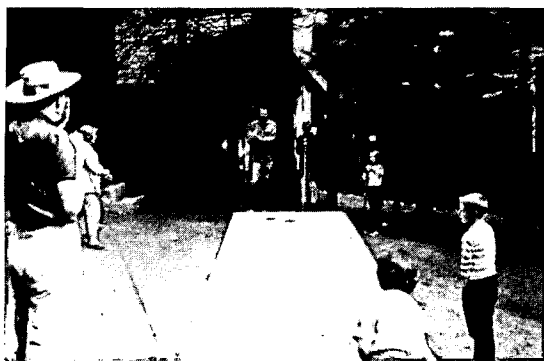

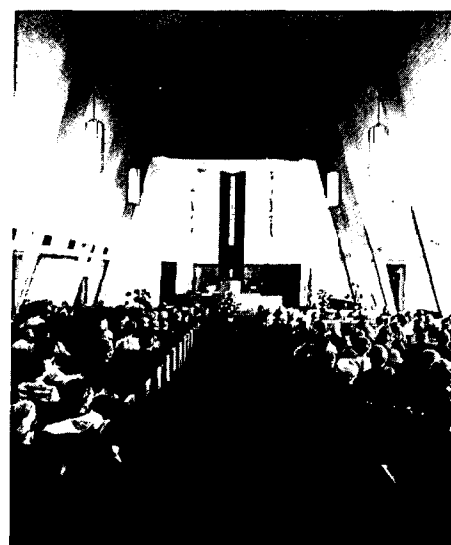

Health Education Programs Give Smoking Information

Most of the adult population in the United States now know the dangers of cigarette smoking but many of the nation's children are still experimenting with smoking.

A survey taken recently in California revealed that upwards of 50 per cent of the children in the fourth grade have already experimented with cigarette smoking.

Loma Linda University School of Public Health students are trying to reduce this number by means of a three-day health education clinic on smoking. Currently 26 university students are involved in presenting some 300 programs to 3,000 children in the Redlands Unified School District.

"To our knowledge," says Harold F. Googe, instructor in health education, "we are the only school in California to offer such a program of total coverage to any public school district."

Community Service

The purpose of the program is primarily to render a community service, adds Mr. Googe. "But, of course, it is of considerable importance to us because it offers significant training to our students in the area of health education teaching.

Each classroom has three smoking education programs held at one-week intervals, explains Mr. Googe. On the first visit, the student health educator makes friends with the children. He tells them how wonderfully their bodies are made, making no mention of cigarette smoking.

On the second day a film depicting the dangers of smoking is shown. During the third program, the effects of smoking over a long period of time are shown with the use of an actual cancerous human lung.

The School of Public Health has also developed a smoking education plan for teachers to incorporate into regular classroom programs.

Summer School Classes to Be Held; Bulletins Are Available

Church-employed teachers in the Pacific Union Conference may register by mail for summer school classes on the La Sierra campus of the university.

Summer classes will be in session from June 23 through August 14.

Two "pre-session" seminars of interest to teachers are also scheduled by the School of Education. The first, teaching of reading in the secondary school, will be presented June 9-20 by Marilyn M. Teele, assistant professor of English. The second seminar, teaching religion in secondary schools, will be held June 10-19 and will be taught by Dr. Vernon H. Koenig, associate professor of educational foundations and curriculum.

Bulletins for the summer session are now available from the Admissions Office, Loma Linda University, Riverside, California 92505.

To qualify for tuition-free attendance, church-employed personnel should submit verification of employment with their applications for enrollment.

HOSPITAL OFFERS CHAPLAIN RESIDENCY CREDIT PROGRAM

A chaplain residency program is being offered for the first time at Loma Linda University Hospital, according to Charles W. Teel, chaplain supervisor.

Currently enrolled in the one-year program are Theodore Chamberlain of Berrien Springs, Michigan, and Robert McIntyre of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

Through the new program it is possible for the chaplain resident to receive from two to four quarters of credit in clinical pastoral education and to receive credit with the Association for Clinical Pastoral Education and the American Protestant Hospital Association.

"At the last General Conference of Seventh-day Adventists session held in Detroit, Michigan, it was recommended that hospital administrators encourage chaplains to become members of the American Protestant Hospital Association," states Chaplain Teel. "This requires four quarters of clinical education credit."

Two other students enrolled in the 12-week spring quarter are Richard Liu, a graduate student in Loma Linda University School of Public Health, and Edward Bryan of Glendale.

A Consumer-related Sciences Building Is Asset to Course

One hundred forty students from Riverside area high schools visited Loma Linda University's new Consumer-related Sciences Building on the La Sierra campus last month, says Mary P. Byers, chairman of the department of consumer-related sciences.

The building, completed only last year, is attracting considerable interest in the Riverside area because of its "unique" features, adds Mrs. Byers. Members of the home economics faculty designed the building in co-operation with the construction experts.

The two-story structure provides 20,750 square feet of space, divided into four principle areas—teacher education, child development, clothing and textiles, and foods and nutrition. The building also features a large conference auditorium, seminar rooms, several laboratories, and a central supply room.

More than 100 students are involved in consumer-related science programs, reports Mrs. Byers.

The department seeks to prepare students for professional careers and to emphasize the paramount interests and well-being of the individual, the consumer, and the family, states Mrs. Byers.

Programs leading to the Bachelor of Science degree with majors in dietetics, food administration, clothing, and home economics are offered. In addition, programs for the associate degree and minors are offered in the last three fields. Two certificate programs (non-degree) are offered as preparation for cooking and baking employment and as a means for employed cooks and bakers to increase their skills.

Elder and Mrs. J. Klim and Family Welcomed to Hawaii

We are confident that this will greatly strengthen our churches and help our membership toward the 3,000 mark. We urge our members in all our churches to even now engage diligently in the personal work of establishing contacts so that the committee will be presented with many requests for the services of our mission evangelist. This will, of necessity, be a co-operative program, one of sowing the seed and reaping the harvest.

Every member can help in this program, and we do need every member to make the work in Hawaii grow.

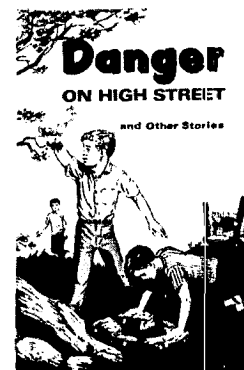
