Among the doctrinal services are: Review and Herald, Sabbath school lessons, and ten Bible correspondence courses.

A lending library is maintained with thousands of volumes in Braille and recorded on tape and on records. All of the services are provided entirely free to those qualifying. The Foundation operates completely on contributions, bequests, and trust agreements.

A biennial offering is taken in all Seventh-day Adventist churches to defray the expenses of these sectarian services. The offering will be taken on May 16. Show the blind you care by making a generous donation.

A New Adventure in Understanding

The art of clear and effective communication is, humanly speaking, the greatest need of the church today. From the very beginning of the Christian movement Christ's followers were commissioned to communicate: "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel." (Mark 16:15)

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How are we facing this challenge today? It must be con-fessed that on the whole Christians are doing a very poor job of communication. They seem to be finding the communications barriers almost insurmountable. The preaching of the gospel is being complicated by our technology, by the population explosion, the metropolitan explosion, and many other barriers.

Much of the time Christians appear to be out of touch with issues which have captured the thinking of the world around them. Some fail to communicate effectively because they do not understand the language of the people, and when they speak, they speak in terms that are not understood. Often the Christian message is presented in an intricate theological frame of reference

that is understandable to only a few. There are also less thoughtful people who seem to be operating on a maximum of words and a minimum of communication, often substituting loquaciousness for performance.

Effective Communication

Though one hundred percent communication effectiveness is impossible, and a gap always exists between the sender and the receiver, it is the person who recognizes this gap in his every communication attempt who is already on his way to becoming a successful communicator. Because of these and many other problems in our complicated world of communications, it is important that we search for relevant forms of service and witness.

The future development and growth of the church is dependent upon our building public confidence in what we are doing and public understanding of what we are

trying to do. This is the purpose of the seininar in public relations offered by Andrews University Theological Seminary under the sponsorship of the General Conference Bureau of Public Relations. In 1970 the two-week course will begin July 1, a few days after the close of the General Conference Session. Thus the opportunity of keeping abreast of advances in the field of church communications will also be available to delegates before returning to their home divisions.

Seminar Instruction

Instruction by a high-level group of eight professional public relations practitioners and leaders will cover a variety of subjects, including such fields as bridging the gap in modern communication; using the mass media of communication-writing, radio and television, advertising; the exploration and measurement of public opinion; evangelistic advertising and layout.

The university will grant four credits to eligible students for the two weeks of study, but will also admit others on an audit basis. Six Prize Winners Named in Division Photo Contest

Sydney E. Allen, Jr., dean of theology at Philippine Union College, submitted numerous photos in several categories, with his close-up shot of a blind beggar earnning the grand award. Prof. Allen's camera brought him \$150 in prizes.

Second place in the grand award class went to Minnesota Conference treasurer

H. W. Pritchard. His appealing photo of a child struggling with crayolas at her desk had been entered in the "education" category. His award was a check for \$100.

Southeastern California Conference public relations director, C. Elwyn Platner, took

third place with his picture of two young people singing to a wheelchair retiree. It also took first prize in the "youth activities" category, bringing

him a total of \$75. Three other public relations directors won awards of \$25 each: S. A. Yakush of Southern California Conference, Charles R. Beeler of the Ohio Conference, and Eston L. Allen of the Illinois Conference. Each man received a check for \$25.

Elder Yakush's prize-winning photo showed a young teenager admiring a riding horse at youth camp. Elder Beeler's photo showed Évangelist Joe Crews counseling with a little girl. Eston Allen's entry showed young campers swinging out across a lake on a rope.

The quality these pictures had in common was a personal appeal to the viewer. Each was packed with human interest. In addition the prints had achieved a quality of excellence that marked them above the ordinary.





Japanese Congregation Dedicates Its New Sanctuary

Honolulu's Japanese Seventh-day Adventist congregation, homeless since its organization in 1940 with 32 members pastored by Elder Shohei Miyake, dedicated its beautiful new sanctuary in Manoa Valley to the service of the Lord during an afternoon program, Sabbath, February 7. Its present 220 membership was joined by enough visitors from the business community and sister churches to force overflow seating in the regular 400-seat sanctuary.

During the afternoon program in which Elder A. G. Streifling, president of the Hawaiian Mission, presented the solemn dedicatory message, members of the press and television gleaned ideas and film footage that placed Adventist progress in Honolulu before the public.

Assisting Elder Streifling, who is an active member of the Japanese Church, were Brother Mun On Chang, mission treasurer, and Elders Archa O. Dart and Fernon Retzer of the General Conference.

