EVANGELICAL WORK IN THE CENTRAL ARGENTINE CONFERENCE

At the present time, five public efforts are under way in as many different cities in the territory of our Conference.

Concordia: Brother Armando Bonjour announces that he has seven people already prepared for baptism. One couple accepted the truth in the town of Ubajay, a town about thirty miles south of Concordia, through the efforts of Brother Pedro Cavil, one of our faithful colporteurs, who recently worked the town with the Spanish "Toward the Golden Age" and "El Atalaya." We hope that this small nucleus will develop into a group of believers in that place, as these two new believers have already intersted several other families in our message.

Santa Fe: Our brethren in Santa Fe are of very good courage. Brother Juan Riffel, our worker in the city, hopes that at least 25 new converts will be baptized during this year, through the united efforts of the church. Eight persons are already keeping the Sabbath, and preparing for baptism. The meetings for the public always have a very good attendance.

Central Rosario: Brother Aeschlimann is more than busy. It is his duty to develop the interest shown by at least 90 people. Mrs. Ida H. Gil, the bible worker, is helping him in this heavy duty. Fifteen of the interested persons are already keeping the Sabbath, and all prospects seem to indicate that a rich harvest of souls will be gathered before the end of the year. Brother Santiago Schneider, one of the church members, might well be called the right arm of the church; he takes it upon himself to see that nothing is missing in the churches, and is dedicating a large portion of his time to the work.

Rosario (Suburbs): At the end of April we organized a nice little group of twenty-five people, in the southern portion of the city of Rosario. We rented a nice hall at 2432 San Martin St., and invested about \$1,500.00 in equipment and rent. We call this group the San Martin church. The seating capacity of the hall is 142.

Immediately upon renting the hall, Brother Enrique Weiss, our evangelist in charge of that group, started a series lectures. His courage is running high, and everything seems to indicate that the Lord will bless him with a rich harvest of souls yet this year. About fifty persons have already shown their interest. Last Sabbath was kept for the first time by five of this number.

Cordoba: God is doing wonders in this fanatical city. Cordoba is often called the "Rome of Argentine." We have rented and furnished a comfortable hall, with a seating capacity of 172. When these seats are regularly filled, we can still accommodate about sixty more in a kind of balcony which forms a part of the hall.

Our hall here was inagurated the 12th of May. Brother Carlos E. Krieghoff, the Conference Secretary and Treasurer, was present, as also Brother Ramón Isasi, from Paraná. The last named Brother gave the inaugural sermon.

Our Sunday meetings, and also the mid-week studies, have been very well attended. Brethren Gambetta and

Perez have their hands more than full. Several of the papers of the city have been giving free publicity to these meetings, both in the way of announcements as in publishing summaries of the lectures. By what we can see, we would judge that from forty to fifty persons will be baptized there this year. About a dozen are already keeping the Sabbath, and awaiting the opportunity to become church members. Since our workers arrived in the city just a few months ago, the Sabbath-school offerings have more than trebled, and twice as much tithe is being paid in each month.

Brother Andrés H. Riffel, our courageous and enthusiastic Missionary Volunteer secretary, with the aid of our church school teachers, is trying to win many of our children to a personal christian experience, before the end of the year. Brother Riffel has started an effort to try to get each one of our church members' children to be a real christian, consecrating themselves wholly to the work of being a blessing to others.

Pray for the work in this Conference. Pray for our loyal workers, for our courageous colporteurs and for our sacrificing church school teachers. Pray that many souls may accept the Truth. Pray that all our brethren may be faithful, and live consistent christian lives.

BUENOS AIRES CONFERENCE INSTITUTE



The colporteurs' institute of the Buenos Aires Conference was indeed an occasion of special importance for the twenty-six colporteurs, church members and Conference workers. Each one of the colporteurs in no uncertain tone told of his experience in the field during the past year as well as of his determination to follow the Master.

Brother Lautaret, one of those who received a little *recuerdo* given by the Conference president for his faithful service and cooperation in every way, stated that on one occasion while canvassing from door to door, he was ferociously bitten by a vicious dog, and that on another occasion while traveling in the open pampa

where houses are few and far apart, he was overtaken by a terrific hail storm. He showed the scars of the dog bite as well as the scars of the hail stones which bruised and cut his hands and face. His eyes filled with tears as he told of the many interested people he had found in all his travels. These people are waiting for the message for this time. They treated him kindly and they showed a deep interest in the things of God.

Colporteur Prentel said that he had spent three years in the World War fighting and suffering, but that now he was glad that the truth had found him and that he counted it a privilege to suffer and to fight for his Master in this universal war against Satan

and his hosts in the earth. He also stated that many people were accepting the message which our literature contains.

