# Mission '73 Emphasizes Personal Involvement

Mission '72 is now history. It was the year in which we realized many of our worthy objectives in our evangelistic outreach. Thousands more were baptized in 1972 than in 1971, and we are grateful to God for His blessings upon our efforts.

But Mission '73 presents even broader challenges. We do, indeed, intend to field the largest number of evangelistic campaigns in the history of the North American Division during 1973. Every Seventh-day Adventist minister plans to either conduct or involve himself in a campaign within the calendar year. Some of these meetings will be in the spring, some in summer and some in fall. Perhaps a few brave souls will be running in the winter. We are committed to this challenge and we want you, our lay believers, to know it. But there is an even

broader dimension to our plans for 1973.

The divine blueprint revealed to us long ago that as a church we would never experience the fullest benefits of the Spirit's blessings while the great majority of our people were idle in terms of personal witnessing. I share with you the hunger for the fuller revelation of the power of God in the church. But this will not be until we are enlisted and employed in the divine business of personally spreading the message of the love of God to lost man. Our gifts are not enough. Our prayers are not enough. There must be personal contact with the unsaved by the saved. Every convert must become a convert-maker. We are here proclaiming "the priesthood of the believer."

There is no plan to homogenize everyone and have them witnessing in the same way. We are passing out a little yellow card on which there are at least 14 methods of witnessing listed, with others unlisted. The plan, therefore, is for every member to pick his own form of witnessing, decide how many hours a

week he will spend at it, then get busy doing this right away. If you need any training in the form of witnessing selected, contact your pastor and he will provide a competent teacher in that area to prepare you for the work. Local, Union, and General Conference personnel are available for this service. We believe that the most important thing we can do right now is encourage and prepare our laity to join us in the grand business of soul-saving. To this solemn purpose we have dedicated ourselves.

The idea is that we program personal witnessing into our life-style. This will call for a major decision on our part as individuals. The church has no intention of driving its members to the harvest field as a slave is driven to some dread task. Rather, constrained by the love of God and encouraged by the church, the disciples will go willingly to duty that has assumed the nature of privilege because of our high motivation. The sanctions are there. Namely, the life or death of the unsaved, and our own spiritual declension or progress.

When she discovered how bad the dope problem was, she knew she had to do something worth while, so she volunteered her services to a medical center, and offered to talk to lonesome people, who had resorted to drugs as a way of escape.

This young housewife has been able to help many troubled people by merely talking to them. "Lean on me," she tells them. "Soon you will be able to stand by yourself. But while you need support, let me help you."

Perhaps one of your neighbors is lonely and is trying to escape from reality by using the bottle, pills or needles. Maybe someone in your own family feels "left out." Why not make yourself knowledgeable on this current problem by reading "Listen" regularly—a journal for better living.

RECORDER articles are now indexed in the Loma Linda University Libraries' Index to Seventh-day Adventist Periodicals.

\$83,000 was reported. This is a new record, and the first time Arizona has reached \$80,000.

Thrilling stories were related at the Banquet. The students at Thunderbird Academy "have never shown such enthusiasm before," reports Ted Chadwick, lay activities leader for the Academy. The Academy raised a per capita of over \$30.

Arizona distributed 215,000 papers during the crusade. Twenty-five churches raised larger amounts than in 1971, and 21 churches were Vanguard churches.

## Hattie Blanton Begins 51st Reading of Her Bible



Believing a recent article in *Reader's Digest* that the Bible is a book almost nobody reads, at least one Adventist has read her Bible 50 times and has already started on the 51st reading.

Hattie Blanton, 88 years young, twinkle eyed and vivacious, reveals, "How do I find time? I take my Bible with me when I go shopping with my daughter, and the tedious time waiting for her in the car slips by all too quickly. In the long hours of the night, when I can't sleep, I search its pages. Who needs sleeping pills?"

Mrs. Blanton, who sticks by the King James Version, has read its messages from every angle, starting sometimes with Genesis, other times with the New Testament or the major prophets, or the book of Acts. Once she started with Revelation.

"After reading it the usual way so many times, you know what's coming, but reading it backward, as Pastor H. M. S. Richards once told me, reveals unexpected gems. It never grows old. With each reading I find something new."

