Baptism Sabbath

We may stir up the ground, sow much seed, and cultivate well; but it will be in vain if we do not plan for a harvest season.

At the 1968 Autumn Council it was voted that September 27, 1969 would be North American Division Baptism Sabbath. Surely there will be other baptisms all during the year. One who is prepared and ready for this sacred service should never be asked to wait for a certain day in the distant future; however, a special baptismal time goal gives us a challenge toward which we may work.

Not only will this be a most beautiful and precious day personally for the new members of the family, but they will be participating in what we pray will be the largest baptism and a most wonderful day in the history of our church.

Some overseas divisions have already led the way for others to follow.

Divisional Baptisms

The South American Division baptized 4,126 on September 26, 1967. One year later this same division baptized 6,165 on September 28, 1968. These were not their only baptisms but the result of planning for this special Baptism Day. The Inter-American Division baptized over 4,000 on September 28, 1968. On March 9, 1969, 1,108 individuals were baptized in a single baptism at Rwanda in the Trans-Africa Division. What a wonderful harvest we can expect from God on this coming North American Division Baptism Sabbath.

The purpose of this special day is not to set a statistical record but to encourage ministers, institutional workers, and laity to plan for and concentrate on a program now that will develop a harvest for a great reaping day—September 27.



Union Elementary Students Lead in FFT Fund-raising

Youth from the Adventist elementary schools in the Pacific Union Conference raised the biggest chunk of the \$35,000 price tag on a new camera for the "Faith for Today" telecast studios in New York.

Hawaiian Mission Academy Elementary School came in first in the Union with \$925 of the \$10,000 total from the five western states.

From selling scrap iron to desserts, from sit-ups to slave auctions, from shoveling snow in Alaska to selling vegetables in Hawaii, hundreds of projects kept 537 Seventh-day Adventist elementary schools busy from February to May, as they worked toward the goal for purchase of the camera.

On April 28, 1969, the camera was presented in a special ceremony attended by three student representatives. Gwen Herr, an eighth-grader from the Helen Nyatt School in Lincoln, Nebraska, represented the school with the largest total contribution—\$1,605. From College Heights, Alberta, Canada, was flown Nyrene Compton, the representative from Canada. The student with the highest single contribution (\$103), Lonnie Anderson of Fletcher, North Carolina, also came to New York.

Members Given Counsel on Proper Tithe Disbursement

"Shall I send some of my tithe to this project in a poor mission field?" asks a church member after being solicited for tithe for a "needy" school.

Our answer: NO! It is not Biblical to

Our answer: NO! It is not Biblical to send your tithe to Mexico or South America or the Philippines or the Red Cross or a favorite charity.

The Lord says, "Bring ye all the tithe into the storehouse, . . ." Malachi 3:10. The "storehouse" implies a central treasury responsible to receive and disburse tithe. The individual is responsible to God to bring all the tithe into the storehouse, but the individual has no right to put strings on its use or allocate it to different purposes.

The disbursement of tithe is the responsibility of duly selected treasurers. In Israel, God's people brought the tithe "unto the treasuries. And I made treasurers over the treasuries . . . and their office was to distribute unto their brethren." Nehemiah 13:12, 13.

Biblical Principle

Years ago Adventists adopted this Biblical principle of the storehouse and treasurers to handle the tithe. The Church Manual states, "The practice of the denomination is that the tithe be paid into the local church in which membership is held." (page 194) "The tithe is not used or disbursed by the local church but is passed on to the Conference Treasurer." (page 192)

(page 192)

"If it is regarded as right for individuals to make what use they please of the tithe," wrote Ellen G. White, "the Lord cannot bless." (Review and Herald Supplement, December 1, 1896) From the same author in Volume 9 we read, "God has not changed; the tithe is still to be used for the support of the ministry. . . . The portion that God has reserved for Himself is not to be diverted to any other purpose than that which He has specified. Let none feel at liberty to retain their tithes, to use according to their own judgment. They are not to use it for themselves in an emergency, nor apply it as they see fit, even in what they may regard as the Lord's work. . . .

"If our churches will take their stand upon the Lord's word and be faithful in paying their tithe into His treasury, more laborers will be encouraged to take up ministerial work." (*Testimonies*, Vol. 9, pages 247-250)

The Adventist Church has been blessed beyond most denominations because we have adopted the Biblical plan of church finance. Let us not revert to the plans of other denominations whose mission programs rest on gifts to the project making the most eloquent plea.

Let us each "bring all the tithe into the storehouse" and be eligible for the blessing He promises to pour out.



If you do not leave a will, your property will be distributed in accordance with the laws of the state wherein you reside, and such distribution may not be in accordance with your wishes or intentions.




