Important Bible Study Milepost Reached at VOP

Bible study by correspondence has reached an important milepost at The Voice of Prophecy—a half million gradu-ates since the English Bible School was begun in 1942.

The young man who happened to be number 500,000 is Edwin E. Zirkwitz, 21, a Simon Fraser University student in Vancouver, British Columbia.

Bible School records show that Zirkwitz began the Faith Bible course May 27 and completed the 40-lesson course just three months later.

Upon discovery that Zirkwitz was the half-millionth graduate, W. W. Rogers, British Columbia radio-TV secretary, was

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

PUC Student Missionary Teaches at Monument Valley

The Nevada-Utah Conference is happy to have Scott Blum, a student missionary from Pacific Union College, as a teacher at the Monument Valley Mission. Scott is having an interesting year working with the Navajo and resident missionaries' children. We quote from his letter received at the conference office:

"I came to Monument Valley as a student missionary with high expectations of an adventure, and I haven't been disappointed. The beautiful countryside, the Jeep trails (which it seems most side roads turn out to be), the culture and craftsmanship of the Indians, the wonderful people I work with, and then of course, the students—what a mischievous yet lovable assortment—all this has the making of an unforgettable adventure.

"This doesn't mean that everything has been easy. For example, the language barrier is a real challenge. Most of the Navajo children speak more fluently in Navajo than they do in English. Their preference (or maybe necessity at home) to speak Navajo makes their English vocabulary very limited, which makes explaining things difficult at times.

"But where their not-all-so-modern society may make communicating somewhat difficult, in other ways it is an advantage to the Christian teacher. The children's minds have not yet been exposed to the influences of television or the city. So we strive to fill the young minds with stories from the Bible.

"One great need I would like to express is Christian education for Navajo children. We have 23 students here at the Mission. Only seven are white. Our Navajo boarding school in Holbrook, Arizona, is full. Around 30 students have been placed in Christian homes from New York to California. Impressive? Very much sol But not nearly adequate. Many, many more young people need to be preparing for eternity. They need Christian homes, a Christian education.

"May my stay here be the blessing God intends it to be."



Dr. George Wargo Performs His Own Composition Dec. 1

Few musicians possess the dual talent of conductor and concert artist. But for Dr. George M. Wargo, professor of music at Pacific Union College and conductor of the Vallejo Symphony Orchestra, that's not enough. For on December 1 at 8:15 p.m., he will also perform his own composition, "Concerto for Viola and Strings."

The concerto was given its world premiere in April, 1970, at the National Gallery of Art, with Dr. Wargo as soloist. The December 1 performance will be its west-coast premiere.

Dr. Wargo, who has been on the PUC faculty since 1959, began his musical education at age seven when he studied with Boris Koutzen at the Philadelphia Conservatory of Music on a scholarship. He made his debut with the Philadelphia Symphony Orchestra at 16.

His musical career includes successful recitals in Paris, Rome, and many other important music centers of the world. He has been featured soloist with the National Symphony Orchestra of Washington and National Gallery Orchestra. His experience includes 17 years of professional work under such eminent conductors as Leonard Bernstein, Bruno Walters, and John Barberolli.

Dr. Wargo has an equally outstanding career in the field of music education. He has served as chairman of the music departments at Columbia Union College and Pacific Union College, and as a faculty member of the Peabody Conservatory of Music, the University of Virginia, and the Philadelphia Conservatory of Music.

The Washington Evening Star called his "Concerto for Viola and Strings" "a substantial showcase. Written for an instrument which has little enough literature to play, the piece is destined to be heard again and again."

The Washington Post's critic said: "The piece gave Wargo a chance to show how splendid a violist he is," and praised his 'svelte tone and incisive phrasing."

More than 40 Pacific Union College administrators, faculty members, and student leaders participated in a day-long discussion session recently at Konocti Harbor Inn at Clear Lake.

Coordinator Bryan Henry, general vice-president of the Student Association, said the meeting was designed to improve communications among the different communities of the college by helping each group understand how the other thinks. "It cannot help but add to the harmony of life at PUC if we can understand the different roles of each involved organization on campus," he said.

Library of Records and Tapes Is Available to PUC Students

In the interest of making a wide selec-tion of recorded music available on loan to all Pacific Union College students for enjoyment and study, the music department and library have teamed up to offer a new music library system boasting 1,500 records and duplicate tapes. Selections range from classical to avant-garde, and from folk to general listening music.

According to Dr. Melvin Hill, music department chairman, the recordings represent an investment of about \$15,000.

Plans call for continued expansion of the collection to meet accreditation needs for the music department's graduate program. Since fall quarter began in September, \$500 worth of records has been ordered. A larger selection of classical guitar and folk music is presently being acquired.