Former pastors who worked with vigor for this crowning moment were guests of the congregation, and heard their history repeated during the program by Dr. Tadao Hata. Elder Miyake, now retired in Los Angeles, came from Japan in 1934 at the urging of the late Dr. James Kuninobu to lead the Japanese-speaking company at the Honolulu Central Church. During 1940 the church was organized and used the present Hawaiian Mission Elementary School buildings until 1967.

In 1946 Elder Hideo Oshita, presently pastor of the Los Angeles Central Japanese Church, continued the building and saving plan until 1952 when Elder Robert Nomi guided the work of the church until he accepted a similar position among the Japanese people of Mountain View, California, in 1965.

Pastor Harold Kono arrived at the time a former Baptist College site became available near the University of Hawaii. Through his efforts and the dedicated service of each one in the congregation, the rooms were renovated, and by mid-1967, the church met on its own property.

Ground was broken for the new sanctuary in July 1968, and the A-frame consruction valued at \$225,000 was erected by the church members themselves in one and one-half years, at a saving of approximately \$100,000. Because of the dedicated work of former pastors and the thrift of the congregation, Elder Kono beams the good news that everything has been purchased on a cash basis, so there are no payments outstanding. The house of the Lord in Manoa Valley is as comfortable as the members expect their homes to be. A non-member friend of the church donated a quality grand piano. Three widows gave their "mite," and an Allen organ was secured for the sanctuary. Cushioned pews and carpeted floors soften the sounds. Hot humid weather will present no discomfort, because the high-ceilinged chapel is also airconditioned.

These refinements are possible through the efforts of George Halsted, a Baptist building engineer who supervised the work crews led by Pastor Kono and Brother John Tamanaha. Mr. Halsted, who has built 41 churches, saved materials costs and secured the maximum buying power for church savings, and the multitudes, of donations made by visitors and friends of the church from the community and the business world.

Also active in the service of dedication were Teruo Funai, who read telegrams from well-wishers; the junior choir led by academy junior Marianne Kono; and the youth choir led by Marvin Mitchell. Dan Dirksen set the musical background at the new organ console.

Dr. James Akita, Elder Victor Inoue, and Brother James Suycoka translated the verbal messages into Japanese for the Japanese-speaking members of the congregation.

The Five-Day Plan to Stop Smoking received some good publicity recently when the Community Services Department of the West Valley College in Saratoga (near San Jose) requested that we conduct our program on their campus for the benefit of the community. The Five-Day Plan was offered to area

The Five-Day Plan was offered to area residents as a free class through the college's newsletter and local newspaper articles. The college handled all publicity, made all arrangements for the program, accepted registrations, and paid to us the equivalent of the regular registration fee for each person who enrolled in the program.

Elder Daniel R. Fausset, Milpitas Church pastor, and Dr. Edward A. John, conference medical secretary, conducted the sessions for a group of 87 "students." Membership in Arizona Goes Over Four Thousand Mark

Arizona rejoices that God's blessings have been showered upon its constituency as it showed the highest percentage net growth of any conference in the Pacific Union. The membership increased from 3,824 to 4,042 during 1969. This made it possible to reach and surpass an important milestone, the 4,000 level. The combined efforts of the laity and ministry have made it possible to achieve this. The net growth shows a 5.7 percent increase, double the 2.8 percent on a union level, and 42 percent higher than the next closest conference, Hawaii.

Soul-winning efforts last year showed an increase over the previous year, 263 up from 247. The baptismal rate is 6.9 percent, second only to Hawaii's 7.4 percent. The average for the union is 5.5 percent. In a year when a number of major pastoral changes were made, we believe we are fortunate to show such a gain. We are conscious that the members rallied and continued their witnessing to make this possible. There is always a loss when pastoral changes are made. It is similar to transplanting. It takes time to start growing again.

Our tithe gain was eight percent over the previous year for a total of \$866,-599.26. While our tithe per capita of \$233.33 is the lowest in the union, probably due to the many people we have who are retired, our total dollar per capita increase is the second highest in the union, up \$14.21. The average increase for the union is \$9.86. The misisons giving shows the highest gain in the union per capita.

For these blessings that have been given to us, we thank God. The dedication of our people, both the rich and poor, young and old, in serving God by witnessing, and liberal Christian stewardship, promises to make 1970 a better year yet. The membership has set as an objective to baptize 500, representing 121/2 percent of the



College Days Are Announced for March 30 and April 1

The 1970 College Days for Pacific Union College have been announced by President Floyd O. Rittenhouse upon which seniors from academies in Central and Northern California will visit the Angwin campus for an all-day program of events.

On Monday, March 30, students will come from the Armona, Bakersfield, Fresno, Monterey Bay, PUC Prep, and Sacramento academies. Then on Wednes-day, April 1, visitors will come from the Golden Gate, Lodi, Modesto, Mountain View, and Rio Lindo academies.

