The president of Harris Pine Mills, Charles J. Nagele, tells us that the four furniture plants operated by that company in our Pacific Union territory employed 388 academy-age students in 1970, and the amount of student labor involved was \$201,200. These furniture plants have made it possible for a large number of our young people to earn a major percentage of their academy expenses. We appreciate the fact that they have provided this type of employment in our territory.

Harris Pine Mills, a taxable corporation with headquarters in Pendleton, Oregon, is fully owned by the General Conference. They operate industries in many sections of the United States and have located plants near our schools in order to be able to provide student employment. The organization not only contributes to education by providing employment, but also from its earnings adds to the General Conference funds to help support the world-wide interests of the church.

Title for April amounted to \$2,099,941 and Sabbath School offerings totaled \$187,214.36. A special offering of \$23,308 was received during April in all of our churches for Loma Linda University to provide education to promising youth who need financial assistance. Once again I wish to thank you for your loyal support of the church.

The church offering on June 5 will be used to support our Inner City activities. Funds given on this day will be retained in the local conferences, and a strong work for those residing in their Inner Cities will be fostered. Inner City programs provide medical assistance, educational opportunities, food and clothing, etc. These projects right in our own midst deserve the support of all who are in a position to share with those who need our help to such a large degree.

Harry W. Miller, M.D., well known to church members throughout our Pacific Union Conference, recently wrote about the work in Hong Kong where a new hospital has just been opened. Dr. Miller worked diligently to raise most of the funds for the construction and furnishing of this new institution.

Many of you read in the Review and Herald a front-page article about "Radio-Trans-Europa." This opportunity has tremendous possibilities—22 broadcasts in 10 different languages each week beamed into eastern Europe and western Asia. It is our hope that many of our Pacific Union members will want to assist in meeting the costs of this evangelistic undertaking.

A New Outdoor Challenge Is Seen in "Mission Possible"

A new outdoor program to test one's endurance capacity in numerous ways, and also to acquaint him with survival techniques, is being launched in the Northwest in June.

The name of the program is "Mission Possible," 26 days of high adventure in meeting and surmounting challenging situations. It is patterned after the famous "Outward Bound" program, but in the Seventh-day Adventist context. Some of the instruction will be by individuals who have qualified for the same work in "Outward Bound."

Mission Possible will be offered through Walla Walla College at a cost of \$395 to men 16 years and over. The dates this year are June 13 to July 8.

G. D. Brass, youth activities director for the North Pacific Union Conference, is assisting in the launching of Mission Possible. Says he: "MiPo is discovering one's true abilities and capacities. It is a builder of self-confidence, a learning of teamwork, as in a river crossing. It is doing difficult things under stress. It is learning what it is like to be alone—really alone—with God."

Most of the experiences will be with the natural elements in a wilderness setting where the wilderness becomes both the teacher and the classroom. The ultimate objective is a harmonious development—physical, mental and spiritual.

Specifics in the course include first aid, woodcraft, rock climbing, rappelling, river crossings, search and rescue techniques, basic snow techniques on glaciers, mountain climbing, an expedition, and what has been termed "an unforgettable three-day solo experience."