Colporteur Osuna said when his turn came that he visited a home and found that the family was too busy with visitors to listen to him. He kindly asked the man to accept a little tract "for his soul's salvation." That very evening a girl canvassed the hotels asking for "The man that sells books." She finally found the hotel where Brother Osuna was staying. In her polite Spanish way she asked him to please do her the favor of pardoning her father for not having given attention to him while he was at her home. Then she askd if he did not sell the Atalaya. On learning that he did she said that she had come to buy all the numbers that he had with him. Her father had been greatly stirred with the message in the tract. Brother Osuna returned to the home again, took a subscription to El Atalaya and sold several books to the interested man.

When Brother Osuna left that place for the institute, the entire family came to town to bid him good-by as he left the station. The Lord has again used this minister of the printed page to win this family for Christ.

Colporteur leader Gmelin and the writer gave the technical and practical phase of the instruction during the institute, while Elders W. E. Murray,

J. T. Thompson, F. Sittner and Brethren Tucker, Fayard and Soto administered to the spiritual, financial and moral necessities of the colporteurs. Elder Murray's series of special studies on character building was of special importance. God came very near us during the week we spent together. From this one and that one it was heard that "This was the best institute we ever had in Buenos Aires." It is a coined phrase as in every case, and we are glad that each institute is the best.

Our Sabbath morning service was given over to the special colporteur program. The colporteurs reconsecrated themselves to God for another year of service in the Master's vineyard. Special prayer was offered and mention was made of the appreiation felt by the Conference officers for the faithful work that has been done in preaching the Gospel by this noble group of workers. To close the institute the Lord's Supper was celebrated as the binding tie of Jesus' love among these ministers of the printed page. All the colporteurs have returned to their respective territories with a new vision of duty and a new determination to gain the final victory. May God bless the Buenos Aires colporteur army.

Just recently one of our faithful colporteurs in the Buenos Aires Conference entered a store to canvass the owner. This merchant had been "informed" and was waiting for the colporteur to enter his premises. He had been told by his spiritual leader that the books that the man was selling from house to house were bad and that they were harming the people. The "informed" man got his revolver ready and also a bar of iron. The colporteur, of course, walked in not knowing that he was stepping into a war zone. The man sprang forth with his bar of iron in one hand and his revolver in the other and yelled to the colporteur to get out at once or die.

Just then the store-keeper's wife broke into the scene and protected the colporteur telling him to leave because her husband had heard that the books were harmful, and that he was nervous and furious and was determined to do him harm. She also told him to come again at about three o'clock in the afternoon.

The colporteur returned at three o'clock that afternoon with his partner. Before leaving their room both knelt in prayer to ask for God's protection and His power. He entered the store again and found the same man, but he was a changed man. He now asked that he be forgiven for his wicked attitude because, he said, "I was misinformed." The priest had told him that the book sellers were going around deceiving the people, but he had learned from a neighbor that it was not so. He listened attentively as the colporteur presented the message the book contained. He bought one of the books and manifested an interest in the truth. He is now a friend of the everlasting Gospel. Another colporteur told of a lady who had been a staunch Catholic believer, then a Pentecostal believer, and now she is a well-informed truth lover. She is using the daily papers in her town to give the message. She is informing her friends far and near of their christian privileges and duties

in regard to Present Truth.

Can anyone imagine what good is being done by the colporteur as he seeks to clarify the minds of misinformed people? Will the true minister of the printed page dare to faint in his noble work? Will the enemy frighten him?

ITINERATING ON THE AMAZON RIVER



THE accompanying picture shows Sister Jessie Halliwell, wife of Elder L. B. Halliwell, superintendent of the Lower Amazon Mission, giving an injection to a sufferer from malaria, while on one of the trips of mercy that she makes with her husband in our mission launch, on the waters of the mighty Amazon system. These sufferers from malaria are very common in certain sections of that field. Brother and Sister Halliwell were gone from their home for three months on one trip during this year. They travelled from Belem to Manaos and back in their little boat, also making many side trips up near the head waters of the Maués and Andirá rivers. Sister Halliwell's training as a graduate nurse is very helpful in aliviating the many sufferers they find as they travel about. On this trip she and Brother Halliwell, who is also becoming very practical in treating the people, cared for over one thousand three hundred people. In one day more than one hundred received treatment.


Naturally on these visits they meet many sad and disheartening cases. One that was especially touching this year was that of a little baby that was found by a passer-by, lying in the father and mother were lying in their hammocks dead. The poor baby was found by a passer-by lying in the hammock with its dead mother, clinging to her breast and crying from hunger as well as from the sickness. The baby was brought to the mission boat and after being cared for was left in the home of a near-by neighbor.