With a natural aptitude for creative writing, Hattie has been published in "Review and Herald," "Signs of the Times," "The Worker," "The Little Friend," "Go" and other of our publications. She has authored hundreds of poems and hopes to assemble them in book form for publication in the near future.

At present she is working on a book, "The Bible in Verse for Children," also a book on the eternal plan of salvation, "because the Lord is soon, soon to come. People don't realize it, but the time is very short," she says with convincing fervor.

### Important to Monument Valley Is the Dental Program

A very important part of the work at Monument Valley is the dental program which began in 1967 as an extension of the Loma Linda University School of Dentistry, with Dr. Kenneth Wical in charge.

In this rather remote section of the Navajo nation, dental care came as a new idea to many. However, it did not take long for word to spread concerning the importance of dental care, and in 1971, over 7,000 patient visits were made, approximately two-thirds of these visitors were Navajos. The attendance for 1972 exceeds this figure.

The dental clinic now offers a wide spectrum of modern dental care including fillings, crown and root cleaning, root-canal therapy, crown bridge, prosthetics, treatment of gums and preventive and community dental education such as visits to schools, dental health education, and dispensing proper dietary information.

The present facility is attached to the hospital building and shares a reception area with the medical clinic. Mrs. Billie Hunting's cheerfulness at the reception desk helps make visits to the clinic a pleasant experience.

There are nine dental suites, a laboratory for dental students in which they can make dental prostheses, and a laboratory for the resident dental laboratory technician, Larry Pierce.

This modern dental clinic is now being remodeled and a unit is being made where oral hygiene will be taught by visual aids.

Chris Gerkin has been working on films for dental teaching. These films are being sponsored by the Loma Linda University School of Health with the cooperation of the School of Dentistry and some outside funding. The completed film is unique. It is made so that it can be used in medical and dental waiting rooms, and for school dental-health education, and is completely self-contained requiring only the electricity to operate it.

The sponsorship of Loma Linda University is of tremendous importance to the dental clinic. Dentists Gene Wilson, Clinic director, and Dennis Steele, assistant Clinic director, are both members of the School of Dentistry faculty and plan to stay at Monument Valley for at least three years. Senior dental students who desire a taste of dentistry in a mission setting are carefully screened and selected to serve at the clinic for six-week periods. New groups of students come every six weeks, with three to six students serving at the clinic at any one time.

An important aspect of dental service is the operation of two out-clinics, one held two times a week at Montezuma Creek and another twice a month or more at Navajo Mountain. Both of these out-stations require many hours of travel by automobile to reach, but are only minutes away by air.

Our Monument Valley Dental Clinic is another light shining in the vast and beautiful desert land.

## SURVEY REVEALS ATTITUDES

Do Seventh-day Adventists have different attitudes towards child rearing than other parents? This question was recently raised as results of a research study completed by Dr. Kay Kuzma of the consumer-related sciences department of Loma Linda University.

In the study, Dr. Kuzma used two groups of people, one group Seventh-day Adventists, the other non-Seventh-day Adventists. A questionnaire which contained key questions centered around 23 possible attitudes of parents was given each group. "From the results of the research study we found that Seventh-day Adventists are very different in their attitudes of child rearing," says Dr. Kuzma.

From the 23 areas of attitudes there were nine areas where Seventh-day Adventists differed greatly. Some of these attitudes include: the seclusion of mothers, excluding outside influences, martyrdom of parents, inconsiderations of the husband, suppression of aggression and comradeship and sharing. In most cases, there was a definite attitude difference between the two groups. Whereas the Seventh-day Adventist group felt that such things as the seclusion of the mother in the home is essential to help a child develop more fully, non-Seventh-day Adventists felt that a mother can have a busy social life and still devote enough time to her children. Another category under "suppression of aggression" showed that Seventh-day Adventists felt that a child should not be allowed fight, whereas non-Seventh-day Adventists felt that fighting is just the normal course a child takes in maturing.

In almost all cases the Seventh-day Adventist group answered according to the counsel given parents in the writings of E. G. White. "Of course," says Dr. Kuzma, "the results of this survey cannot be conclusive proof that all Seventh-day Adventists and all non-Seventh-day Adventists feel this way, but it is certainly a good indication that there is a certain trend toward this idea."
