YOUTH TO ENTER THE ''HELP THE HAPPENING" CONTEST

WASHINGTON, D.C.-Editors of the new Seventh-day Adventist youth magazine have announced a "Help the Happening" contest.

Aimed at finding a name for the new magazine, the contest invites suggestions from anyone between the ages of 16 and 30. One name to an entry blank is permitted. The contest closes December 15.

Describing the new magazine as a "bold weekly magazine for Seventh-day Adventist youth," editors urge contestants to think in terms of a name that will fit the bright new format and content of the publication.

The person submitting the name selected will receive a first prize of \$100. Second and third prizes of \$50 and \$25 will also be awarded. In event of a tie, the entry bearing the earliest postmark will receive the award, so an early response is indicated.


Planning for the new publication is progressing, with the first issue scheduled for May 1970.

ELDER F. L. PETERSON PASSES A WAY IN LOS ANGELES Frank Loris Peterson, retired vice president of the General Conference, was hon-

ored at funeral services October 29 in the Los Angeles Berean Church where he was

a member. He was 76. Youngest of four born to devout Methodists, in Pensacola, Florida, he was educated in schools of that church, where he showed an unusual aptitude and proficiency in his classroom studies



as well as music. At 14 he responded to God's call through the preaching of Elder J. H. Lawrence.

Recognizing in his young convert the characteristics and potential for the ministry, Elder Lawrence encouraged Frank to turn his life to this special field of witnessing. Frank L. Peterson was the first man of color to graduate from Pacific Union College, completing his training in 1916.

His first assignment was as assistant pastor in Baltimore, Maryland. Until 1922, when he was married to Bessie Elston in Alabama, F. L. Peterson served as a pastor. His first teaching position was at a small one-room school in Louisville, Kentucky.

To Oakwood College

In 1926 he was called to Oakwood College, where he stayed three years. While at the Berean Church in Boston, he was invited to coordinate the Negro conferences of the North American Division at the General Conference, where he led from 1930 to 1941.

Returning to California in 1941, Elder Peterson pastored the Wadsworth Church through 1945. From 1945 to 1954 he was not only the fourth president of Oakwood College but also inspiration to Christian education for hundreds of Negro youth. 'If you can't make it through school," he advised scores of men and women now in the work, "just ask me because my Father

is rich." His stately walking and fervent preaching moved men to walk with God. Elder Peterson was called again in 1962

to the General Conference-the first Negro to be named a vice president. The magnificence of his presence gave purpose and strength to his counsel without regard to color. The world was his parish, and though he was not a common man, he had a common touch. A master at give and take, he respected an individual as long as he did not cut across principle.


Honored by Men

A man who loved both the Lord and men, he was honored by those men-and women-at final rites. They were therethose whose souls had been watered on one hand by his preaching and "set on fire" on the other: F L. Bland, vice president of the General Conference; C. E. Moseley, field secretary of the General Conference; Dr. Frank Hale, president of Oakwood College; Melvin Lukens, secretary of the Southeastern California Conference; R. J. Christian, circulation manager of Southern Publishing Association; C. L. Bradford, Lake Region Conference; Dennis T. Black, Berean Church pastor; and G. Nathaniel Banks, Pacific Union Regional Department secretary.

Also participating in the tribute were Mrs. Meryl Hinkle; Dr. Matthew Kates; Dr. Rudolph Rodriguez; Elders Emman-uel Wilkins, Major White, and Samuel Meyers.

Ever concerned with Christian education ("the poorest church school is better than public school"), he was a man who "turned stumbling blocks into stepping stones." He had a gift for quickly calming troubled waters, a unique and meaningful sense of humor-characteristics of a great teacher.

Retiring at the 1966 General Conference Session "because of a chronological disease," Elder Peterson continued his counsel and his preaching around Los Angeles, ever earnest in his desire to lead men (Continued on page 2)

"Fought a Good Fight"

Before breathing his last at the White Memorial Medical Center, he expressed the words of Paul in II Timothy 4:6-8: "For I am now ready to be offered, and the time of my departure is at hand. I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the faith: Henceforth there is laid up for me a crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous judge, shall give at that day: and not to me only, but unto all them also that love his appearing.'

Surviving him are his wife, Bessie, of Los Angeles; his son, Dr. Frank Peterson, Jr., of Los Angeles; Mrs. Hollis (Marjorie) Knight of Los Angeles; Mrs. C. B. Clara) Rock of Atlanta; Mrs. L. R. (Katherine) Palmer of Washington, D.C., and 10 grandchildren.

Counsel Is-Do Not Accept **Marine Corps Assignment**

We understand that draftees with a I-A-O We understand that draftees with a I-A-O classification who are selected for assign-ment to the U.S. Marine Corps may be given a choice at the Armed Forces En-trance and Examining Station (AFEES) as to whether or not they will accept such as-signment. If this choice is offered to Sev-enth-day Adventists, we counsel strongly that they not accept the assignment to the Marine Corps but go into the U.S. Army. Each man must make his own decision Each man must make his own decision in this matter. However, this counsel is based on Sabbath observance problems and other factors experienced by Adventist in-ductees during the past six months.

As soon as definite word on this matter comes into our hands, we shall publish more details.

