Frequency Change for West Coast Radio Bible Study Group

Plans were made for a frequency change of the West Coast Amateur Radio Bible Study Group at the annual get-together of the group held the July 4 weekend at Wawona Camp in Yosemite National Park.

A new law enforced by the Federal Communications Commission prohibits general class amateur radio operators from operating on the segment of frequencies wherein lies the frequency used by the Bible Study Group for the past eleven years. So that as many as possible can join in the group, it was unanimously voted at the Sunday morning business meeting to change the frequency of the Bible Study Group to 3972 KHZ.

The Bible Study Group now will meet each morning at 6 o'clock local time on 3972 KHZ instead of the previous frequency of 3854 KHZ.

Forty-two "hams" with their families and guests checked in for the special weekend meeting, and a count of 125 was made on Sabbath morning, July 5. The lesson study was directed by Guy, W6ZTY, who for the past eleven years has faithfully directed the Bible Study Group on the air early each morning. Guest speaker Dr. Ira Baley, ZP5IT of Paraguay, centered his talk around the Scripture, "Ye are the salt of the earth."

To close this year's session, a new committee was elected to plan the 1970 meeting. Warm thanks are extended to those who helped plan this year's get-together, as well as to all who participated and attended, making it the largest yet.



Lakeside Community Hospital Opens a New Maternity Wing

On July 11 the Lakeside Community Hospital, Lakeport, California, officially opened its new and completely remodeled maternity wing.

This south wing of the hospital is modern, fully air-conditioned, and includes rooms for patients, a nursery, labor room, and delivery room. The delivery room has a new central oxygen supply and vacuum.

The nursery contains four bassinets and also a vestibule for examinations and for working with the newborn babies. It, too, contains a central oxygen supply and vacuum. This new maternity department is separated from the rest of the hospital by a special enclosure. Last year 128 babies were born at Lakeside Hospital.

Don Weaver of Alameda, California, and formerly of Ukiah, was the architect, and O. L. Dunken of Upper Lake, hospital engineer, was in charge of construction.

Further plans for remodeling in the future will be an enlarged surgery suite, enlarged kitchen and dining room, laboratory, X-ray, and office space.

Presently the Lakeside Community Hospital is a voluntary, non-profit hospital operating under the general non-profit laws of the State of California and is accredited by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals.

New Approach to Evangelism to Be Used in the Bay Area

Keys to Health and Happiness is a new approach to evangelism. This new method, proven successful, will be used in the Bay Area during the coming year.

Elder Reuben A. Hubbard and Elder Harold M. Keehnel, directors of the program, will hold meetings in Alameda, Vallejo, and Richmond. Alameda will be first, September 27 to December 6.

The format is entirely different. Designed to reach the multitudes, the program includes use of television, newspaper, radio, mail-outs, door-to-door work, and Five-Day Plans; Health Education Services for clubs, civic groups, and luncheon programs; and a series of health and Bible classes. It is an all-out assault to place the total message of Seventh-day Adventists before the community. Extensive ground work has already been done in Alameda under the direction of Elder Jack L. Bowers, local pastor.

The evangelistic meetings are different, too. Instead of revival-style meetings and sermons, the meetings are conducted as classes. First is the health class under the direction of Elder Hubbard and Mrs. Rhoda Keehnel, R.N. Practical information is given on drug abuse, cancer, prevention of heart attacks, weight control, mental health, physical fitness, and kicking the tobacco habit.

The Bible classes follow, not as a sermon, but as discussion with audience participation. You have never seen anything like it. Elder Hubbard and Elder Keehnel are seated behind a table and present the class together in a discussion format. This has attracted favorable comment, even from those who are not religiously oriented. Lessons are handed out nightly on the subjects discussed in both health education and Bible education. The lessons are filled out at home and returned the next night. Visiting centers largely on those who miss a class, so that the instruction can be repeated and the prospect brought right

Keys to Health and Happiness centers its success upon two new evangelistic approaches: (1) a complete community survey of interest, follow-up, and enrollment in the adult education classes; and (2) conducting "classes" rather than evangelistic meetings. Larger segments of the public are thus attracted to attend.







Currently professor of history at Loma Linda University, Dr. Landeen arrived in Canada at age 17 as an immigrant from Sweden. He took his undergraduate work at Walla Walla College, College Place, Washington, and received his Doctor of Philosophy degree from the University of Michigan, Ann Arbor.

Dr. Landeen served as president of Walla Walla College from 1933 to 1938; was drafted into the United States Army at the age of 53 and sent to Germany with the army of occupation where he coordinated the restoration of southern Germany's ruined educational system; was president of La Sierra College in 1960 for two years; and was asked to serve again as president in 1963 following the death of Dr. Fabian Meier.