It was the writer's privilege to travel with Brother and Sister Halli-well this year for nearly a month. It was really pitiful to see people coming in large numbers, the majority of them revealing in their faces the need of medical aid. Some even had to be carried to the boat.

The readers of the Bulletin will rejoice, I am sure, to know that as a result of this medical work souls have been brought to the acceptance of the truth. One such case is especially interesting. The man told me that he was very prejudiced against protestantism, as was also his wife. He being sick, however, had a dream in which he thought he saw a large fat man come to him and give him some medicine. He said that as a result of taking the medicine great numbers of worms came from his body, and that then he got well. Later he met Elder Halliwell, and any one who knows this good brother knows that he fills the description that was given the man. Also as there are so many people in that section that suffer from hook worms Elder Halliwell finds it necessary to give medicine for that trouble to nearly every one that is sick, so he is known as the worm doctor. When this man met Brother Halli-

well he was told that he had the symptoms of the hook worm trouble, so he was given the medicine for that trouble. He felt that his dream was so literally fulfilled both in the description he had of a large fat man, and also in the results with the worms that he was impressed that he should listen to the teachings of this "worm doctor." As a result he and his wife

are now baptized members of our mission church.

The government officials are appreciating very much the work we are doing. This year they furnished us with some two hundred dollars worth of medicines.

We earnestly solicit the prayers of all in behalf of the work in this very needy as well as interesting field.

The following day, Sabbath, I gave another study on the "Plan of Salvation," and at the close of the same day, I spoke about the "Signs of the Coming of Christ."

"There are three interested families. The lady of the house where we stayed, was ill, but even so, she asked me to hold another meeting, and at eight o'clock in the evening I gave a study on "The Law of God." It was encouraging to see the interest those people manifested. I could see the great need of workers, for although a colporteur had never passed through this place there are people, however, who keep the Sabbath. One of them told me that he had been keeping the Sabbath for two years. The harvest is great, but there are only a few workers. It is a pleasure to see how anxious the people are to learn more about God and the message for this time. A good spirit is manifested among them. May I ask you to pray for us and for these interested people?"

Brother Correa does not pretend to preach sermons, but he gives Bible readings, and this is the best way for our lay members to engage in evangelistic work. May the Lord bless the sincere efforts of this brother. May many others join in this good work, for in this way we can evangelize the millions of inhabitants in our conference.

JOBOATAO, PERNAMBUCO

The other day when I went to see her, I asked her if she needed anything, but she said that she had everything she needed and was satisfied. I was surprised at the cleanliness of her home. She herself takes care of her home and she also does her own washing.

INAUGURATION OF THE TEMPLE IN MOGY DAS CRUZES

THE first visit I made to the interior of Sao Paulo was with Brother Clemente Ferreira, in Mogy das Cruzes, together with Elder H. B. Westcott, in the beginning of 1921. We went there to work in the Harvest

Ingathering. We were well impressed with the city of Mogy das Cruzes. Some years later Brother Germano Conrad with his family moved to this place. In 1932 Elder Jeronymo G. Garcia, assisted by Sister Catherina

Grabby and Brother Conrad, rented a hall and held a public effort. Not long after this, a good Sabbath school was organized and a little later seventeen people were baptized.

Soon the old and the new members of that church, together with the workers of the conference, began to agitate the matter of securing their own church building with a suitable room for a church school.

The construction of the building was started, and fortunately the effort was crowned with success, thanks to the sincere efforts of Brother Conrad and other brethren of that church. Many of the friends gave brick, tile, electrical fixtures, flowers, besides helping with their own hands. We are desirous of having a good church school there in 1935 and we are laying plans for its realization.

On Sabbath, June 2, Elder N. P. Neilsen, president of the South American Division, gave the inaugural sermon, to a congregation of more than 250 persons. The choir from Sao Bernardo sang some beautiful songs and Sister Butler from the Sao Paulo church sang two solos. In the afternoon of the same day there was a program with recitations and music which everyone enjoyed. In the evening Elder Domingos Peixoto from the Collegio Adventista had charge of the sermon, and on Sunday evening Elder Ricardo Wilfarth started a public effort which will continue during the month of June.

WE ARE just about now crossing the one-hundred-million-dollar line in the total value of Seventh-day Adventist literature circulated since the beginning of this movement. Some of it has been destroyed, no doubt, but much of it has been preserved and will bear a harvest of fruit. In this magazine-reading age special efforts are being made to increase greatly the circulation of our magazines, and these efforts are meeting with success. For example, in the Central European Division last month 484,000 copies of their missionary magazine were put into circulation. Last year six of our world divisions showed a gain in literature sales, and ten of the divisions closed the first quarter of the present year with a substantial gain. We have now an army of three thousand colporteurs carrying the message to the world. J. L. Brown.