A Review of the Facts Concerning Thunderbird Academy

In order to expand its educational facilities, the old Arizona Academy was transferred from downtown Phoenix to Thunderbird Field, north of Scottsdale. At a constituency meeting held January 1953, it was voted to purchase the 720-acre federal government surplus property. The appraised value was \$238,740. A 20 percent payment was made and the balance was to be carried for a period of 20 years. The old, inadequate buildings were occupied and the wood products factory was begun.

Due to a change in federal laws, we were required to pay the balance of \$115,-000 in 1960. This was done with funds borrowed from the Pacific Union Conference. The old academy site brought \$46,-964 which was used in purchasing the new school at Thunderbird.

It was obvious that the old buildings could not last long and it was planned to either rebuild there or elsewhere. When it appeared that the land could be sold for considerable money, it was voted to sell the Thunderbird property, except for the 80 acres which the present school occupies, and build a boarding school at Tonto Flats Ranch near Prescott.

Tonto Flats Sold

In January 1968 it was voted, at a special constituency meeting, to sell Tonto Flats Ranch. This was done, due to several factors. One is that a conference normally should have about 6,500 members in order to support a boarding academy from the standpoint of students and financial strength. It was projected to have a boarding school near Prescott and a day school in the Phoenix area. This would require a conference with about nine to ten thousand members. Our membership presently is just under 4,000. It had been hoped that the funds derived from Thunderbird would not only build such schools, but also endow them with perpetual subsidies. It appeared that this was possible.

At the April 1969 constituency meeting it was determined that we could not expect a multi-million dollar income from this development in the near future, and that the academy be rebuilt on its present location. Consequently, we are confronted with the challenge of redeveloping our school on its present site.

There is one factor that creates a sense of urgency regarding the speed with which this needs to be accomplished. Both the national non-Seventh-day Adventist accrediting association and our own church accrediting body from the General Conference indicate that we will lose our

accreditation unless we begin rebuilding very soon. Dormitories are of prime need.

We come up for reaccreditation in the spring of 1971. By that time we must have a plan, and we must be implementing it, or else we shall lose our accreditation.

We cannot afford to have a school that is not recognized as adequate. Students going on to higher education must graduate from an accredited school. It is our school, and we will see to it that it is outstanding and fully accredited in order to serve the needs of our youth.

Two Young Ladies Win Spanish American Church Bible Quiz These young ladies, Rebecca Suarez and


Elizabeth Roybal, are siniling happily after being declared winners of a hard con-tested Bible Quiz held at the Spanish American Church.


Although she is 70 years old, Madame continues to work full time designing clothes, does all her own housework, and is outstanding as a Dorcas leader.

Mr. Bruce took ministerial training at Walla Walla College and has served in the publishing work since 1943. He has




Elder and Mrs. George O. Bruce.



Dr. Lloyd M. Perry Presented Lectures for the Ministers





According to Elmer Digneo, instructional materials coordinator, the greatest value of such a system is that it provides intermit-tent musical background so silence does not become unreal. It also permits ordinary amount of activity without the activity becoming noticeable.

The instructional materials center also purchased a 24-inch hand-mounted physical-political globe with half of the amount coming from a donation. The globe ball rotates freely in the cradle mounting which is on an attractive modern floor stand with casters. A time and distance measuring stripe is mounted on the horizon ring. The globe, which cost approximately \$200, is especially useful in history and geography.


Adventist Booth at Madera **Fair Attracts Much Attention**

The New Communication Arts Building Nears Completion

Initial construction of the new communication arts building wing is nearing completion on the La Sierra campus, according to John R. Clough, director of the physical plant.

The addition, under construction since July, has extended the facilities of the old speech building, which also houses the university's radio station, KLLU. More than 5,000 square feet of space has provided 12 new offices and two new classrooms.

Mr. Clough reports that the first phase of the building project is complete except for outside stuccoing; landscaping, already in progress; and some clean-up work inside. He says further construction, including inside finishing, will probably be resumed after Christmas when additional funds will be available.

Mary Byers Guest Speaker at Home Economics Convention

Mary P. Byers, associate professor and chairman of the College of Arts and Sciences department of consumer related sciences, was one of several guest speakers

at the recent Nevada Home Economics Association Convention held at the Pioneer Hotel in Las Vegas.

A recipient of a 1968 American Home Economics Association Foundation fellowship, Mrs. Byers entitled her speech "Consumer Problems of Low Income Families." She stated that 20 to 25 percent of the total United States population, or 40 to 50 million persons, represents the "over-all picture of poverty today."

In order to observe some of the problems and improve the existing situations, Mrs. Byers encourages her students to become interested and involved in community service programs. Suggested plans for student participation are conducting small classes in meal planning; preparing simple leaflets on nutrition to be made available to ethnic youth groups; preparing recipes for housewives who are barely able to read; assisting homemakers with the planning of balanced meals around popular ethnic foods; teaching homemakers how to shop for best prices in food, clothing, and equipment; and assisting in special diet meal planning.

Each senior consumer related sciences major is required to spend one semester working with the Riverside County Welfare Department or the visiting nurses association.

"From these experiences students not only discover how to use information learned in classes, but also how to relate to various ethnic groups and communicate with them," states Mrs. Byers.