The November 10 date, originally published in the college's calendar of events, had to be canceled because of a union conference-wide gathering of educational leaders subsequently called at Glendale.

Adventist high school seniors who would like to participate in one or the other of the two College Days are invited to write to Steve Fox, vice president of the PUC Student Association, who is assisting with this project. Letters should reach his office not later than March 25.

In view of the revised dates for College Day, the Industrial/Applied Arts Festival, scheduled in the calendar for April 12 and 13, will not be held; and the Industrial Education, Agriculture, and Home Economics departments will instead schedule special activities in conjunction with the regular College Day program, according to Dr. Richard Fisher, coordinator of the project.

Education Professor Authors Teacher Education and AID

A 186-page book by Dr. Louis W. Normington, chairman of the Education Department at Pacific Union College, has been released by The American Association of Colleges for Teacher Education.

Entitled Teacher Education and AID, Dr. Normington's study focuses on the preparation of elementary and secondary teachers and teacher educators in 40 countries assisted by the Agency for International Development (AID).

After emphasizing the critical need for teacher education in the developing countries around the world, the PUC professor's book reports the efforts which the United States, working through AID, has made to help meet these needs.

Of special significance is the study's third chapter in which Dr. Normington analyzes trends in teacher education, isolates the factors which appear to underlie success or failure, and makes recommendations as to both over-all strategy and the planning and carrying out of individual projects.

In the book's concluding chapter is a comprehensive country-by-country study of AID's involvement in the field of technical assistance to teacher education.

Prof. Normington wrote the book during a one-year leave of absence (1968-69) from the PUC campus during which he visited 10 Asian countries and devoted three months to research in the files of the U.S. State Department in Washington, D.C.

A New Two-story Building **Houses Important Services**

A two-story building containing a new campus mail room and duplicating office, the Audiovisual Department, and a 35-seat classroom is now in use on the Pacific Union College campus.

Located adjacent to the Nelson Memorial Library, the \$35,000 addition's lower floor houses the Audiovisual Department. The upper level is shared by the mail roomduplicating offices and the classroom.

According to Keith M. Wallace, director of audiovisual services, the new facility includes a preview room, a classroom for audiovisual education, office space, and a repair studio.

The tremendous volume of work handled by that department made necessary the larger quarters. Space vacated by audiovisual on the basement floor of the library is presently being renovated to provide much-needed additional stack space.

Each of the two stories has 1,336 square feet of floor space.

Mrs. Florence Horinouchi and Ann Marin, coordinators of the mail room and duplicating offices, control the important tasks of distributing campus mail via courier to all departments, offices, and dormitories.

On a 90-day trial basis the office is experimenting with an A. B. Dick offset press with a 100-bin collator. The staff expresses hope that the new equipment will save considerable time, and therefore money, in the tasks of printing such items as examinations.

Spring Quarter Registration Will Be Held on March 23

Registration procedures for the spring quarter at Pacific Union College have been announced by Dr. James N. Scott, director of admissions and records.

Registration will be held in Pacific Auditorium on Monday, March 23, from 9 to 12 a.m. and 1 to 6 p.m. Graduates, postgraduates, seniors, and special students may begin at 9 a.m., and juniors at 10:30.

All other students are to register during the afternoon session.

Dr. Scott advises that no prospective student come to registration without having received an official letter of acceptance beforehand.

For the youngsters, here's a book to whet appetites for fun on the farm. Once Upon a Summer, by Lois M. Parker, is a sparkling narrative highlighted by dozens of animal friends. Joan, a lively eight-yearold, learns how to take care of pets and farm animals, and has fun helping her parents in the garden. Black- and whiteline drawings by Jim Padgett add special interest. This hardcover book from Southern Publishing Association sells for \$3.95.

Adults with a wanderlust will enjoy two new paperbacks that have just been released. Affair of the Heart, by Herbert Ford, is the newest addition to the Crown series (Southern Publishing Association). Elder Ford accompanied the Loma Linda University heart surgery team on a recent visit to Greece, and his on-the-spot report of their life-saving work there will inspire every reader.

A near-tragic plane accident enabled Leonard Barnard to write his story, Banish the Night. This is a Destiny book from Pacific Press, and tells many of the author's fascinating experiences during the years that he was a mission pilot in New Guinea. Both of these paperbacks are illustrated with photographs and sell for just \$1.85.

If your teenagers are still making noises about generation gaps and such, they might enjoy Though the Heavens Fall, by Irene Wakeham. This collection of short stories and allegories is the first to break away from the old "sin-suffer-repent" formula that has been boring young people for the last 20 years. They may be surprised to learn that missionary wives can't always overcome their discouragements, and that some members of the older generation. have been known to steer young folk in the wrong direction.
