Food and Nutrition Questions Answered

Question:

"What about formaldehyde? I've heard it is used in plastic products; in preserving milk and butter; also to embalm bodies. Is this true?"

Answer:

Formaldehyde is a colorless liquid with a very pungent, irritating odor. Its most common biological use is as a tissue preservative; therefore, it is used in embalming fluids.

Formaldehyde is also widely used by the chemical industries in the production of dyes, glues, synthetic fabrics, mirrors, explosives, and waterproof articles. It is used in the process of tanning leather, in photography, and in hardening rubber. Thus you can see that it is a very useful chemical.

You specifically asked about plastics. Yes, formaldehyde is combined with other chemicals to form many of today's plastic products. The point to bear in mind here is that while a chemical may be harmful in one form, when it has been reacted with another chemical its form can be changed, and the result may be perfectly harmless. If a plastic is used for food packaging so that it contacts the food, it must be non-toxic as required by law.

Around the turn of the century, before modern pasteurization and refrigeration were commonplace, some dairies added chemical preservatives to their milk to prolong its keeping quality. Such practices are illegal today and any dairy following such practices would have its license revoked. Today Grade A pasteurized milk from any public-sale dairy is pure milk which has been heat-treated only briefly to kill microorganisms present. Very strict sanitation regulations are also enforced within the dairy so that the pasteurized milk is clean milk.

There is one other use of formaldehyde which might be responsible for some confusion. Periodic quality checks on the butterfat content of milk are run by milk producers. To keep the milk samples from souring between the time they are taken and when the laboratory analyses are made, a preservative is sometimes used. Formaldehyde may be legally used for this purpose. Such milk, of course, is not intended or sold for drinking.

Academy Administration Restructured for Redevelopment

At the April 6, 1969, Arizona Conference constituency meeting, the voting delegation asked the conference administration to redevelop Thunderbird Academy on its present location as quickly as it can be done practically. The urgency behind this decision has to do with accreditation with our own denomination as well as with state accrediting bodies. To implement the redevelopment program, the academy board last spring restructured the administration to give it added strength as we move ahead with the constituency decision.

Elder R. O. Stone, who for a number of years was business manager but more recently principal and business manager, was asked to take the newly-created position of superintendent. This places him in a position of responsibility over the administrative staff. His chief efforts will be in the area of finance and planning for redevelopment. The entire academic program is under the leadership of Elder H. D. Lawson. As principal he will be responsible for the students, teaching personnel, and academic activities. He comes to us with 20 years of academy experience, 14 of them in leadership positions. He has proven to be a real strength to our school already.

Larry Henderson, our guidance counselor, will relate directly to student activities; William Nordrum is serving as business manager. J. M. Simpson, our wood products manager, is doing an outstanding work in expanding sales and labor in his capacity.

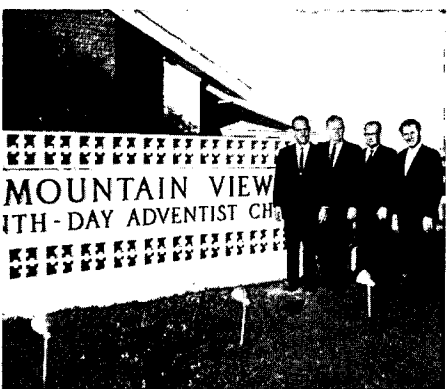

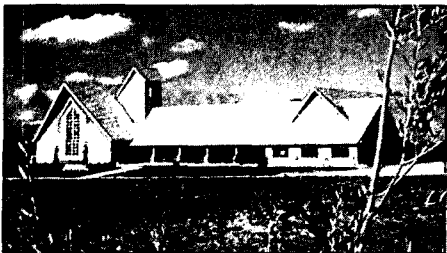

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PACIFIC UNION COLLEGE

PUC College Day Postponed; Revision of Format in Process

College Day, a traditional event which annually brings some 650 seniors from 11 academies in Central and Northern California to visit the PUC campus, has been postponed from the November 10 date originally published in the calendar.

A special meeting of academy principals, scheduled for the same day by the Pacific Union Conference, precludes the holding of College Day on the original date; and two other proposed dates have proven unsatisfactory for similar reasons, President F. O. Rittenhouse stated.

Meanwhile, a special committee continues to work on a revision of the College Day format, unchanged for many years, in terms of criteria being developed from a list of objectives for the event. Major changes are anticipated.

The revised date will be announced well in advance, and Adventist youth attending public high schools in the territory of the constituency served by the institution will also be welcomed to participate, President Rittenhouse added.

The new date will likely come during the spring quarter, he concluded.

College Witnesses Publicly on Behalf of Creationism

Pacific Union College recently had opportunity to witness publicly on behalf of the Biblical view of creationism in the wake of a widely-publicized decision by the California State Board of Education that an alternative position to the theory of evolution should be made available to children in the state's public school system.

Meeting in Sacramento October 9 for an expectedly routine adoption of a new "Science Guidelines" syllabus for public school teachers, the board by majority vote referred the document back to the preparation committee, recommending the inclusion of an adequate statement of the creationist position.

Dean Bartlett of the Episcopal Grace Cathedral, San Francisco, attacked from his pulpit the teaching of Genesis in the public schools as an "appalling" state of affairs; and such heated controversy developed that the educational television station in the Bay Area, KQED (Channel 9), decided to do a one-hour "special" on the issue.

A TV producer contacted PUC Biology Department Chairman Dr. Donald V. Hemphill for assistance in locating a creationist scientist to participate on a panel discussion.

As a result, Dr. Harold Coffin of the Geoscience Research Foundation, Berrien Springs, Michigan, a Seventh-day Adventist marine zoologist, was flown to San Francisco to appear on the program which was first aired in prime time (9 to 10 p.m.) Thursday, October 30, and then rebroadcast from 5 to 6 p.m. Sunday, November 2.

Dr. Coffin also addressed the student body of Pacific Union College at the Friday evening vesper program after having met several biology seminars earlier that day.

Copies of Dr. Coffin's latest book, *Creation: Accident or Design?*, were given to the non-Adventist participants on the telecast; and the nationally-recognized Adventist scientist is now preparing a monograph

Among the busy family's many recent performances is a Sabbath afternoon concert for 1,200 members and friends of the Tamarind Street Church in Compton.

Physics Professor's Articles Published in Health Physics

Dr. Dowell E. Martz, chairman of the Pacific Union College Physics Department, is credited with three articles appearing in the current issue of *Health Physics*, an international journal devoted to the effects of nuclear radiation on man and his environment.

Dr. Martz is listed as the senior author of two reports entitled "Analysis of Atmospheric Concentrations of RaA, RaB, and RaC by Alpha Spectroscopy" and "Protection Against Radon Progeny by Filter Type Respirators."

Both articles are related to the physical aspects of radioactive contaminants in the atmosphere of underground uranium mines.

A third article, which Dr. Martz co-authored with colleagues in the Atomic Energy Commission-sponsored research effort, discussed the biological hazards confronting uranium miners.

A large number of requests for reprint copies has been received at the PUC Physics Department, with many coming from the Eastern European uranium mining countries such as Czechoslovakia and Hungary.
