God has very carefully and wisely planned an uncomplicated system of tithe



Alma McKibbin Celebrates 100th Birthday Soon

On Friday, November 26, Mrs. Alma E. McKibbin, pioneer Adventist educator and textbook author, will celebrate her 100th birthday. All of Mrs. McKibbin's teaching career has been in California since the day in 1889 when she arrived at Healdsburg College from Colorado. She was graduated from that school 81 years ago when Healdsburg was the only Adventist college in existence with the exception of Battle Creek.

Not long after graduation, Mrs. Mc-Kibbin started the first church school in southern California in the San Pasqual Valley. Later she was the first teacher in the Santa Ana church school.

In 1898 she returned to Healdsburg, first teaching in the church school there, later in the College. When Healdsburg College was closed down, and later moved to Howell Mountain near St. Helena, being renamed Pacific Union College, Mrs. McKibbin joined the faculty there.

Retiring from PUC in 1921, she moved to Mountain View, and soon thereafter began teaching in the academy, continuing until her final retirement. She has been a member of the Mountain View Church for 50 years.

In the early 1900's she began the writ-



ing of Bible textbooks for our church schools and academies. An entire series of these books was published by the Pacific Press. The texts soon were used throughout the United States, also in many coun-

VIETNAM SIGNS PRESS PRODUCES 10,000 BOOKS A MONTH

WASHINGTON, D.C.-The Seventh-day Adventist publishing house in Vietnam is producing some 10,000 books a month on just one offset press, reports W. A. Higgins, associate secretary of the church's publishing department here.

"The demand for these books in Viet-nam is so great," reports Richard McKee of the denomination's Southeast Asia Union, "that the publishing house is unable to meet the requests."

With about 90 nationals working in the country, the shelves of the Vietnam Signs Press in Saigon are often left bare. "They go all over the country, sometimes even across battle lines," says Higgins.

Although the press has been running

double shifts to keep up production, things are looking better with the help of a new binder so books can be bound by machine rather than by hand. And a new press is

on order. The Vietnam Signs Press publishes religious, health, and children's books in the Vietnamese languegs, with the most popular book being Steps to Christ, a 153page paperback written by Adventist au-thor Ellen White in 1892. Reportedly Steps to Christ is published in 100 different languages and continues to be a top seller coming off Adventist presses.

The Seventh-day Adventist Church

has 16 churches and over 2,000 members in Vietnam.



SO YOU WILL KNOW ...

On October 30 it was my joy to worship with the Yuba City members in their new church. Also visiting with them on that day were members from the Gridley Church. Yuba City's beautiful new structure fully represents the total work of the church. We appreciate not only what Yuba City members have done in their area to provide so adequately for the extension of the influence of the church, but also what is being done in numerous places throughout the Pacific Union Conference.

Word from Hawaii indicates that work on the new mission office building is progressing. Those of you who visit Honolulu will not have difficulty in finding the Hawaiian Mission office, for it is on a very prominent street that runs between Honolulu and the windward side of the island. Construction on Nrothern California's office is also moving along well, and it is hoped that the transfer from the old facility can be made sometime in February, 1972. Both of these offices are greatly needed.

On November 2 the Church-State Council met in the Union office in Glendale. This is the group that gives attention to matters that relate to our religious freedoms. Three of our professional men were present—Commissioner Rolland Truman made arrangements for those in his court to be assigned to other duties for the day; Attorney Robert Peterson left his busy law practice; and W. E. Brower, who is connected with Pacific Telephone, was able to be present. We were fortunate that W. Melvin Adams, an associate in the Religious Liberty Department of the General Conference, could be with us and bring us up-to-date on matters that are very vital to this phase of the work. In Congress at this time is an amendment to the constitution which would make it possible for prayers of a nondenominational nature to be offered in the public school system. The amendment is very brief, but it has far-reaching influences. One prominent member of Congress who voted against such provisions on two previous creasions now states that, in desperation, a favorable vote is going to be r

In the main auditorium of the Glendale Adventist Hospital a special community program was conducted under the name of "4 Dimensional Key to Alcoholism." Teaming up in presenting this material were L. New Pediatric Intensive Care Unit at White Memorial

White Memorial Medical Center, Los Angeles, recently opened its new pediatric intensive care unit which joins forces with the two other special care units, Intensive Care and Coronary Care, in providing specialized medical services for the acutely ill child.

The pediatric intensive care unit was specifically designed to provide exceptionally close supervision and monitoring by the physicians and specially trained nurses caring for the patient. The nurses assigned to this unit have had extensive preparation and are constantly participating in educa-tional programs, keeping informed on the newest methods, procedures and equip-ment employed in the care of the pediatric patient.

The Medical Center provides this specialized service for many surrounding hospitals which do not have the necessary technical equipment and training. The unit is equipped with monitoring devices that constantly record the vital signs of the heart, respiration and blood pressure on a twenty-four-hour basis.

The normal newborn baby and the premature infant can be cared for in specialized nurseries, but the acutely ill newborn





Junior Dietetics Major Awarded National Scholarships

James C. Rose, junior dietetics major at La Sierra, has been awarded two national scholarships worth up to \$4,000. Mr. Rose received the Campbell Soup Company Undergraduate Scholarship and the National Restaurant Foundation's H. J. Heinz Senior College Scholarship Award.

Two \$1,000 Campbell scholarships and five \$1,500 Heinz awards are given annually in the United States. "Loma Linda University is pleased with the quality of our students in the consumer related sciences programs," says Mary P. Byers, chairman of the department. "We are particularly proud of Mr. Rose's achievement."

Both awards are given for high scholastic achievement, outstanding dietetic skills and finacial need. The Campbell recipients must be juniors in college. Each scholarship may be renewed during the student's senior year, if he keeps a high

scholastic average.

The Heinz award is given over a threeyear period. Students must work in food service management each summer. For each summer of work the student receives another \$500.

"Loma Linda University has over 116 majors in consumer related sciences," says Mrs. Byers. Programs offered in the department include two-year programs in food service supervision for the training of chefs, bakers and supervisors, and a nutri-tion care service for the training of dietary technicians; four-year programs in die-tetics and food administration are also offered within the department.

The new facility includes six specially constructed speech therapy rooms including one for group therapy, and audiology testing center, waiting room and receptionist offices. The center is equipped with two-way mirrors for observation and wiring for audio and television monitoring. The facilities are serving patients in the Riverside, Corona and Norco areas as well as campus students, says Dr. Kenneth R. Lutz, associate professor of speech, and director of the facility.

"The new clinical facility is the first of three phases of development leading to an active graduate program. Enrollment in the undergraduate program in Communication Sciences has reached a record high this year. Consideration is now being given to the establishment of a program in education for the deaf because of the urgent need for teachers of the auditorily handicapped," says Dr. Jacques.

10 date, seven students have received the Master of Science degree from the University. "Graduates from our masters' program have shown a real interest in advances in the department and are entering fully into the planning phases of our expanding program," says Dr. Lutz. Course work in the School of Allied

Health Professions is required, thus providing a well-integrated, multi-disciplinary approach to the training program in communication sciences.
